Purpose

This technical standard operating procedure (TSOP) describes the method for collecting benthic macroinvertebrate communities through a multi-habitat (MHAB) collection procedure using a D-frame dipnet. Specifically, this TSOP covers the processes of:

- Preparation for sample collection
- Sample collection method
- Sample preservation
- Completion of associated datasheets and chain of custody
- Sample delivery

Macroinvertebrate samples are collected during low flow, from July 15 to November 15. The macroinvertebrate samples are processed and identified in the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) laboratory located at 2525 North Shadeland Avenue, Indianapolis, Indiana (Shadeland). Macroinvertebrates are bioindicators, facilitating the "Weight of Evidence" approach to interpretation of biomonitoring results as recommended by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA).

Scope

This TSOP applies to agency staff in the IDEM Office of Water Quality (OWQ), Watershed Assessment and Planning Branch (WAPB) responsible for collecting macroinvertebrate community samples from rivers and streams.



1.0. Overview Flowchart




2.0. Procedure

2.1. Procedural Flowchart

Step 1–4 procedural flowcharts are shown in Section 2.2, followed by the step-by-step description.

2.2. Procedural Steps

Step 1. Preparation for sample collection



A. The field crew drives to the designated parking spot, as described on the Site Reconnaissance Form (Appendix 9.3),

using a combination of the Indiana Atlas & Gazetteer, aerial maps (Appendix 9.1), topographic maps (Appendix 9.2), and a handheld global positioning system (GPS) unit.


B. The crew chief:


- 1. Affixes the appropriate site folder, containing the Stream Sampling Field Data Sheet (Appendix 9.4); Qualitative Habitat Evaluation Index (QHEI) (Appendix 9.5); Site Reconnaissance Form (Appendix 9.3); and site maps, to the clipboard.
- 2. Affixes the Scientific Purpose License; Photographic Image Chain of Custody (Appendix 9.6); and OWQ Chain of Custody (Appendix 9.7) to the clipboard.
- 3. Using the Multi-habitat (MHAB) Macroinvertebrate Sampling Checklist (Appendix 9.8), ensures all the equipment necessary to conduct macroinvertebrate sampling is present and stored in the backpack for transportation to the sampling site.
- C. Using the handheld GPS unit and the Site Reconnaissance Form, the crew chief and field crew proceed to the sampling site with the clipboard, backpacks, and any other equipment required to complete the sampling.
- D. Upon arrival at the sampling site, the crew chief determines if the site can be sampled. In order to be sampled, water must be present in 50% of the stream reach (e.g., 25-30 meters). In addition to water being present in 50% of the reach, if flow is greatly reduced, as seen in higher gradient streams, there must be interstitial flow between substrate that connects pools. If the site cannot be sampled, proceed to Step 1.E. If the site can be sampled, proceed to Step 1.F.
- E. If the site cannot be sampled:
 - 1. The crew chief completes the following portions of the Stream Sampling Field Data Sheet:
 - a. Sample Collectors
 - b. Date
 - c. Time
 - d. Check one of the following boxes under "Sample Taken?":
 - i. Stream Dry
 - ii. Owner Refused Access
 - iii. Frozen

- iv. Other (Describe the reason the sample could not be collected in the "Special Notes" area of the Stream Sampling Field Data Sheet).
- e. Take digital photographs to illustrate why the site was rejected, using a digital handheld camera or field phone camera. The photograph is labeled with a three-digit U.S. EPA site identification number; the reason for rejection (e.g., dry, frozen, etc.); initials of the photographer; and date as MMDDYY (i.e., 001 DRY MCO 061522) on the Photographic Image Chain of Custody. No photograph is necessary when reason for rejection is "owner refused access". The photographs' metadata will be recorded on the Photographic Image Chain of Custody.
- 2. Make an entry for the site in the field notebook (Appendix 9.9) with the reason the site was not sampled.
- 3. The crew chief and field crew return to the vehicle. If time allows travel to the next site and repeat the process starting with Step 1.A.

