Rep. Goodin called the meeting to order at 4:10 p.m. The Committee discussed the following issues: (1) the tax and fee obligations of the racinos; (2) economic development and the horse industry in Indiana; (3) breed development programs; and (4) the distribution of slot machine revenue for horse racing purposes.

I. Racino Taxes and Fees

Mr. John Keeler, an attorney for Hoosier Park Racing and Casino, submitted a Community Impact Report (Exhibit A) detailing the community involvement of Hoosier Park. Mr. Keeler reviewed the statutory tax and fee obligations of the racinos and compared them to

the obligations of the riverboat casinos (Exhibit B). Mr. Keeler noted that the 2009 Gaming Study Committee stated in its final report that the "Committee believes that the inclusion of slot machine revenue set aside for the horse racing industry and included in the calculation of the racino's adjusted gross receipts for purposes of the wagering tax creates a significant difference in the tax structure between the racinos and the riverboat casinos and imposes an undue burden on the racinos...."².

II. Economic Development and the Horse Industry

Dr. Susan Conners, Director/Associate Professor, Equine Business Management at Purdue University, announced that she and her colleagues at Purdue are close to releasing studies of the Indiana horse racing industry and the state's entire equine industry. Dr. Conners expects the studies to show growth in the industries since they were last surveyed in 2003. Dr. Conners noted that the studies have looked at the economic activity of related businesses such as trailer sales.

III. Breed Development Programs

Mr. Eddie Martin, Executive Director of the Indiana Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association (ITOBA), reviewed the material that he submitted to the Committee at the September 20 meeting.³ The Committee discussed with Mr. Martin the ITOBA's opposition to the IHRC's Quality of Racing initiative. Mr. Martin testified that because of changes to the financial incentives within the thoroughbred breed development program, the new program will not foster economic development as well as the supplanted program would have had it been allowed to mature with funding from the racino slot machines.

Mr. John Schuster, General Manager, Indiana Downs, submitted an information packet detailing recent trends in the Indiana horse racing industry (Exhibit C). The Committee and Mr. Schuster discussed whether the old breed development programs should be credited with the recent successes as the new programs only took effect on July 1, 2010. Mr. Schuster noted that everything changed with the availability of slot machine revenue and reaffirmed his support for the new programs.

Mr. Ron McKay, a member of the Indiana Horsemen's Benevolent & Protective Association, submitted information comparing some of the purses and awards he has earned from racing under the new thoroughbred breed development program to the smaller amounts he would have earned for the same results in the old program (Exhibit D).

Mr. Jim Hartman, a member of the Thoroughbred Breed Development Advisory

Committee, testified in opposition to the new thoroughbred breed development program. Mr. Hartman described the importance of the owner's award that has been eliminated from the new program. Mr. Hartman cited the Indiana quarter horse breed development program as a good program that includes an owner's award. Mr. Hartman also suggested that IC 4-35-7-12 allows the IHRC to use even more slot machine revenue for breed development than it is using in the new breed development program. Mr. Hartman also submitted additional written material for the Committee's review (Exhibit E).

IV. The distribution of slot machine revenue for horse racing purposes.

Mr. Jack Holton, Treasurer of the Indiana Standardbred Association, urged the General Assembly to not reduce the amount of slot machine revenue devoted to supporting the horse racing industry. He also noted that the pari-mutuel handle is an important, but often overlooked, factor in developing quality race horses.

Mr. Dwayne Rhule, owner of Lick Creek Stable in Pendleton, Indiana, distributed a one-page document that had been used in the lobbying effort to obtain the approval of slot machines at the tracks (Exhibit F). Mr. Rhule testified that the 15% figure was always a part of the plan and that the amount should not be reduced now. He asserted that a significant reduction in the money devoted to horse racing would devastate the Indiana horse business.

V. Closing remarks


Members of the Committee were given an opportunity to comment on the testimony heard during the Committee's first two meetings. Representatives Austin and Riecken both expressed interest in the findings of the pending Purdue studies. Rep. Eberhart urged his colleagues not to diminish the flexibility of the IHRC. On a similar note, Rep. Austin said that it is not the role of the General Assembly to micromanage the IHRC.

