



OUR MISSION

The Commission identifies, measures and reviews programs, legislation and researches challenges and opportunities affecting the Hispanic/Latino community. The Commission identifies solutions and provides recommendations to the governor and legislature.



CORE VALUES

The success of the Indiana Commission on Hispanic/Latino Affairs will be determined by the following factors:

Build Cooperation and understanding between Indiana Hispanic/Latino communities and other Indiana communities. By providing Indiana's Hispanic/Latinos with informational opportunities and also informing Indiana's Governor, Legislature and state agencies about statewide Hispanic/Latino issues.

Institutional change. By partnering with state and government agencies to assure equity and access to culturally competent programs and services, to review state agency policies, practices, procedures, and to make appropriate recommendations that will ensure proper delivery of state/government services and resources throughout the Hispanic/Latino communities.

Strategic planning. Develop and maintain a strategic plan that will set goals and define deliverables which will directly impact and address the needs of the Hispanic/Latino community and the state. The strategic plan will be used as a roadmap to guide future research.

Collaboration with the community. Promote civic involvement as a way of preserving culture, unifying Hispanic/Latino residents and improving quality of life.

Identifying Indiana Hispanic/Latino issues and concerns through public policy analysis and data-driven, outcome based research. To develop initiatives and procedures that will create awareness of issues.

INDIANA LATINO POPULATION

As of July 1, 2016, the US Census reports that the Hispanic population constituted 57.5 million or 17.8 percent of the nation's total population.

According to the US Census Bureau Indiana has the 21st largest Latino population in the U.S. US Census projections show a continued increase in the Latino population.

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


POVERTY

According to the US Census Bureau, the poverty rate among Latinos in Indiana is 2.3 times the poverty rate among White non-Latinos. More than 1 in 4 Latinos are living in poverty in Indiana.

The graph below on the National Wealth Gap presented by Tess Weathers in Indianapolis at Latino Conference shows how enormous the wealth gap is for Latinos and other minorities. As she stated, "Wealth in the form of savings, a home or other property and assets is very important in being able to weather the hits of a life."

HEALTH

According to the American Diabetes Association diabetes is growing at an epidemic rate in the United States and in Indiana.

Indiana's diabetes epidemic:

12.9% of the adult population have diabetes

35.6 % of the adult population have prediabetes

The Indiana State Department of Health provides the following on Indiana Latinos and diabetes:


4.8% of Latino people have been told they have diabetes by a doctor.


Latino males are more likely to be told they have diabetes than Latina females.

Diabetes is the **5th leading cause of death** for Latinos in Indiana. Due to this and other health disparities in the Latino community the Indiana Commission on Hispanic and Latino Affairs has made a commitment to continue supporting Latino and Minority health initiatives across the State of Indiana. A resource and wellness fair was held in 2017 and the hope is that this event continues to grow each year.

EDUCATION

In terms of education, Latinos appear to be progressing at the national level. The Pew Research Center's report on the national high school dropout rate of Latinos reported the Latino dropout rate went from 34% in 1996 to 10% in 2016. In Indiana the high school dropout rate of Latinos was 13.7% in 2016. College enrollment rates are also on the rise for Latinos across the country. Latino college enrollment among 18-24 year olds increased from 35% to 47% from 1996 to 2016 according to the Pew Research Center. ICHLA will continue to support the programs that focus on the success of Latino students in high school and Latino students entering college.





ADELANTE 2017

ICHLA's signature event this year was a resource and wellness fair on June 10, 2017 in Indianapolis at Riverside Park. Families registered their children for free wrap around services including free dental screenings and immunizations, free backpacks and school supplies, raffle givewaways, and other community resources.