F. If the site can be sampled:

- The field crew takes digital photographs of upstream and downstream stream reaches and the sampling area, using a digital handheld camera or field phone camera. The photograph is labeled with a three-digit U.S. EPA site identification number; the direction of flow, upstream (US) or downstream (DS); initials of the photographer; and date as MMDDYY (i.e., 001 US MCO 061522) on the Photographic Image Chain of Custody.
- 2. The photographs' metadata are recorded on the Photographic Image Chain of Custody.
- 3. Abnormalities that may be affecting water quality such as algal blooms, dead fish, or modifications to the bank or stream are photographed and noted in the "Special Notes" area of the Stream Sampling Field Data Sheet.
- G. Prior to the field collection of macroinvertebrates, *in-situ* water chemistry parameters are measured with a data sonde and a water sample for turbidity is collected (IDEM 2020). This information is recorded on the Stream Sampling Field Data Sheet.





- A. The crew chief may designate a member of the field crew to collect and subsample the macroinvertebrate sample. The designated field crew must be qualified, through training or experience, to lead a crew on their own.
 - 1. The sample collector defines a stream reach of 50 meters upstream and 50 meters downstream of the sampling point, using a tape measure or rangefinder.
 - 2. Within the 100-meter reach, the sample collector visually surveys the instream and surrounding riparian habitat on both shores of the stream reach.
 - Using best professional judgment, the sample collector measures a 50-meter section of stream habitat potentially yielding the most diverse macroinvertebrate sample. The most productive habitat types in a stream are root wads, woody debris, and riffle-run-pool complexes.
 - 4. Note: Avoid collecting samples within 100 meters of bridges or including major adjoining tributaries within the sample reach, if possible (Barbour et al. 1999).

- B. The sample collector selects the highest quality, wadeable riffle within the 50-meter stream reach. If a riffle is not:
 - Present within this reach, then a riffle located no more than 15 times the stream's wetted width (to a maximum of 500 meters) from the sample point may be sampled.
 - Available within 15 times the stream's wetted width, locate the highest quality wadeable run or glide habitat within this section of the stream.

C. The sample collector:

- Places the D-frame dipnet into the water at the base of the riffle, or the downstream area of the riffle/run habitat. The flat end of the D-frame dipnet must be placed securely onto the substrate so there are no gaps under the frame.
- 2. Disturbs (by kicking) the riffle/run substrate 0.3 meters (e.g., 1 foot) directly in front of the D-frame dipnet causing the stream's current to carry any dislodged macroinvertebrates into the net.
- Moves upstream through the riffle/run for 3.3 meters (e.g., 10 feet), continuously disturbing the substrate in front of the D-frame dipnet. The process provides a sample roughly equivalent to one square meter of riffle/run habitat.
- The sample collector disturbs the stream substrate and sweeps the D-frame dipnet through the water column above the substrate to collect dislodged macroinvertebrates.
- 5. The riffle/run kick portion of the MHAB sample is timed and should be completed in 60 seconds.

D. The sample collector:

- Inspects the contents of the D-frame dipnet after the riffle/run kick is completed. Cobble and large sticks are visually inspected with any attached macroinvertebrates returned to the net. The debris items are discarded. Any freshwater mussels (Unionidae) should be removed from the D-frame dipnet and carefully replaced in the stream.
- 2. Empties the riffle/run kick sample from the D-frame dipnet into a 10-liter plastic bucket half-filled with ambient water.

E. The sample collector:


1. Begins the 50-meter sweep sample at the downstream end of the selected stream reach.

- Using best professional judgement, samples all available habitats (rootwads, emergent vegetation, woody debris, depositional zones with coarse particulate matter, leaf packs, sandy and silty substrates, and cobble and gravel substrates) in relative proportion to their occurrence in the 50-meter stream reach.
- 3. Sweeps the D-frame net over and into the habitat so that macroinvertebrates are dislodged into the water column.
- 4. Then sweeps the D-frame dipnet through the water column above the disturbed habitat two or three times to collect the dislodged macroinvertebrates.
- 5. Conducts about 20 to 25 sweeps at roughly 2- to 2.5-meter intervals for the entire length of the 50-meter stream reach.