Rep. Cherry is concerned about the lag time between races and the payment of breed development awards, which are now paid at the conclusion of a racing meet. He also expressed his hope that the intent of the General Assembly will be heeded in the implementation of breed development programs. Sen. Steele agreed with Rep. Cherry's remark concerning the importance of adhering to legislative intent.

Rep. Goodin indicated that he is interested in addressing the award payment issue and providing relief to the tracks without shifting the burden to the horsemen.

Rep. Goodin adjourned the meeting at 7:25 p.m.

HISTORY OF HOOSIER PARK RACING & CASINO

Hoosier Park opened its doors as the first pari-mutuel horse racing facility in the state of Indiana on September 1, 1994. Although Churchill Downs was the primary owner of Hoosier Park heading into the final stages of construction in 1994, Pegasus Group, Inc. purchased a substantial amount of stock in the track on February 15, 1994. Pegasus Group, Inc. was later reorganized as Centaur, Inc., which became the sole owner of Hoosier Park in March 2007.

In the spring of 2007, the state of Indiana passed legislation permitting casino gaming at the state's two horse racing tracks. The construction and renovation of Hoosier Park Racing & Casino began in September of 2007. The renovation and construction costs combined totaled more than \$110 million. Hoosier Park Racing & Casino sits on 110 acres and features 2,000 of the latest slots and electronic table games ranging from a penny to \$100 in denominations and a 7/8 mile oval horse track offering live standardbred and thoroughbred racing. Simulcast wagering is also offered year-round.

Today, Hoosier Park Racing & Casino is recognized in the horse racing and casino industries equally for several of its marquee horse racing events and high-energy gaming. The \$200,000 Dan Patch Invitational Pace for older horses is the highlight of the Standardbred season. The race began in 1994 as a \$40,000 event and has grown over the years to include some of the sport's finest names. The casino offers the latest slot and electronic table game technology in the industry. Hoosier Park Racing & Casino is the premier destination for racing, gaming, dining and entertainment and is sure to offer an exhilarating experience like no other in Indiana.

In addition to the Hoosier Park Racing & Casino facility in Anderson, Indiana the track owns and operates three off-track wagering facilities located in Fort Wayne, Indianapolis and Merrillville, Indiana. Each facility is open year round – providing racing fans with a local destination in those areas for all of the top horse racing action in the nation.






- Hoosier Park Racing & Casino is owned and operated by Centaur Gaming, Inc. based in Indianapolis, Indiana. The fully integrated racing, gaming, dining and entertainment destination opened on June 2, 2008 as Indiana's first race track casino.




- Hoosier Park Racing & Casino's direct project investment totaled more than \$360 million which includes more than \$110 million for construction costs and a \$250 million state license fee. As of May 31, 2010, Hoosier Park Racing & Casino has provided to the City of Anderson, Madison County, the State of Indiana and the Indiana Horse Racing Industry more than \$450 million in taxes, fees and incentive payments.
- Hoosier Park Racing & Casino has made \$54 million in purchases from local and regional suppliers and \$23 million in procurements came from minority and women business enterprises.
- Through local payroll, purchases and payments to city and county government, Hoosier Park Racing & Casino has infused more than \$129 million into the local economy in just the first two years of operation. This total does not include increased local spending from the Hoosier Park employee base or the increase in tourism to the Anderson/Madison county area.

- Hoosier Park Racing & Casino currently employs more than 1,000 team members (700 added with the commencement of casino operations), who have earned more than \$61 million in salaries, wages, benefits and tips since the casino opening. The employee base is comprised of 51% females and 18% minorities (almost double the Madison County minority population percentage).
- Admissions to Hoosier Park Racing & Casino reached more than 6 million with an estimated 70% of visitation originating from outside Madison County, Indiana. This is a testament to the major influx of tourism generated as a result of the casino's opening, which has been providing material direct and indirect benefits to the entire community. In 2009, the Anderson/Madison Visitors and Convention Bureau commissioned a tourism survey through Certec, Inc. of Lexington, Kentucky and found that Hoosier Park Racing & Casino's tourism impact on the local economy exceeded \$50 million in its first year of operation.
- Hoosier Park Racing & Casino is committed to meeting and exceeding mandated responsible gaming requirements. Hoosier Park proactively institutes policies, training and careful procedures for responding to potential gambling problem issues.
- Hoosier Park Racing & Casino is a responsible corporate citizen with contributions to more than 200 local and regional organizations. In addition, the management team serves on the boards of more than 30 area organizations.



