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Higher Education Roundup of Indiana's 2016 Legislative Session

Several bills related to Indiana higher education were passed by the 2016 General Assembly, including many aligned to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education's goals for increased college completion, academic quality and return on investment.

The following higher education policies await the Governor's signature:

House Enrolled Act 1002 – Next Generation Hoosier Educators Scholarship

Creates 200 new scholarships encouraging talented high school students to become teachers. Requires
applicants to graduate in top 20 percent of their high school class or score in the top 20 percent on the
SAT or ACT. Requires the Commission for Higher Education to prepare a report reviewing similar
programs in other states and develop potential administrative procedures to effectively administer the
program.

House Enrolled Act 1034 – Teacher Scholarship and Stipends

• Unifies the academic eligibility requirements for existing teacher aid programs, while clarifying how the Commission is to award funds.

House Enrolled Act 1248 – Higher Education Matters

Changes credit completion requirements to 30 credits annually for full-time, need-based financial aid
recipients, for the 2017-18 academic year. Changes the minimum high school diploma requirement for
the Mitch Daniels Early Graduation Scholarship to the Core 40 Diploma. Expands the EARN Indiana
work-study program to accommodate recipients of the Adult Student Grant.

House Enrolled Act 1370 – Dual Credit Teachers

Directs the Commission for Higher Education to study programs that guarantee high school students
are given the opportunity to earn college credit in high school and to develop incentives for high school
teachers to meet the requirements for teaching dual credit courses set by the accrediting body, Higher
Learning Commission.

Senate Enrolled Act 301 – Workforce Education

 Directs the Indiana Department of Workforce Development and Indiana Department of Revenue to provide data to the Commission for Higher Education and Ivy Tech to measure labor market outcomes associated with Ivy Tech programs.

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Once signed by Gov. Mike Pence, all of these laws will be effective July 1, 2016.