F. The sample collector:

- Inspects the contents of the net after the sweep sample is completed. Cobble and large sticks are visually inspected with any attached macroinvertebrates returned to the net. The debris items are then discarded.
 - Note: Any freshwater mussels (Unionidae) should be removed from the net and carefully replaced in the stream.
- 2. Empties the sweep sample contents from the D-frame net into the 10-liter plastic bucket in which the riffle/run kick sample was deposited.

Step 2. Field Subsampling of Macroinvertebrate Sample



A. The sample collector:

- 1. Removes and visually inspects any cobble, large gravel, woody debris, or large leaves that are in the 10-liter plastic sample bucket.
- 2. Uses forceps to remove macroinvertebrates and place them into the white plastic tray.
- 3. Pulls apart any large clumps of filamentous algae to dislodge any attached macroinvertebrates.
- 4. Discards the debris items, after inspection.

B. The sample collector:

- 1. Agitates the sample bucket contents by hand.
- 2. Pours the water through a U.S. Standard No. 35 sieve, stopping before any sand is poured into the sieve.
- 3. Empties the sieve contents into the white plastic tray after each pour.
- 4. Uses a separate 10-liter bucket to refill the sample bucket with ambient water that is free of macroinvertebrates.
- 5. Repeats elutriations a minimum of five times.
- 6. Continues elutriating until the water pouring through the sieve is clear and free of silt.

C. The sample collector:

- Removes and visually inspects any remaining sand, leaves, or fine gravel in the sample bucket.
- 2. Uses forceps to remove macroinvertebrates and places them into the white plastic tray.
- 3. Debris items are discarded, after inspection.


D. The sample collector:

- 1. Uses forceps to individually pick macroinvertebrates from the white plastic tray depositing them into a 250 ml sample container prefilled with 80% isopropyl alcohol.
- 2. A second 250 ml sample container is used for larger macroinvertebrates such as crayfish or dobsonflies (Megaloptera), if they are numerous in the sample.
- 3. Picks macroinvertebrates from the white sample tray for 15 minutes, which may be timed by the crew chief or a member of the field crew, using a timing device.
- 4. Attempts to collect a macroinvertebrate subsample with the greatest potential diversity of macroinvertebrate taxa reflecting the relative abundance of macroinvertebrates in the entire sample.

E. The sample collector:

- 1. Creates sample labels from Rite in the Rain paper.
- 2. Inserts a label into each 250 ml sample container. Sample labels are written using a lead pencil and include:
 - a. Stream name
 - b. AIMS sample number
 - c. Macroinvertebrate sample number
 - d. EPA Site ID number
 - e. Date
 - f. Sample collector's initials
 - g. Any other pertinent information.
- 3. The same information is written on a piece of white label tape affixed to the top of each 250 ml sample container using a Sharpie or other permanent pen. "1 of 2" and "2 of 2" are also included on the sample container labels, if multiple containers were used for the sample (see Step 3.D.).

Step 3. Cleanup, paperwork, and sample delivery



- A. The sample collector completes the QHEI form for the site. See IDEM 2023 for instructions on how to fill out the QHEI form.
- B. The crew chief completes the OWQ chain of custody including the following:
 - 1. Macroinvertebrate sample number

- 2. AIMS sample number (e.g., AA#####, AB#####, AC#####, etc.)
- 3. Number of sample containers
- 4. Date and time the sample was collected.
- C. The crew chief fills out an entry in the field notebook containing the following:
 - 1. The same information found on the sample labels.
 - 2. If a riffle/run kick portion of the sample was collected.
 - 3. The area of the stream where the 50-meter sweep sample was collected relative to the sample point.
 - Any other pertinent information such as modifications made to the sample method or the presence and species (if known) of any freshwater mussels (Unionidae) encountered.
- D. The crew chief checks to ensure that all macroinvertebrate samples are properly labeled, all site forms are completed, and all sampling equipment is stored in the backpacks. The crew chief and field crew leave the site and navigate to field vehicle's parking location.