LOCATION AND INVESTMENT



Located less than one mile off Interstate 69's Exit 26 in Anderson, Indiana, Hoosier Park Racing & Casino provides a fully integrated racing, gaming, dining and entertainment experience spanning 172,000 square feet. Hoosier Park Racing & Casino's direct project investment totals more than \$360 million dollars.

In addition to a full renovation of the existing racetrack facility, more than \$110 million was invested in the expansion of Hoosier Park Racing & Casino, along with a \$250 million gaming license fee payment to the State of Indiana.

Hoosier Park Racing & Casino is maintaining its commitment to purchase from local and Minority and Women Business Enterprise (M/WBE) vendors. As of June 30, 2010, more than \$90 million in qualifying purchases have been made of which \$54 million have been from regional and local suppliers. Of our total ongoing purchases, \$11 million have been from MBE vendors and \$12 million from WBE vendors.

In two years of operation, Hoosier Park Racing & Casino has hosted more than 6 million visitors, which has provided direct and indirect benefits to the entire community including increased hotel, restaurant, entertainment, shopping and other revenues. Hoosier Park Racing & Casino is proud to be a part of the endeavors made by the Anderson/Madison County Visitors and Convention Bureau (VCB) to expand area tourism. The Anderson/Madison County VCB commissioned a tourism survey in 2009 through Certec, Inc. of Lexington, Kentucky and found that Hoosier Park Racing & Casino's tourism impact on the local economy exceeded \$50 million in the first year of full operation. This increase in tourism dollars was a 47% increase from the previous year when Hoosier Park Racing & Casino was not in full operation.

Efforts will continue at Hoosier Park Racing & Casino to increase leisure tourism, motor coach traffic, expand meeting and convention services and promote itself as an entertainment destination across the Midwest.

All one needs to do is check out the parking lots at Hoosier Park to realize that significant numbers of people are coming here, especially on weekends.








OUR COMMITMENT TO RESPONSIBLE GAMING

At Hoosier Park, we recognize our responsibility to ensure that casino gaming serves as an entertainment alternative for responsible adults. We take a highly proactive approach to the identification and prevention of problem and underage gambling, and give special attention to all associated programs.

We have adapted the extensive internal policies and programs dealing with problem and underage gambling from the Indiana Gaming Commission, and are actively enforcing these programs to raise employee awareness regularly with events such as seminars for supervisors conducted by nationally recognized experts in this field. Responsible gaming awareness information is included in our employee handbook and is a key component in the orientation program required of each new employee.

As required by Indiana rules, we display the Indiana Division of Mental Health's toll-free number at our casino entrances and display posters promoting responsible gaming throughout the casino and other public areas of our facility. Beyond those requirements, we have developed printed materials that will provide information for those seeking assistance. These brochures are available at many locations on our property and may be obtained from employees in the casino. We voluntarily include the Indiana Division of Mental Health toll-free number and other telephone help lines in many advertising and marketing materials.

We have implemented the Indiana statewide voluntary self-exclusion program. This program is administered by the Indiana Gaming Commission and enables individuals who feel they may have a gambling disorder to exclude themselves from gambling at Indiana riverboats and race track casinos. Participants sign a statement banning them from the casino area of our facility and other Indiana casino facilities. Subsequently, any attempts made by these individuals to enter may result in their arrest for trespassing.

We are active members of the Indiana Council on Problem Gambling. This council has programs in place for referral of patrons and employees who request assistance. Additionally, we have developed relationships with local agencies offering programs designed to treat gambling disorders.




Indiana TB Breed Development \$ (Purses & Awards)




Indiana-Bred Registered Foals




Indiana Registered Mares






Distribution % Indiana-Bred vs. Open

Letter to IHRC 12/1/08:

“Indiana Maiden Special Weight purses must be in the \$27,000 to \$30,000 minimum and . . .NW2 and NW3 races should be \$30-32K and \$32-35K to create the necessary demand to drive the economic impact of the breeding industry.”

