



Goshen

The first listening session for Indiana Commission on Hispanic/Latino Affairs took place on April 5th in Goshen, Indiana. With the exposure from local and state-wide media coverage and the wonderful network of partners, ICHLA was able to truly hear from and serve the Indiana-based Hispanic and Latino population. From this session, we were able to partner with more than 24 various organizations and 10 exhibitors from different fields of expertise; such as health, civil rights, education, public safety, and workforce. Some of these organizations included:

- o Horizon Education Alliance (education advocacy consortium)

These groups opened themselves to the more than 200 attendees present for the event on the services available to the community and helped to best answer questions posed to them regarding their field. Along with providing educational resourcing, we were also able to hand out community surveys regarding issues and concerns the attendees may have. From the completed surveys received, we have gained an incredible insight into the true challenges and concerns of the community, as well as, suggestions for ways that we as an organization can better help address or resolve said issues. Taking these surveys, we hope to increase our reach state-wide and be proactive in our service to the Hispanics and Latinos present.

GOSHEN — The Indiana Commission on Hispanic/ Latino Affairs will be holding listening sessions statewide between April and October. The project is called "Make your voice heard! ¡Queremos escuchar

The first listening session will take place April 5 from 5:30 to 8 p.m. on the campus of Goshen College at College Mennonite Church, 1900 S. Main St.

Evansville

The second listening session for the Indiana Commission on Hispanic/Latino Affairs was held on August 3rd in Evansville Indiana. Having learned immensely from the first listening session, we were able to bring 17 new organizations and personnel that could better address specific questions regarding their field and services. We expanded our network to include organizations such as:

Along with expanding our network of partners, we decided to help provide various

Regarding the community surveys we received back; we began to see similar statements and concerns being repeated from those we initially saw from the Goshen listening session, as well as, new issues that we were unaware existed. We are confident that with this new information, we can implement better practices to administer change in the state and honor our mission to the Hispanic and Latino community.






NEEDS ASSESMENT 2019 Listening Sessions Indianapolis

Padres Estrellas

Padres Estrellas is a program designed to harness Latino parents as partners at the grassroots level to drive successful outcomes for 21st Century Scholars enrollment and Next Level Jobs Workforce Ready Grant engagement. Led by the Indiana Commission for Higher Education (ICHE) and a collaborative of community partners, this initiative seeks to raise the higher education attainment needle for Latino learners in each identified pilot region throughout the state.

- 21st Century Scholars offer income-eligible Hoosier students up to four years of paid tuition at an eligible Indiana college or university after they graduate from high school.
- Next Level Jobs Workforce Ready Grant provides free job training for Hoosiers in high-demand sectors from Ivy Tech Community College, Vincennes University, and other authorized providers. Sectors include: Advanced Manufacturing, Building & Construction, Health & Life Science, IT & Business Services, and Transportation & Logistics.



Role & Responsibilities

Padres Estrellas will be assigned a year service term. Throughout this period, Padres Estrellas will be responsible for engaging their local community in outreach services designed to augment awareness for the 21st Century Scholars Program and the Next Level Jobs Workforce Ready Grant. Examples of engagement include, but are not limited to attending parent/teacher evenings, exhibiting during educational events/conferences, working to strengthen relationships with Latino businesses, serving as a liaison between the ICHE and local Latino communities, and supporting the partner organization's objectives through established programs.

Outside of his/her region, Padres Estrellas will be expected to attend two, mandatory meetings in Indianapolis for required trainings with dates to be determined. Additionally, Padres Estrellas will submit monthly reports to the ICHE School & Community Outreach Manager to document progress.







Both events provided valuable information on getting to and through college. Students attended workshops such as: How to Choose a College that Best Fits Your Needs, Financial Aid 101, and What You Need to Know About the Transition to College.
