Re: Innovation Pilot Project Update

In the summer of 2022, the Division of Disability and Rehabilitative Services announced funding opportunities for home and community-based waiver services providers, non-provider community entities, self-advocates and families interested in exploring new means to support and address areas of outstanding need among Hoosiers receiving services from the Bureau of Developmental Disabilities Services. These grant funds are made possible by the American Rescue Plan Act funds Indiana received from the federal government and are specifically targeted at improving services and supports for individuals with disabilities and their families.

This specific innovation opportunity was designed for providers, community partners and self-advocates who were interested in engaging in novel efforts and approaches to inform HCBS waiver redesign, further explore existing recommendations from the <u>1102 Taskforce</u>, and individual and family stakeholder <u>feedback</u>.

When BDDS made this opportunity available, the Bureau had no idea what kind of reception it would receive and were delighted to receive a total of 133 applications! These applications ranged in size and reach of proposed projects. Overall, the applications reflected creative ideas to address identified needs.

In the last few months, BDDS has thoroughly reviewed and vetted all 133 applications. Forty-eight Phase 1 grants were offered to a total of 42 unique entities, six entities were offered two grants each. Approved Phase 1 applications are for projects in every region of Indiana. Approved Phase 1 applications cover a range of topics including: job training and employment opportunities for individuals, family and unpaid caregiver training, training and supports for paid providers, remote and digital supports, payment model redesign, new residential support models, system navigation support, end of life supports, and other potential new or alternative service options.



To maximize BDDS' ability to fund as many projects as possible, Phase 1 awards were divided into 3 tiers: Tier 1-Projects which must total \$100,000 or less, Tier 2-Projects which must total \$250,000 or less, and Tier 3-Project with cost and scale to be determined by Phase 2 submission.