. . . these purse levels are the bare minimum needed to jump start the economic impact of the breeding industry.”

Letter to Breed Development 1/8/09:

“It is my opinion the minimum purse level for a Maiden Special Weight Indiana-bred race . . . be \$30K in 2009. I believe this is the minimum amount needed to create a demand for Indiana-bred horses at the race track and the commercial sales.”

“In order to keep your breed development budgets in line, you may need to modify the owners award for allowances to 10% of the total purse . . . “

“an owner of an Indiana-bred horse that wins three allowance level races will earn \$66,150 under my scenario.”

E-mail to Joe Gorajec 3/5/09:

“Let’s look at Pennsylvania . . . from the low (foal crop) of 873 in 2002 to 1235 (in 2007) is a 43% increase.”

“In comparison to PA, we don’t have the scale of revenues, race dates or racing opportunities and they have not reached a 50% increase since slots passed.”

“The state I have reviewed where there was a 100% increase in a foal crop with the addition of slots, and has been maintained is Louisiana. And we don’t have anywhere near the scale of their slots, race dates, or number of tracks, and nor does PA.”

“Our projections for (2-year old) foal crops based upon registered mares are for 424 in 2010, a 33% increase and 533 in 2011, a 67% increase. The earliest we could have a 100% increase is 2012, and frankly, the awards in the program we submitted do not have the scale to influence beyond 2011 levels. If we increased beyond the mid five hundreds as a crop, I would be very surprised.

. . . They will review the scale of the potential awards and not see purses double, as the media seems to believe should happen, and they will not come back . . . we don’t expect to go beyond our 2004 and 2005 crops.”

JIM HARTMAN – BREED DEVELOPMENT

The Blood-Horse

“Without getting too complicated, there was a clause in the slots law creating an annual cap that few knew existed, and Indiana Downs didn’t plan accordingly.”

“They had originally planned on having a much bigger purse amount.”

“I think they’re trying to manage the purse account from what they thought they were going to have.”

“If there were two-plus months of revenue that would not be available for the Standardbred meet, I’m assuming they would have some lower purses.”

“So they have multiple issues – less revenue than they (Indiana Downs) thought, and they have to pay back \$3.3 million by July 1.”

Facts:

- Jim Hartman is wrong on every count
- Indiana Downs did plan accordingly
- We correctly identified our purse amount available
- Indiana Downs implemented a **30%** purse increase
- Standardbred purses were **not** lower – they may be increasing
- Indiana Downs paid back \$5.86 million, not \$3.3 million





Average for USA and Canada: \$16,067

---In 2009, the average purse earnings for a thoroughbred in the US and Canada in 2009 was \$16,067.

--- In 2009, the average purse earnings for an Indiana-bred were 20% below the overall average at \$12,804. The 2009 average purse earnings for an Indiana-bred were actually an increase of 29.6% from the 2008 report. Per Shannon Sluce, Communications Coordinator at The Jockey Club, the 2008 average purse earnings for an Indiana-bred was \$9,880.

---Prior to their elimination, an Owner Award of 20% of the total purse was paid directly to the owner of the winning horse

--- If owner awards paid in 2009 (\$1,703,113 Source: IHRC 2009 Annual Report) were included as purse earnings, which The Jockey Club does not do for any state-bred awards, the average earnings for an Indiana-bred would increase to a still below average of \$14,735.

---Other 2009 averages: Florida, \$17,389; New York, \$18,203; Ontario, \$22,477; Pennsylvania, \$17,456; Maryland, \$16,663; New Jersey, \$19,903; Virginia, \$19,210.


*Using a 12 horse field, the net to all owners taking into consideration jockey mount fees and trainer commission is \$25,815 with Option A. The net to all owners in Option B is reduced by \$1,125 to \$24,690.

---Option A illustrates a purse with a 20% owner award (\$5,000) paid directly to the winning owner. A \$5,000 owner award paid directly to an owner has the net effect of \$10,417 in purse money.