Crew members will decontaminate field equipment using a 3% bleach solution following each sampling run or between sampling sites any time:

- 1. Equipment is being used in a different 8-digit Hydrologic Unit Code (HUC).
- 2. Viruses (e.g., viral hemorrhagic septicemia (VHS)) have been detected in the area.

Crew members will decontaminate field equipment using only a 3% bleach solution following each sampling run or between sampling sites any time when entering Indiana Department of Natural Resources interested lands or National Parks.

- E. Upon arrival at the field vehicle, the crew chief adds additional 80% isopropyl alcohol to the macroinvertebrate sample containers, depending on the amount of organic material in the sample container.
- F. The crew chief determines if there is sufficient time remaining to complete another macroinvertebrate sample.
 - 1. If there is sufficient time remaining, return to Step 1 to repeat the process.
 - 2. If there is not sufficient time in the day to collect another macroinvertebrate sample or all macroinvertebrate

samples for the project have been collected, the crew chief and field crew will return to their field lodgings or to the IDEM Shadeland office.

2.3. Related Technical Issues

- A. Health and Safety Warnings
 - Safety issues are the responsibility of all crew members; however, any questions in the field should be directed to the crew chief. The crew chief is responsible for the completion of all work listed in the TSOP, the health and safety aspects of the sampling event, and successful interactions with landowners and members of the public.
 - a. Sampling will be postponed, if the stream flow is dangerous for staff to enter, any hazardous weather conditions exist, or unexpected physical barriers prevent access to the site. Unexpected physical barriers could include an impassable log jam, fence, or physical installations; and domestic and wildlife dangers. Flow is considered dangerous at flood stages, so staff will use best professional judgement following or during a highwater event. Staff will use current USGS website (https://waterwatch.usgs.gov/?m=real&r=in&w=map) water data, daily streamflow condition readings to determine whether the discharge rate is elevated too far from median flow to sample. Typically, streamflow discharge in the 75th percentile or greater would be considered too high to sample. Since stream gage stations are not on all streams and rivers, especially headwater streams, staff may travel to sites and use best professional judgement to determine whether sample collection at the site will occur.
 - 2. Due to the remoteness of the sampling sites and the possibility of a medical emergency, all field staff are required to complete basic first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation training.
 - 3. New hires or those changing job responsibilities, without the minimum four-hour training, must be accompanied in the field by a staff member who has met the requirements of the branch health and safety training. According to the memorandum "Change in status of Water Assessment Branch staff in accordance with the Agency training policy" dated November 29, 2010, OWQ WAPB staff are exempt from initial and annual training requirements set forth in Section 6.0 of IDEM Health and Safety Training Policy (IDEM 2010). The memorandum also states, "as an alternative to

- the training requirements of the policy, the Branch will conduct inservice training at a minimum of four hours per year on topics directly related to duties performed by staff."
- 4. Due to the remoteness of sampling sites and the possibility of a medical emergency, sampling on surface waters requires increased safety consciousness of staff members. The use of specialized equipment is also required. Thus, staff will comply with the IDEM Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) Policy (IDEM 2008). If an injury or illness arises in the field, staff will follow the IDEM Injury and/or Illness Resulting from Occupational Exposure Policy (IDEM 2016).
- 5. To prevent drowning during sample collection, personnel will wear appropriate clothing and PPE when operating boats or sampling in deep water or swift currents. According to the memorandum "Use of Personal Flotation Devices (PFDs) by Branch Personnel" dated February 29, 2000, staff must wear U.S. Coast Guard approved Type I, II, or III PFDs whenever:
 - a. Planned work requires them to enter the water and the maximum water depth at any place at the work site is over their knee. Note that this depth depends on the staff, but it will usually be between 12 to 20 inches or 300 to 500 mm.
 - b. Staff is in a watercraft of any kind that is being launched, is in the water, or is being retrieved from the water.
 - c. Staff must work from structures that do not possess guard rails and are over or alongside water where the water depth is, or could reasonably be expected to be, 3 feet or more.
- 6. Additional requirements to prevent drowning are required, when work is being done in boats on boundary waters as defined by Indiana Code IC-14-8-2-27 or between sunset and sunrise on any waters of the state. All personnel in the watercraft must wear a high intensity whistle and Safety of Life at Sea (SOLAS) certified strobe light.
- 7. Field personnel collecting *in-situ* water chemistry measurements and macroinvertebrate MHAB samples will follow policies and procedures in the Water Chemistry Field Sampling Procedures (IDEM 2020), the IDEM Hazard Communication (HazCom) Plan (IDEM 2019), and Office of Water Quality Watershed Assessment and Planning Branch Laboratory Safety Plan (IDEM 2021).

