ARE YOU FIT FOR THE JOB?

To work as a seasonal interpretive naturalist in the Division of State Parks, you must:

- Have completed a minimum of two years undergraduate work in natural sciences, outdoor recreation or closely related field, -or- have a combination of work-related experience of equal value up to one year with applicable college courses.
- Attend a three- to four-day interpretive training session in mid-May each year.
- Have a good working knowledge of natural sciences and environmental principles.
- Be familiar with Midwestern flora and fauna.
- Have strong working skills in public speaking, writing, graphic arts, multimedia, and the use of computers.
- Have a valid driver's license.
- · Wear a state-provided DNR uniform.
- · Provide your own housing and transportation.
- · Work most weekends and holidays, and some evenings.
- Be in sufficient physical condition to work outdoors in sometimes strenuous conditions.

DIVERSE PEOPLE & PLACES

State parks and state park-managed properties vary in size from 250 to more than 25,000 acres. Their landscapes are rich and varied. Most properties have interpretive facilities such as a nature center or historic home. On weekends. interpretive naturalists offer two or three fun and educational programs per day. The

number of programs offered on

weekdays varies by property. Guests are as diverse as the plants and animals interpretive naturalists help them discover. Interpretive naturalists and recreation staff are encouraged to offer a variety of programs ranging from campfires and crafts to hikes, night hikes, and talks. Interpretive naturalists discover what works best at a site through discussions with property staff, the interpretive manager, and full-time interpretive naturalists.

WHY "INTERPRETIVE" NATURALIST?

Interpretive naturalists do more than identify plants and wildlife. They encourage guests to discover the outdoors for themselves and to value experiences. They talk about everything from wild geraniums to garter snakes, and they listen closely naturalists explore that history through research, programs and, sometimes, actively work to restore natural and cultural resources.

PART OF A TEAM

Seasonal interpretive naturalists are part of a team that includes a property manager, an assistant property manager, a wildlife biologist (on reservoir properties), office staff, full-time maintenance workers, gate attendants, mowing and cleaning crews, and lifeguards. All share the goal of helping guests have the best experience.

Duties may include:

- Develop and present a variety of interpretive programs such as talks, hikes, kid's programs, campfires, and crafts. The interpretive naturalist generally chooses their program topics based on the resources and facilities of their property.
- Write articles and social media posts, prepare interpretive brochure drafts, and draft property event media releases in consultation with the necessary property staff and the Division of Communications.
- Prepare, publish, and post a weekly or monthly activity schedule, assist with recreational activities, and host various scheduled performing-arts events.
- Develop, construct, install, and maintain interpretive bulletin board displays in nature centers, property offices, and information display cases throughout the property.

A seasonal interpretive naturalist's job may be intense, but it can be one of the most rewarding experiences while providing a chance to:

- Introduce guests to unique plants, animals, facilities, and history of an Indiana state park property.

- Work with and learn from other seasonal and full-time interpretive naturalists/recreation staff.
- Develop strong communications skills by presenting hikes, talks, crafts, and other interpretive/recreational programs in a variety of settings.
