The need for a Deaf Interpreter is increasing! Here is information and a list of resources to learn about the profession of a Deaf Interpreter.

There are two types of deaf interpreters:

**Certified Deaf Interpreter** (bachelor's degree, RID Certification, natural ability, skills development, training and professional development through continued education units (CEUs))

**Deaf Interpreter** (may have a degree, natural ability, skills development, possible training, experience, but are not RID certified)

The **Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf** is currently the only organization that certifies Deaf Interpreters. The requirements for this are listed on their website: <a href="https://rid.org/certification/available-certifications/">https://rid.org/certification/available-certifications/</a>