- 8. Before using isopropyl alcohol, review the Safety Data Sheet (SDS, Fisher Scientific, 2003) stored in the macroinvertebrate laboratory in the IDEM Shadeland office and be sure to wear required PPE.
 - a. Isopropyl alcohol poses the following health hazards:
 - i. Combustible liquid
 - ii. Harmful to eyes, skin, and internal organs. Suspected of causing genetic defects
 - iii. May cause cancer (International Agency for Research on Cancer Group 1 carcinogen)
 - iv. Harmful to aquatic life
 - b. Required PPE:
 - i. Chemical resistant latex or nitrile gloves
 - ii. Protective eyewear (safety glasses or goggles)
 - iii. Face shield
- 9. Per recommendations of the IDEM Health and Safety office (IDEM 2010), when heat index temperatures reach 100°F, field work should be reduced to a 50% work /50% rest schedule. Heat index temperatures above 105°F require suspension of field work, until heat index temperatures decrease to below 105°F.
- 10. Due to the hazards presented by thorns, nettles, poison ivy, contaminants in the water, and from abrasions that may result from boulders and logs in the stream, all field crew members should wear chest or hip waders when conducting field sampling activities.
- 11. Bleach hazards and safety:
 - a. Review the appropriate SDS before working with bleach and use appropriate PPE (safety glasses and gloves).
 - b. 1:32 dilution (bleach:water) for 3% solution using 6% concentration of household bleach.
 - c. Vapor may cause severe irritation or damage to eyes and skin.
 - d. Harmful if swallowed.
 - e. Corrodes metals.
 - f. Will fade colors and break down cloth fibers.
 - g. If in an opaque container, diluted bleach will last 1 month.
 - h. If exposed to sunlight or air, it will only last 5 days.
 - i. Keep out of lakes, streams, or ponds; stand at least 50 meters from any natural water source.

B. Cautions

- The collection of large amounts of organic debris or sand in the Dframe dipnet bag should be avoided as it will slow down the elutriation and picking process.
- 2. Tears or holes in the D-frame dipnet bag may allow macroinvertebrates to escape, potentially biasing the results. Inspect the D-frame dipnet bag for tears or holes after each sample has been collected. Immediately repair any small tears with a strong suturing material (such as fishing line) or replace the entire net bag if the holes are numerous or large.
- 3. Always ensure that the sample identification numbers are recorded correctly and match on all sample labels, forms, and field notebook entries.
- 4. Failure to adequately preserve the sample may result in degradation of the organisms. Sample containers should be filled to at least two-thirds full of 80% isopropyl alcohol prior to the addition of any specimens. Samples containing a large amount of organic material, snails, non-unionid freshwater mussels (Cyrenidae, Sphaeriidae Dreissenidae), or crayfish will require the use of a second container specifically for the larger organisms. Preservative may also need to be replaced upon return to the laboratory and prior to long-term storage.

C. Interferences

- Heavy rains (more than one inch) may scour the stream substrate and remove many macroinvertebrates or force them to take refuge deeper in the substrate. If a sample is collected immediately after the rain event, poor quality sample will result. A minimum period of two weeks after a potential scouring event should be allowed for natural macroinvertebrate recolonization.
- 2. Organisms should be removed from the tray singly, if possible, during the 15-minute pick to avoid "scooping" of multiple organisms and potential bias of sample results.
- 3. Streams where the channel is reduced to interstitial flow between a series of pools; streams with a deep U- or bowl-shaped channel; and larger nonwadable rivers may not provide habitat which will result in a representative sample from collection of a 1-minute kick sample. In these instances, the sample will only consist of a 50-meter sweep of all available habitat.

