CHAIRPERSON SLASH: It is 1:12 on

August l8th. I call this meeting of the Indiana Civil Rights Commission to order.

MR. LOSTUTTER: I have just a few
things. Please be advised no party will be allowed to speak directly to the Commission during a Commission meeting, except during a previously scheduled oral argument.

Commissioners will make their initial
determination based on the complaint, notice of finding, the appeal, and the final investigative report.

You must not address the Commission
members except and unless you are addressed directly by them, and if you have any questions about your case, please wait to speak to the Docket Clerk until after the Commission meeting. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.

Okay. We do have a quorum, so no worries
there. If you want to announce the agenda, we
can kind of keep moving.
MR. LOSTUTTER: We will be going over approval of previous meeting minutes; and then we will have the presentation of the ICRC Director's Report for the month of July; then Old Business, appeals that were assigned to Commissioners last month; and then New Business, appointment of Commissioners to new complaint appeals; review of ALJ Decisions and Orders, of which there is one; and then reading into the record the final orders of the ALJ automatically confirmed, of which there are two.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.
Now I'll call for a -- does anyone want to call for a motion to approve last month's meeting minutes?

VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: So moved.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.
COMM. TOLLIVER: Second.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.
MR. LOSTUTTER: We'll call the roll.
Comm. Jackson?
COMM. JACKSON: Present.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Was that aye -COMM. HARRINGTON: Present.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: -- or present?
COMM. JACKSON: Aye.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. Thank you.

MR. LOSTUTTER: Comm. Harrington?
COMM. HARRINGTON: Present.
MR. LOSTUTTER: Comm. Tolliver?

COMM. TOLLIVER: Aye.
MR. LOSTUTTER: Vice-Chair Ramos?

VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Aye.
MR. LOSTUTTER: Chair Slash?

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Aye.
MR. LOSTUTTER: The minutes are
approved.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.
We'll have the ICRC Director's Report.
MR. FLEISCHHACKER: Sure. Thank you,
Chair Slash.
We have had a couple of events lately that we've had staff up to. We've had staff go up to Lake Station and Fort Wayne for a couple of events up there, but while also there, they were
meeting with some of the local officials, like in Fort Wayne, the Fort Wayne Human Rights Commission there, and in the Lake Station area, and the mayors of some of the different cities and everything.

So, again, just getting back out into communities outside of Central Indiana,

Indianapolis area, again, just raising awareness and being involved to try to increase awareness of the Indiana Civil Rights Commission and what we do.

We've got CORE that continues to go on. We were just at, I think, the Indianapolis Central Library this past month, and then we've got -- what have we got coming up next month? Next month we'll be at the Wayne Branch of the Indianapolis Library System.

We've got the Days of Service coming up on September l8th and 19th, so hopefully, if your calendars permit, you're able to join us for parts of one of those days, but again, we'll be along the Martin Luther King, Jr. Boulevard, or Street, kind of north of downtown, in the watkins

Park Area, doing beautification projects within that community.

Last year we had around 150 or so volunteers as part of those two Days of Service. We're hoping to have closer to 200 volunteers or more this year, again, doing a lot of beautification projects and things of that nature. We've got good partnerships with the City of Indianapolis and other entities that are coming together to make that happen.

And then we've got some activities going on coming up, with the Circle City Classic being a parade and different things of that nature, so we've got that coming up in late September as well, as well as the Indiana Latino Expo or Health Fair Saturday, September $23 r d$. We'll have a presence there for that.

So, again, a lot of things going on. Our External Affairs area remains busy. You know, we had the conference back in June, but we've not rested since then, continue to do good things.

One thing that $I$ wanted to put back on your radar, Chair Slash, just for your
consideration today, there is that cross-council summit that's coming up on August $23 r d$, so if today you want to further discuss who from the Commission may want to attend that and so we can get someone registered. I know, I think, Vice-Chair Ramos and Comm. --

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Comm. Blackburn. MR. FLEISCHHACKER: -- Blackburn had expressed interest in attending, and you had expressed an interest in possibly attending as well, if your schedule permitted. So, further conversation can happen today about that, or off-line if --

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay.
MR. FLEISCHHACKER: -- no decision is
made today. I just wanted to put that back on your radar.

