III. Making A Community Action Plan

Step 2: Ensure your problem statements are evidence-informed, then prioritize

Step 3: Brainstorm what can be done about each

Step 4: Prioritize your list, and develop SMART goal statements for each

Step 1: Create + Categorize Problem Statements

If a 3% reduction is not achieved within one year, the LCCs approach will be reevaluated.

Goal 2

The LCC will reduce drug use amongst youth, ages 11-17, and adults by 3% within a one-year period. This will be known by supporting local schools with programs and technology to continue their efforts in reducing drug use in schools. This will also be known by supporting local programs in efforts to reduce adult drug use in our community. Data will be documented from local schools and government agencies to track the student drug use in schools and drug use in court cases. If a 3% reduction is not achieved within one year, the LCCs approach will be reevaluated.