4. If the predetermined sample point is located on a section of the stream that is currently dry or inaccessible, then the sample point may be moved to an accessible section of the stream containing water, if the new section is within 15 times the average wetted width of the stream from the location of the original sample point. Adjusting the sample point should only be done if the resulting sample location provides similar habitat to what would have been at the actual point. The rationale for such modification and the area of the stream sampled should be described in the field notebook and on the site drawing in the QHEI.

D. Calibration

- 9. Transfers MHAB samples to lab custodian.

B. Field crew members

- 1. Complete macroinvertebrate MHAB sampling training.
- 2. Complete *in-situ* water chemistry measurements training.
- 3. Complete boat safety and operation training.
- 4. Prepare for sample collection.
- 5. Collect macroinvertebrates in the field.
- 6. Subsample macroinvertebrates in the field.
- 7. Complete QHEI form.
- 8. Collect and record *in-situ* water chemistry measurements.
- 9. Complete field datasheets and chain-of-custody forms.

C. Lab custodian

- Receives the macroinvertebrate MHAB samples from the crew chief.
- 2. Places samples in storage in IDEM Shadeland macroinvertebrate laboratory (Room 125).

5.0 Records Management

5.1. Site Reconnaissance Form

- A. The original hard copy is kept in the site folder and stored in a file cabinet in the WAPB library at the IDEM Shadeland office. A copy is made for crew chief and field crew to navigate to the sampling location.
- B. Information recorded on the Site Reconnaissance Form is entered into the AIMS database.
- C. The original hard copy is retained until it is scanned and uploaded to AIMS database or the Virtual File Cabinet (VFC), after which it will be recycled.

5.2. Stream Sampling Field Data Sheet

- A. After the sampling trip is scheduled in the AIMS database, the Stream Sampling Field Data Sheet will be printed on Rite-in-the-Rain paper and placed in each sampling site folder.
- B. Information recorded on the Stream Sampling Field Data Sheet is entered into the AIMS database, followed by quality control (QC) on the data entered by two WAPB staff members. The final QC will be performed by a full-time WAPB staff member experienced with *in-situ* water chemistry data.
- C. The original hard copy is retained until it is scanned and uploaded to AIMS database or VFC, after which it will be recycled.

5.3. OWQ Biological QHEI (Qualitative Habitat Evaluation Index)

- A. Blank QHEI datasheets will be copied onto Rite-in-the-Rain paper and placed in each sampling site folder.
- B. Information recorded on the QHEI form is entered into the AIMS database, followed by QC on the data entered by two WAPB staff members. The final QC will be performed by a full-time WAPB staff member experienced with QHEI data.
- C. The original hard copy is retained until it is scanned and uploaded to AIMS database or VFC, after which it will be recycled.

5.4. Original Photographic Image Chain of Custody Form

- A. Blank photographic image chain of custody forms will be copied onto Rite-in-the-Rain paper for crew chief and crew members to complete in the field.
- B. After completion of weekly field sampling activities, the original photographic image chain of custody is used to properly label the digital photos. Downloaded digital photos are renamed in the following format: YY### + direction or subject matter + initials of photographer (for example: 18001 US PDM) and are stored at the following location: S:\IGCN\OWQ\WSP\OWM\RANDOM\Corvallis2023\Site Photos

- NOTE: "Corvallis2023" can be changed to the current project/year in which field sampling activities are being conducted.
- C. The original hard copy is retained until it is scanned and uploaded to AIMS database or VFC, after which it will be recycled.

5.5. OWQ Chain of Custody Form

- A. Blank OWQ chain of custody forms will be copied onto Rite-in-the-Rain paper for crew chief and crew members to complete in the field.
- B. After completion of weekly field sampling activities, the OWQ Chain of Custody Form is used by the laboratory custodian to check in samples prior to long-term storage.
- C. After macroinvertebrate samples have been checked in and stored, the OWQ Chain of Custody Form is scanned into a pdf format and renamed in the following format: MMDDYYYY + crew chief's initials + Field COC (for example: 07152018 PDM Field COC). The file is saved at the following location:
 - S:\IGCN\OWQ\WSP\OWM\RANDOM\Corvallis2023\Chain of Custody\Field Chain of Custody
 - Note: "Corvallis2023" can be changed to the current project/year in which field sampling activities are being conducted.
- D. The original hard copy is retained until it is scanned and uploaded to AIMS database or VFC, after which it will be recycled.