Continue -- as far as projects go, continue to make enhancements to the CMS, Case Management system. We're hoping to, in the near future, have the DocuSign integrated fully into CMS, so then staff will be able to send out documents directly from $C M S$ and get signed copies
back instead of having to have them filter through our other Web-based DocuSign system as currently set up. So, we're looking forward to that.
(Comm. Silberberg joined via Zoom.)
MR. FLEISCHHACKER: Our Genesys phone system continues to be a good product for us. We, again, are averaging around four and a half to five calls per hour that are coming into our phones, and for the month of July we had a little over 800 calls that we answered as part of that process, which is on par with what we've had over the previous few months.

Our Fair House -- Fair Housing Testing program continues. We've conducted a number of tests already over the course of this year. We have contracts with both -- well, we have a contract with IHCDA, Indiana Housing Community Development Authority, to do tests, and then we've also got partnership funds that we received from HUD to do testing.

We've done only testing under the partnership funds piece for HUD. There were --
let's see, $83--$ so, 98 tests that we did as far as under those partnership funds, and then we got another -- let's see here -- another hundred or so that we're doing for IHCDA. Some of them we've completed, but that contract goes through the end of the calendar year, versus the HUD contract year that just ended.

From the tests that we've done so far, I think we've got about 18 that we're moving forward with, with Director-initiated complaints, so some of those we've already started having like settlement discussions about those, getting those settled. As part of those settlement discussions, we're asking for some administrative costs back from the respondents as part of the settlement proceedings.

So, we're working through those and, you know, hopefully utilizing those to correct behavior in those respondents that we're testing. Like for the IHCDA tests, a number of the tests were -- we did testing a couple of years ago with IHCDA, and from those there were a number of properties that had some significant differences
in how they treated the control and protected class.

All of those were retested as part of this contract period, and then testing additional properties above and beyond that. So, trying to see, you know, is what we did -- because the prior tests, we had all of those entities engage in training, so "Did that training pay off?" You know, "Are they still doing -- engaging in behavior that would be discriminatory?" So, we're looking at those kind of things to see, you know, what's our return on investment for those kind of areas.

We're about a month and a half away from wrapping up the EEOC contract, and we are on track to meet that. We've got a current inventory of close to 400 employment investigations that we're -- that our staff are working through. Our contract for EEOC is 350 for the current contract period that we're in, so we have, you know, enough cases to meet this contract period, and then next year is already in our inventory. So, we continue to move through
those and get those done.
As far as just some kind of updates on metrics, our numbers continue to be -- continue to be elevated this year compared to where they were last year at the same time. Inquiries are up 27 and a half percent. We're at 1592 through the end of July 2023 compared to 1248 last year. Our formalized complaints are up over 61 percent compared to last year, 634 formalized complaints through the end of July 2023 compared to 393 at that point last year.

And then settlement funds obtained through conciliations and such, we're up about five and a half percent. We've recovered, through the end of July, $\$ 509,000$ for complainants compared to 483,000 in the same period last year.

And we have around 60 open litigation cases. Right now, at the end of July, we are at 56 , but we've had five new cause cases since then, but $I$ know that we've closed one or two that have settled as well.

But again, our staff continue to do great work. We've brought on some -- an additional
employment investigator to help work through the increased inventory that we have for that, and just trying to keep things move along and keep our quality and customer service levels at the high level that we believe that they're at, and continue to do the numbers that we're doing as well.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Question.
MR. FLEISCHHACKER: Yes, Chair Slash.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: The formalized
complaint number is -- essentially is up; is that what you're saying?

MR. FLEISCHHACKER: Almost, yeah.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: So, I get where
we could see like an increase in tracking, just like calls and inquiries, but do we have like where this is coming from?

MR. FLEISCHHACKER: It could be just -- I think anecdotally it's from probably a number of different things, probably from us being out there more, raising awareness, public awareness type situations. I think part of it is our staff being better able to move inquiries to
formalized complaints.
In 2022, kind of year to date through July, our inquiry to formalized complaint was 31 and a half percent, and this year it's at 40 percent. So, more of the inquiries that are coming in, we're moving to formalized complaints.