---Option B eliminates the owner award and places the award into the purse.

---The concept behind Option B was proposed by the IHRC Staff to be put in place for the 2011 racing season, and was ultimately implemented for the Hoosier Park meet in 2010.

Indiana Downs Maiden Special Weight Purses - Open vs. Restricted



---Prior to the slot revenues beginning in mid-2008, the thoroughbred breed development fund was an “add on” program, adding incentives on top of the purses provided by the horsemen’s purse account. The River Boat Tax allocation to purses and to the thoroughbred breed development fund, which was determined by an Indiana Horse Racing Commission decision, was 67% to purses and 33% to the thoroughbred breed development fund. The slot legislation changed this allocation to approximately 60% to purses and 40% to the thoroughbred breed development fund.

IC 4-31-11

Chapter 11. Breed Development Advisory Committees and Breed Development Funds

IC 4-31-11-1

"Development committee" defined

Sec. 1. As used in this chapter, "development committee" refers to a breed development advisory committee established by the commission under section 3 of this chapter.

IC 4-31-11-2

"Development fund" defined

Sec. 2. As used in this chapter, "development fund" refers to a breed development fund established by the commission under section 10 of this chapter.

As added by P.L.341-1989(ss), SEC.2.

IC 4-31-11-3

Establishment of separate committee for each breed

Sec. 3. The commission may establish a separate breed development advisory committee for each breed of horse that participates in racing meetings under this article.

As added by P.L.341-1989(ss), SEC.2.

IC 4-31-11-4

Members; requirements

Sec. 4. Each development committee consists of three (3) members appointed by the governor. The members of each development committee must be residents of Indiana who are knowledgeable in horse breeding and racing and must include one (1) member who is an owner and one (1) member who is a breeder. No more than two (2) members of each development committee may be members of the same political party.

As added by P.L.341-1989(ss), SEC.2.

IC 4-31-11-5

Term of office; vacancy

Sec. 5. A member of a development committee serves a term of four (4) years. If a vacancy occurs on a development committee, the governor shall appoint a new member to serve for the remainder of the unexpired term.

IC 4-31-11-6

Chairman; secretary

Sec. 6. Each development committee may elect one (1) member to serve as chairman and one (1) member to serve as secretary.

As added by P.L.341-1989(ss), SEC.2.

IC 4-31-11-7**Salary; reimbursement of expenses**

Sec. 7. A member of a development committee is not entitled to the minimum salary per diem provided by IC 4-10-11-2.1(b). However, a member is entitled to reimbursement for traveling expenses and other expenses actually incurred in connection with the member's duties, as provided in the state travel policies and procedures established by the department of administration and approved by the budget agency.

IC 4-31-11-8**Indiana sires racing program**

Sec. 8. Each development committee shall make recommendations to the commission concerning an Indiana sires racing program. If the commission establishes an Indiana sires racing program, only those horses that were sired by an Indiana stallion are eligible for races conducted under the program. Stallions residing in Indiana during the full length of the breeding season are eligible for registration as Indiana sires. The commission may charge a fee for registration of Indiana sires.

As added by P.L.341-1989(ss), SEC.2.

IC 4-31-11-9**Recommendations to commission**

Sec. 9. (a) Each development committee may make recommendations to the commission concerning:

- (1) stakes races;
- (2) futurity races;
- (3) races only for horses owned by Indiana residents;
- (4) races only for horses sired by stallions standing in Indiana;
- (5) races only for horses foaled in Indiana; or
- (6) races for any combination of horses described in subdivision (3), (4), or (5).

Races described in subdivisions (3) through (6) may be for different distances and may be limited by the age, sex, or gait of the horse.

(b) Each development committee may make recommendations to the commission concerning:

- (1) cooperative arrangements with statewide breed associations; and
- (2) distribution of money available in a development fund in order to supplement a purse for a race at a county fair or agricultural exposition in Indiana.

IC 4-31-11-10**Establishment of separate fund for each breed**

Sec. 10. The commission may establish a separate breed development fund for each breed of horse that participates in racing meetings under this article. The development funds shall be

administered by the commission.