5.6. Field notebook

- A. After completion of weekly field sampling activities, the field notebook entries for the week are scanned into a pdf format and renamed in the following format: MMDDYYYY + crew chief's initials + Macro Field Notebook (for example: 07152018 PDM Macro Field Notebook). The file is saved at the following location:
 - S:\IGCN\OWQ\WSP\OWM\RANDOM\Corvallis2023\Chain of Custody\Field Notebook
 - Note: "Corvallis2023" can be changed to the current project/year in which field sampling activities are being conducted.
- B. When not in use, the field notebook is kept in the IDEM Shadeland macroinvertebrate laboratory for review, in perpetuity.

6.0 Definitions

6.1. "AA/AB Number" – Number assigned to each individual watershed sampling event conducted by Indiana Department of Environmental

- Management (IDEM) field crews. This number is used to identify the sampling event in the Assessment Information Management System database (AIMS database).
- 6.2. "Agency staff" Agency staff member who works a regular work schedule, alternative work schedule, or nonstandard work schedule; individual who is employed by the agency on a full-time, part-time, temporary, intermittent, or hourly basis; or an individual who contracts with the agency for personal services.
- 6.3. "Ambient" Surrounding environmental conditions.
- 6.4. "Assessment Information Management System database (AIMS database)" IDEM database containing information related to water chemistry; aquatic habitat; macroinvertebrate, fish, and algae communities; fish tissue analyses; sediments; and E. coli bacteria data collected by agency staff from watershed sampling events.
- 6.5. "Chain of custody (COC)" The records documenting the possession of samples or photographs from the time they are obtained until they are stored, disposed of, or shipped offsite (Appendix 9.6, 9.7).
- 6.6. "Crew chief" The agency staff person who leads a field crew when conducting field sampling activities.
- 6.7. "Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) site ID" The identification number given to the 100 random probabilistic sites drawn yearly. Example: INRB16 001.
- 6.8. "Field crew" The team of agency staff who conducts field sampling activities. Field crews must contain at least one full-time agency staff member from the Probabilistic or Targeted Monitoring Sections in the crew chief position and one or more full-time IDEM staff or Governor's Summer Interns or compensated interns.
- 6.9. "Gazetteer" A geographical dictionary or directory (i.e., listing cities, towns, rivers, mountains, and other geographic features along with the exact location of these features).
- 6.10. "Glide" An area common to most modified stream channels that do not have distinguishable pool, run, and riffle habitats; the current and flow is like that of a canal; the water surface gradient is nearly zero (Ohio EPA 2006).
- 6.11. "Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM)" An agency of Indiana State Government whose mission is to implement federal and state regulations to protect human health and the environment while

