Third round of funding for the Emergency Connectivity Fund announced by the FCC



The Federal Communications Commission has [announced](#) that it is opening a third application filing window to award at least \$1 billion in Emergency Connectivity Fund support. The third application filing window will open on April 28 and close on May 13.

During this third application filing window, eligible schools and libraries can submit requests for funding to purchase eligible equipment and services between July 1 of this year and December 31, 2023. Given past demand, the third application filing window will likely be the last opportunity for schools and libraries to request funding before the remaining Emergency Connectivity Funds are exhausted.

“I’m excited to announce we are opening a new opportunity for schools and libraries to apply for funding in the upcoming school year through the Emergency Connectivity Fund,” said chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel. “We also are providing a 12th round of funding for schools and libraries for this school year, supporting another 200,000 students with devices and broadband connections. This program has done so much already and I look forward to seeing more students get the help they need for next year. Today is a great day for making progress in closing the homework gap.”

The 18-month funding window will allow applicants to reap the full benefit of existing Emergency Connectivity Fund support, which can be used to support off-campus learning, such as nightly homework, to ensure students across the country have the necessary support to keep up with their education. Total commitments to date have funded over 10 million connected devices and 5 million broadband connections. Since its June 2021 launch, the program has connected over 12.5 million students with broadband connections and equipment. The most recent funding round committed nearly \$68 million to support over 140 schools and 25 libraries across the country, including for students in Alaska, Arizona, California, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Massachusetts, New

1950 census records

In 1950, 3,934,224 people were counted in the Indiana census. Last week, these original census forms from Hoosiers and the rest of the nation were released by the National Archives and Records Administration. [NARA](#) waits 72 years after the census takes place so records can be released without fear of exposing addresses and other information to the public. The “[72-Year Rule](#)” ensures anonymity for everyone who participates in the census.

As of April 1, the public can view [original 1950 records](#) free of cost using the [NARA website](#). The records have not been fully indexed yet, but users can find a family at a specific address using the Enumeration District number for that area. Find ED numbers using the links to ED maps of a county once a search has been performed. Once the records are fully indexed, name searching will be available. Those who would like to help index the 1950 records can visit this [website](#) to receive updates.

Between May 5 and May 31, the Frankfort Community Public Library will host a series of events focusing on national and Indiana state parks. "A Walk in Our Parks" will feature a variety of programs and exhibits on the history of these parks.

On Thursday, May 5 at 6 p.m., Mark Woods, author of "Lassoing the Sun: A Year in America's National Parks" will kick off "A Walk in Our Parks" with a virtual author talk. Woods, who received the Eugene C. Pulliam Fellowship, will discuss his book and the year he spent exploring the future of the country's national parks.

On May 6-31, an informative historical exhibit - courtesy of the National Archives, the Indiana Department of Natural Resources and the Indiana Historical Society - will be on display. Vintage photo prints and current works by local artist, Cherri Flora, will be available for purchase.

On Friday, May 13 at 5 p.m., Nathan Strange, author of "The Complete Guide to Indiana State Parks," will lead a book discussion. Strange is a naturalist who has visited all 25 state parks. Each park is profiled in his book.

Later the same evening on May 13, at 6:30 p.m., Glory-June Greiff, Indiana historian and author of "People, Parks, and Perceptions: A History and Appreciation of Indiana State Parks," will present in the library's Skanta Theatre. Greiff will dive deep into the creation of the Civilian Conservation Corps and Indiana's state parks.

The programs and exhibits are free and open to the public. The projects have been made possible through a grant from Indiana Humanities in cooperation with the National Endowment for the Humanities.