Composition of fund

Sec. 11. Each development fund consists of:

- (1) breakage and outs paid into the fund under IC 4-31-9-10;
- (2) appropriations by the general assembly;

- (5) entry fees; and
- (6) money paid into the fund under IC 4-33-12-6.

IC 4-31-11-12

Investment of funds

Sec. 12. The treasurer of state shall invest the money in each development fund not currently needed to meet obligations of that fund in the same manner as other public funds may be invested. Interest that accrues from these investments shall be deposited in the fund.

As added by P.L.341-1989(ss), SEC.2.

IC 4-31-11-13

Payments from funds; order; transfer of funds

Sec. 13. The auditor of state and treasurer of state shall make payments from the development funds upon order of the commission. However, the auditor of state and treasurer of state may not transfer money from one (1) development fund to another development fund.

IC 4-31-11-14

Reversion of funds at the end of fiscal year

Sec. 14. A development fund does not revert to the state general fund at the end of a state fiscal year.



Indiana Registered Mares



---The slot legislation was sent to the Governor's office on April 29, 2007. This was done prior to the end of the 2007 breeding season which usually ends between July 1st to July 15th. The registration period for pregnant mares began on December 1, 2007 through the foaling season in 2008.

---Any pregnant mare, bred anywhere in the country in the 2007 breeding season, had the opportunity to be moved into Indiana to foal in 2008 and qualify that foal as an Indiana-bred as part of the 2008 foal crop. If residency and registration was established by December 1st, breeding to an Indiana registered stallion was not necessary to qualify the foal as an Indiana-bred.

Mare Registration by Breeder Location





---The mares registered to out-of-state breeders dropped to a program low of 74 for the 2007 foaling season from a high point of 146 for the 2002 foaling season. The mares registered to out-of-state breeders beginning on December 1, 2007 through the foaling season in 2008 jumped to 154 for an increase of 108%. A record number of out-of-state breeders participated in the program before revenues from the slot machines even began! Records for participation from out-of-state breeders continued for the 2009 and 2010 foaling seasons, even after the residency requirement for participation in the program was moved to November 1st of each year.

---There were mares registered to out-of-state breeders from the following states: AL, AZ, CA, FL (45), IL, KY (68), LA, MA, MI, MO, MS, NE, NM, OH, SC, and TN.

---The number of mares registered to Indiana residents from November 1, 2009 through the foaling season of 2010 increased to 756 surpassing the program's high point of 736 from the 2002 foaling season.

Mares Bred By State




Breakdown of Foal Crops - Bred vs. Sired

---A pregnant mare entering the state after the registration deadline (currently November 1st) must breed back to a registered Indiana stallion to qualify her foal as an Indiana-bred. The foal and mare must reside in the state at least 30 days after foaling for the newly born foal to be able to be registered as an Indiana-bred.


Indiana Registered Foal Crops

---The registered foal crop of 2007 included 59 horses bred in Indiana by out-of-state breeders. The registered foal crop of 2008 included 134 horses that were bred in Indiana by out-of-state breeders for an increase of 127%. Registered Foal Crops By State







Indiana Registered Stallions



---The thoroughbred breed development program is really two programs rolled into one, a stallion-based program and a mare-based program:

Stallion-Based Program (Indiana-sired) – An Indiana-bred horse sired by a registered Indiana stallion

Mare-Based Program (Indiana-Bred) - An Indiana-bred horse sired by a stallion not registered in Indiana (i.e. stallions in Kentucky, Florida, Illinois, etc.)

---Indiana-sired horses can compete in races scheduled solely for Indiana-sired horses as well those scheduled for Indiana-bred horses. Indiana-bred horses can only compete in races scheduled solely for Indiana-breds.


---Two current Indiana stallions, Indy King and Cat Dreams, were represented by offspring in this year's \$1,000,000 Grade 1 Preakness, the second crown of the Triple Crown. No other state outside of Kentucky could claim a higher number in the race.

---A high percentage of stallions standing in Indiana are owned by Indiana residents with 77% in 2010.



