

## Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) CARES Act Supplemental Funding

Supplemental funding was provided through the CARES Act to Indiana for the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) to prevent, prepare for, or respond to the coronavirus. CSBG aims to lessen poverty in communities and supports services for individuals with low incomes. IHCDA was awarded \$14,558,832.00 in funding. Using Delegated Authority, \$13,102,948.78 was allocated to Community Action Agencies (below).