Whether that's the ability of our staff to get them under that or just the nature of the complaints that are coming in and how they're able to articulate what allegedly has occurred to them. So, I think there's probably a number of different factors that play into that --

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay.
MR. FLEISCHHACKER: -- but I don't
think one thing necessarily explains it.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Yeah. It's just
a big --
MR. FLEISCHHACKER: Yeah.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: -- difference in
the --
MR. FLEISCHHACKER: Well, if you
think back, like back in 2017, 2018 -- I think
maybe it was the end of 2017 going into '18--
like when the hashtag Me-Too movement started, it kind of gained traction, and that resulted in a significant increase in complaints just because a number of people were more willing to share their experiences and talk about it and come, you know, file complaints about their experiences.

And then we had such a downturn with
COVID, where fewer people were interacting with each other, fewer people were engaging in, you know, visiting places of public accommodation, but now a lot of those things are easing up and people are back to work in person with each other and back visiting places, so $I$ think that kind of plays into kind of an increase as well.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. Thank you.
MR. FLEISCHHACKER: Yeah.
VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Just to add, we
had the Indiana Latino Expo Breakfast with the Mayor on Wednesday, which was very well received, a lot of people were there.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Uh-huh.
VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: It seemed more
like a political commercial than anything, but --
(Laughter.)
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Yes.
VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: -- but it was well
attended, and it was good to see people there.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Yes.
Anyone else have any questions?
(No response.)
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Anyone on the
phone have any questions for David?
(No response.)
MR. FLEISCHHACKER: All right. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.
Now we'll move through Old Business, and I'll begin. The first case, Adam Boylan versus Caravan Facilities Management, LLC, Case EMra22120710, that case was assigned to Comm. Tolliver.

COMM. TOLLIVER: Thank you.
There are two issue here. On the first issue, I'd recommend that we approve the Commission's recommendation that there was no probable cause under the Indiana Civil Rights

Law, and on the second issue, which is the same, a no probable cause claim under the Indiana Civil Rights Law.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.
The next case, Jesse Rider --

MR. FLEISCHHACKER: You have to take a vote.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: I'm sorry. That might have been rough, a little. Go ahead and call the roll since we have two on the phone.

MR. LOSTUTTER: Oh, all right. Well, do we need to also --

MR. FLEISCHHACKER: They'll just vote to abstain.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. Very good. I just wanted to make sure we're clear before we start the vote.

Is there a motion, though?
VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: So moved.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.
Is there a second?

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: That'll be a part of the review process?

MS. AFUWAPE: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. So, that's just a note, Comm. Harrington, on your case. The next one, Robert Lawson versus Crownpointe Communities, LLC, I'll assign that one to myself. The next one, Maria Nunez versus Humane Fort Wayne, I'll assign that one to Vice-Chair Ramos. And then we have Tresha Saffold versus Driveco Learning Center, that case

I'll assign to Comm. Tolliver. And then the last one is Kocho Long versus Indianapolis Housing Agency, because $I$ can see you, I'll assign that one to Comm. Silberberg.

COMM. SILBERBERG: I will not be at the next meeting, because it's on the High Holy Days.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Oh, yes. Thank you for that reminder.

Comm. Jackson, I'll assign that one to you; okay?

COMM. JACKSON: I'm sorry; what did you say?

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: I am assigning
the case of Kocho Long versus Indianapolis Housing Agency to you for next month.

COMM. JACKSON: Okay. That's good.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.

All right. The next one, we have
Administrative Law Judge's Order Disposing of Proceedings. We've got one of them, so the Administrative Law Judge -- the case of ICRC versus [sic] Dawn Reinoehl versus Open Door

Rentals and Real Estate, Case HOse22110642, the Administrative Law Judge granted in part and denied in part Respondent's Notice of Election. The Notice was not effective in moving Complaint of Discrimination under the ICRL out of the administrative forum, but did result in Complaint of Discrimination under the IFHA against the Respondent and should be dismissed with prejudice. The objection period in this matter is closed.

Is there a recommendation to approve, remand or --

VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Madam Chair, I recommend that we uphold the recommendation to dismiss with prejudice.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay.
Are there any questions or is there a second?

COMM. TOLLIVER: I'll second.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.
MR. LOSTUTTER: We will call roll.

Comm. Silberberg?

COMM. SILBERBERG: I'm sorry; I got
pulled away for one second. I didn't hear the -CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Oh, that's okay.