- allowing the environmentally sound operations of industrial, agricultural, commercial, and government activities vital to a prosperous economy.
- 6.12. "Macroinvertebrate" Aquatic animals which lack a backbone, are visible without a microscope, and spend some period of their lives in or around water.
- 6.13. "Macroinvertebrate Sample Number" An identification number used to identify a macroinvertebrate sample. The macroinvertebrate sample number is constructed by combining the last two digits of the year, the two digit designation for the month, the two digit designation for the day, the number of the Field Notebook used by the crew leader to record the sampling event, and a two digit number indicating the order in which the current sample was collected on that particular day. For example, the fourth sample collected by the field crew using Field Notebook #3 on July 15, 2018, would read: MHAB 180715304 ("18" =2018, "07" = July, "15" = 15th day of the month, "3" = Field Notebook #3, "04" = fourth sampled collected that day). The macroinvertebrate sample number does not take precedence over the "AA/AB Number".
- 6.14. "Pool" An area of the stream with slow current velocity and a depth greater than riffle and run areas; the stream bed is often concave and stream width frequently is the greatest; the water surface slope is nearly zero (Ohio EPA 2006).
- 6.15. "Quality assurance (QA)" An integrated system of management activities involving planning, implementation, documentation, assessment, reporting, and quality improvement to ensure that a process, item, or service is of the type and quality needed and expected by the client.
- 6.16. "Quality control (QC)" The overall system of technical activities that measures the attributes and performance of a process, item, or service against defined standards to verify that they meet the stated requirements established by the customer; operational techniques and activities that are used to fulfill requirements for quality. In other words, QC involves measuring the "thing produced" against a standard to ensure it is a quality product that meets the identified need.
- 6.17. "Reconnaissance" Obtaining information about a site through visual observations and investigating routes to safely access the site, as well as gathering property owner information and access permission.
- 6.18. "Riffle" The shallow parts of the stream where water flows swiftly over completely or partially submerged pebble to boulder sized rocks to produce surface agitation.

- 6.19. "Run" Area of the stream that has a rapid nonturbulent flow; a run is deeper than a riffle with a faster current velocity than a pool and is generally located downstream from a riffle where the stream narrows; the stream bed is often flat beneath a run and the water surface is not visibly broken (Ohio EPA 2006).
- 6.20. "Safety data sheet (SDS)" A sheet containing data regarding the properties of a particular substance or product. It is information intended to provide workers and emergency personnel with procedures for handling or working with a particular substance or product in a safe manner.
- 6.21. "Site folder" A folder for a specific site that contains all pertinent paperwork concerning the site. Site reconnaissance forms, all field data sheets including those for water chemistry, algal biomass, fish community, macroinvertebrate community, chain of custody forms, etc. are all stored in this folder which is located in a file cabinet in the WAPB office area at the IDEM Shadeland office.
- 6.22. "Site number" The designated program area specific numeral given to an environmental location of interest.
- 6.23. "Site Reconnaissance Form" Form used to gather information such as landowner, equipment needed to complete sampling, and the access route to take to the site (Appendix 9.3).
- 6.24. "Stream reach" A segment of a stream equal in length to 15 times the average wetted width of the stream, with a minimum length of 50 meters and a maximum length of 500 meters.
- 6.25. "Substrate" The material that composes the stream bed.
- 6.26. "Technical standard operating procedure (TSOP)" A standard operating procedure that involves environmental data generation, manipulation, or compilation of an analytical process.
- 6.27. "Virtual File Cabinet (VFC)" The agency's electronic digital image document repository system, that stores, files, indexes, redacts, reassembles, and securely accesses electronic documents of all types both received and created by the various program areas within the agency.

7.0 Quality Assurance and Quality Control

Ten percent of sites sampled for each macroinvertebrate community 7.1. sampling project are resampled to measure the precision (or reproducibility) of the sampling methodology to produce a similar macroinvertebrate assemblage. These duplicate samples are selected before field sampling begins by having the AIMS database randomly create n duplicate samples (where n = 10% of sites rounded to the nearest whole number) for a project. Duplicate samples are collected during the same sampling event as the original sample, by the sample collector using the same equipment. The 50-meter section of stream and riffle area utilized for the duplicate sample are different from those used for the original sample but should feature as similar habitat types and availability as possible. Duplicate samples receive unique AIMS sample numbers and macroinvertebrate sample numbers. The reproducibility of the MHAB sampling method as employed by the sample collector is measured by the Relative Percent Difference (RPD, see Eldin 2011) between the number of macroinvertebrate taxa collected in the normal and duplicate samples where:

$$RPD = \left(\frac{|S-D|}{(S+D)/2}\right) \times 100$$

Where:

S = the number of taxa collected in the original sample D = the number of taxa collected in the duplicate sample

7.2. If the RPD is greater than 25%, corrective action should be taken through calibration of sampling methodology between sample collectors to ensure that sampling methodology is being implemented correctly. The RPD is also calculated for the QHEI scores for each duplicate site which may help to provide an explanation for any observed differences in the RPD for number of collected taxa.




