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## Foster Success Population

Foster Success supports young people who have experienced foster care as a teen from age 14 until their 26th birthday this includes more than 24,000 individuals across Indiana.

In 2021-2022 Foster Success supported more than:

- 750 young people from Indiana
- 46% were young people of color
- o 68% identified as female, 30% as male, and 2% as non-binary
- o 64% identify as living under the federal poverty level
- o 64% have received a mental health diagnosis

### **Impact Areas**













#### **Education and Training Voucher Program**

ETV is a Federally funded program that provides financial assistance to qualifying former and current foster youth pursuing a post-secondary credential. \$5,000 per academic year

#### **College Student Support**

Regional Education Coordinator assist students in navigating their higher education experience

#### **Catalyst**

Summer bridge program for rising college freshmen. Young people earn six college credits, college experience, and a weekly stipend.

#### **Pathways**

This program guides high school sophomores, juniors and seniors in exploring their options for post high school, and is paired with a curriculum that includes the state's educational pathway and 21st Century Scholarship Scholar Success program requirements.

### Older Foster Youth in Indiana

In 2018, Indiana extended the age a young person can stay in extended foster care until their 21st birthday and they can receive independent living services until their 23rd birthday.\*

At 18, there are three paths a young person can take:

- Full exit from care and services
- Collaborative Care (available until 21st birthday)
- Voluntary Services (available until 23rd birthday)

<sup>\*</sup>This was possible due passage of the federal Family First Prevention Act in 2018.


## IThe Indiana Commission for Higher Education has prioritized supporting Indiana's older foster youth.

In Indiana, our older foster youth go to college at rates equal to other states, but Foster Success's data suggests that Indiana's older foster youth are completing at a higher rate.