We are looking at an ALJ Decision and Order.
This one, the recommendation is that it should be dismissed with prejudice, and we have a motion on the floor to dismiss it with prejudice, and a second, and we're calling the roll.

Croucher's Trust, Case HOfs22110640. The next case is ICRC/Adhanom Tesfa versus M \& J Management Company, LLC and Eagle Creek Court, LLC, Case HOfs22090543.

Okay. Let's see here. And so, the next meeting date that we have is September 15th. It does sound as though we will have two that will not be with us.

COMM. HARRINGTON: I will not be.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Three. So, we
will need another meeting date.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay.
COMM. SILBERBERG: -- for me as well, and Mondays would be better for me as well. CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Is there any concern with Mondays to those of us in the room? VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Parking might be more challenging. People are usually -MR. FLEISCHHACKER: (Shook head no.) VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Oh, they're not? MR. FLEISCHHACKER: No. The only thing, during the legislative session it might be a bit more challenging, but outside of the session periods, Mondays and Fridays are pretty light in the garages.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay.
COMM. TOLLIVER: Yeah, I just don't have control over my calendar, so whatever has to happen. Mondays are usually a lot crazier than

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Fridays.
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CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. Would a Monday work for you?

COMM. HARRINGTON: Uh-huh --
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay.

COMM. HARRINGTON: -- with notice, I can.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: So, can we shoot for adjusting, starting in October, to the third Monday?

MR. FLEISCHHACKER: That's on the 16 th.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Uh-huh. And we can revisit this next month, $I$ promise, just to make sure.

VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: I don't get back from Europe until the 17 th.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: So, you'd miss
that one?
VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Uh-huh.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay.
COMM. JACKSON: This is
Comm. Jackson. That's fine. I'll probably be in

Israel that Monday, but any other Monday would probably be okay on that.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Would it be
better if we start in November, because we've all got September and October pretty much blocked?

COMM. HARRINGTON: Yeah.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. Well,
let's just do that. We will start in November, and that gives us next month to have this conversation one more time as a confirmation.

COMM. HARRINGTON: Okay. So, we move September?

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: We move
September's date.
COMM. HARRINGTON: And we've got October 20th?

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Which we're going to keep for now --

COMM. HARRINGTON: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: -- okay? You'll
be on the phone, I'm sure. That's fine.
We're just going to try to take this day
by day. Changing a longstanding meeting time
that you've had blocked for a long time sometimes can be hard. We'll take it with some grace.

Do we have -- so, do we have anything else for the announcements?
(No response.)

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: It doesn't look like we have anyone for public comment.

COMM. HARRINGTON: Well, I do have something to share. On August 31st at Ivy Tech from 9:00 to 3:00, there'll be a Diversity Outreach, and they call it a reverse trade show, in partnership with the airport and the City of Indianapolis, to try to create opportunities. So, all of the upcoming opportunities from the City, there are different entities that require state certification, the universities that will be there, so for any businesses looking to partner with minority-, women- or veteran-owned businesses, it would be a great opportunity to come out, or anyone trying to network with companies that have programs.

VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: How many companies do you anticipate being there?

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COMM. HARRINGTON: I think they said over 25 companies. So, the City will be there, but they'll have all of the different departments --
VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Okay.
COMM. HARRINGTON: -- and then the airport, so their attendees, they're anticipating between two to four hundred, so it just depends on how -- organizations double up with how many people they actually bring to the venue. VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Which campus?
COMM. HARRINGTON: The -- I think the Ivy Tech Culinary Building.
VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Yeah. Okay.
COMM. HARRINGTON: So, I don't know which campus they call it, but \(I\) know --
VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Okay.
COMM. HARRINGTON: -- everyone calls
it the Culinary Building.
CHAIRPERSON SLASH: It's a really
good event. I like that.
COMM. HARRINGTON: Uh-huh. Yeah,
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we're partnering. We're doing three events at
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1:00, because there are so many opportunities right now, were trying to have one -- a one-stop for primes and subs right now.

And then $I$ don't know if IDOA has
communicated their date, but they'll have another event at the state that all of us will support within two months after that, so --

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Thank you.
COMM. HARRINGTON: Uh-huh.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: AnY other
announcements?
(No response.)

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. Hearing
none, $I$ don't believe we have anyone here for public comment.
