State Library announces new Saturday hours effective September 1, 2015

There are five subtests included in TASC test:

- Language Arts Reading tests your proficiency at understanding, interpreting, and analyzing informational and literary texts.
- Language Arts Writing tests your knowledge of sentence structure, usage, and mechanics, and your ability to create and organize ideas in writing using standard, American-written English.
- Mathematics—tests your skill at solving quantitative problems requiring numerical operations, measurement, estimation, data interpretation, and logical thinking. A calculator is allowed for the first portion of the test.
- Social Studies—tests your knowledge of the basic principles of U.S. and world history, political science, geography, and economics.
- **Science**—tests your knowledge of topics such as physics, chemistry, botany, zoology, health, and astronomy. You will also have demonstrated your ability to interpret scientific data and apply principles of scientific inquiry.
