

8.2% of the Indiana population is of Hispanic/Latino Origin



# BREAKDOWN OF HISPANIC/LATINX POPULATION IN INDIANA





# SOCIAL RESOURCE SUBCOMMITTEE

Commissioner Emily Salinas chairs this subcommittee and is joined by Senator Rodney Pol and Representative Mike Andrade. This subcommittee meets to discuss education and social barriers that Latinxs face. They will review the ICHLA survey data and use that information to guide them in 2023.





Latino homelessness increased by 7.6 percent since 2020 which increased, in contrast, more than the overall homeless population (increased by .03 percent), and the non-Hispanic/Latino population experiencing homelessness fell by 1.8 percent).

National Alliance to End Homelessness

Ensure targeted funding for schools with the highest needs as it relates to pre-pandemic and post pandemic. For school-aged youth, the American School Counsellor Association recommends that there is a ratio of 1 school counselor for every 250 students. Currently, Indiana's ratio is 1 counselor for every 694 students. Indiana schools that met the recommended ratio scored 16 to 18 points higher on individual sections of the SAT.



# SOCIAL RESOURCE SUBCOMMITTEE



Farmworkers face widespread violations of the few rights they possess, high injury and fatality rates, and poverty, including food insecurity. By prioritizing farmworkers in relevant programs, policies, and resources, Indiana would help not only farmworkers but also provide broader societal benefits, including improved food safety, healthier and stronger rural communities, and a level playing field for law abiding employers. Take action to ensure that additional funding opportunities such as existing and ongoing grants or other programs include requirements and incentives regarding farmworker living and working conditions. Take executive action to ensure funding and capacity for farmworker organizations to help ensure improved farmworker working and living conditions and to ensure farmworker access to economic opportunities.



ICHLA acknowledges the USDA Equity Commission 2023 Interim Report and recommends that funding ought to be prioritized to improve farm labor working conditions, labor protections, healthcare, wages, access to justice, supply and stability services, and safety and training.

# BREAKDOWN OF HEALTHCARE ACCESS OF HISPANIC/LATINX POPULATION IN INDIANA

SURVEY RESULTS FROM THE 2022 ICHLA SURVEY

- 44% OF RESPONDENTS SAID THEIR ACCESS TO HEALTHCARE PROVIDER WHO SPEAKS SPANISH IS POOR

  WOMEN.


### **ICHLA SURVEY & DATABASE RATES**


### HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE YOUR OVERALL HEALTH?





HAVE YOU BEEN TREATED FOR ANY OF THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS?







- 1. The Hispanic population has the second highest percentage for HIV diagnoses, at 14.5%.
- 2. The age group "30 and over" are most likely to be diagnosed with HIV.
- 3. 32% of the population currently living with HIV have unmet needs or are not receiving care.
- 4. In regards to Chlamydia diagnoses 1617 females reported a positive case in comparison to 763 males.
- 5. The age group "18-24" are mostly likely to be diagnosed with Chlamydia, having 1371 positive cases reported last year.



### MENTAL HEALTH CONCERNS

According to SAMHSA's National Survey on Drug Use and Health, overall mental health issues are on the rise for Latinxs between the ages of 12-49, while cultural perceptions around mental health continue to contribute negative stigmas towards seeking treatment. In 2018, 49% of Latino adults between 18-49 with a serious mental illness did not receive treatment. Along with cultural setbacks, access to affordable insurance and obtaining bilingual counseling continue to be barriers for Latinx/Hispanic citizens. Covid-19 also plays a role; These access issues have since been exacerbated due to the disparate effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.



HOW SHOULD WE PRIORITIZE THESE FINDINGS AND INCREASE THE ACCESS TO QUALITY HEALTHCARE FOR HISPANIC/LATINX HOOSIERS MOVING FORWARD?

### ICHLA'S RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1.INCREASE FUNDING FOR TRANSLATION SERVICES IN HEALTHCARE
- 2.ENCOURAGE HISPANIC/LATINX STUDENTS TO ENTER THE
  HEALTHCARE FIELD VIA ACCESSIBLE POST SECONDARY
  PROGRAMS
- 3. NEW IMPLEMENTATIONS OF LANGUAGE PROGRAMS FOR NATIVE SPANISH SPEAKERS

THIS SUBCOMMITEE WILL CONTINUE TO WORK INTENTIONALLY TO ADDRESS THE ISSUES THAT THE HOOISER HISPANIC/LATINX COMMUNITY FACES.



ICHLA has heard from multiple stakeholders that navigating Indiana government programs and services can be a hindrance and in some cases, impossible for certain stakeholders. ICHLA recommends the following items to ensure equitable language and culturally competent access to services:




- Examine state processes and use plain language, clearly describing eligibility criteria to improve access for underserved populations.
- Increase funding for technical assistance that includes targeted training and coaching to nonprofit organizations that serve the Latino community on understanding government programs and opportunities.
- Designate an executive level career staff member to be responsible for Language Access guidance, compliance, and oversight.
