Booklovers by Emily Henry (BR 24476, DB 107926, LP 21920)

Cutthroat literary agent Nora Stephens agrees to go to Sunshine Falls, North Carolina, when her sister Libby begs her to accompany her on vacation. Surprisingly, Nora keeps bumping into Charlie Lastra, a bookish, brooding editor from back in the city. It would be a meet-cute, if not for the fact that they've met many times and it's never been cute. 2022.

The Hotel Nantucket by Elin Hilderbrand (BR 24451, DB 109007)

In 1922, a fire at the Hotel Nantucket killed 19-year-old chambermaid Grace Hadley. The Hotel then become more and more abandoned, the once beautiful and bright inner walls slowly withered. Until Xavier Darling, a British billionaire, purchased and revived it. Xavier hires Lizbet Keaton as his general manager, and Lizbet, in turn, assembles an energetic and inexperienced team with the purpose of turning around the hotel's destiny.

Fairy Tale by Stephen King (BR 24552, DB 110155)

Traveling to a secret other world to save your old, sick dog sounds simple, doesn't it? The dark fantasy novel, *Fairy Tale* was just creepy enough to reflect the author's style, but at the same time, it doesn't slip into the morbid category. The novel contains elements from almost all classic fairy tales, all spiced up with a bit of King's horror. 2022

Run Rose Run by Dolly Parton & James Patterson (BR 24102, DB 107053, LP 21913)

Annie Lee Keyes is hitchhiking her way to Nashville, determined to make it in the music industry. But she's fleeing her past, and her rise as a country music star is dogged by the dark secrets trying to destroy her. Violence and strong language. 2022.

This Time Tomorrow by Emma Straub (BR 24331, DB 108110)

"A moving story about a father-daughter relationship. . .chronicles what happens when one 40-year-old woman wakes up and is suddenly 16 years old again. But it's not her youth she's riveted by—it's her father's."—

I'm Glad my Mom Died by Jennette McCurdy (DB 110152)

Jennette McCurdy was a Nickelodeon teen star from iCarly and Sam & Cat. Everything that happened to Jennette in her life, the things that her mother did to her, that she made her do as she raised her, is so horrible.

And There was Light: Abraham Lincoln and the American Struggle by John Meacham (DB 111374)

This book tells the story of Lincoln from his birth on the Kentucky frontier in 1809 to his leadership during the Civil War to his tragic assassination in 1865: his rise, his self-education, his loves, his bouts of depression, his political failures, his deepening faith, and his persistent conviction that slavery must end.

The Light We Carry: Overcoming in Uncertain Times by Michelle Obama (DB 111237)

There may be no tidy solutions or pithy answers to life's big challenges, but Michelle Obama believes that we can all locate and lean on a set of tools to help us better navigate change and remain steady within flux.

So Help Me God by Mike Pence (DB 111606)

So Help Me God is the chronicle of the events and people who forged Mike Pence's character and led him to that historic moment, on January 6, 2021 when the Vice President refused to leave the Capitol, and once the riot was quelled, he reconvened Congress to complete the work of a peaceful transfer of power.

Starry Messenger: Cosmic Perspectives on Civilization by Neil deGrasse Tyson (DB 110636)

Bringing his cosmic perspective to civilization on Earth, Neil deGrasse Tyson shines new light on the crucial fault lines of our time—war, politics, religion, truth, beauty, gender, and race—in a way that stimulates a deeper sense of unity for us all.
