


ABOUT THE DATA

- Base student population
 - Limitation: Data only includes students who filed the FAFSA and matched to our institutional college completion cohort records
 - College completion cohort criteria: First-time, full time, undergraduate degree-seeking student at an Indiana public institution who started in the fall semester
- "Parent student"
 - Student indicated that they financially support children on the FAFSA
- Cohorts
 - Extended Time -> Fall 2015 Cohort
 - On Time -> Fall 2017/Fall 2019 Cohorts (Four-year institutions/two-year institutions)






PARENTS STRUGGLE TO COMPLETE COLLEGE ON-TIME






COMPLETION GAP LARGER FOR FEMALE PARENTS