---Stallions standing in Indiana occupy the top 8 spots in the Midwest Region when considering the earnings of their offspring. My apologies to the stallions that I could not include: 6) Champali - \$765,774, \$2,500 Stud Fee; 7) Spanish Steps - \$730,066, \$3,500 Stud Fee; 8) Black Moonshine - \$604,430, Died in 2009. Indiana stallions occupy 12 of the top 20 spots in the Midwest Region. The top seven Indiana stallions are so new to the state that they do not have an Indiana-sired horse of racing age. As per the 2010 Blood-Horse Stallion Directory, the advertised stud fees for Indiana stallion's ranged from Free to \$5000.

---Midwest Region includes: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, Wisconsin, and Wyoming.

Breakdown of Foal Crops - Bred vs. Sired



---Kentucky is considered its own region. Chief Seattle's earnings, #1 for Indiana, would place him 95th on the earnings list in Kentucky. According to the 2010 Blood-Horse Stallion Directory, the advertised stud fees in Kentucky ranged from Free to \$150,000. There are 140 stallions in Kentucky with a stud fee of \$5,000 and above.

---The top stallion in the country as of 09-20-2010 are all from Kentucky: 1) Maria's Mon - \$6,821,391, Died in 2007; 2) Distorted Humor - \$6,772,649, \$100,000 Stud Fee; 3) Giant's Causeway - \$100,000 Stud Fee; 4) Malibu Moon - \$6,608,257, \$40,000 Stud Fee; 5) Elusive Quality - \$5,993,309, \$75,000 Stud Fee. The highest ranking stallion on the national earnings list from a state other than Kentucky is #35.

---Since the slot legislation passed, Indiana-bred horses by outside stallions have begun to exceed Indiana-sired horses.

---In 2007, 72 Indiana registered mares were bred to stallions with advertised stud fees of \$5,000 or higher. The total stud fees involved with these mares was \$891,500.

---In 2008, 157 Indiana registered mares were bred to stallions with advertised stud fees of \$5,000 or higher. The total stud fees involved with these mares was \$1,871,500.

Uncertainty in the Long-Term Investment Outlook

The following quote is by Executive Director Joe Gorajec, from the IHRC supplied transcript of the January 29, 2010 IHRC Meeting, when commenting on his recommendations for the future of the thoroughbred breed development program:

“So, again, my recommendations are twofold. One is to, with Commission's approval if they approve this concept, to – in fact, I will just read it to make sure I get it. It's on page two of the supplemental report on the bottom. Revise purse structure and award payments to provide substantial awards for Indiana-bred horses that compete in open races. And, secondly, limit the number of Indiana-bred races so that horses will increasingly compete in open company against better horses.”

Here is a direct copy and paste from Joe's specific recommendations to the IHRC at their meeting on July 13, 2010 when his final recommendations were made. Please note the Minimum Number of races:

Number of Indiana Bred and Sired Races:

Minimum Number: Average of two per day – excluding stakes. This includes all restricted races regardless of class of race.

Transition Period: During the time when horses from the foal crop of 2008 and before are primarily competing, the number of races and type of races will approximate the 2009 program⁽²⁾.

Slot era: Beginning with foal crops of 2009 and after, the number of races will be determined on an annual basis⁽³⁾ with the goal of providing sufficient opportunities to race 60% to 66% in Indiana bred or sired races and 33% to 40% in open company.

(2) A track may, for good cause (such as economic consideration) change race conditions to better reflect the quality of horses available. Any such adjustments are subject to the approval of the Commission or its Executive Director.

(3) This annual determination will be made separately for each age group and category of race.

The Indiana Code does not require the IHRC to schedule any restricted races. IC 4-31-5-11 only says the “commission may require” restricted races.

IC 4-31-5-11

Scheduling one or more races on each racing day

Sec. 11. The commission may require each permit holder to schedule one (1) or more races on each racing day:

- (1) solely for Indiana owned horses;
- (2) solely for Indiana sired horses;
- (3) solely for Indiana bred horses; or
- (4) for a combination of Indiana owned horses, Indiana sired horses, and Indiana bred horses.

As added by P.L.341-1989(ss), SEC.2.

---The 2010 Indiana Downs meet is based upon the 60 days of thoroughbred racing. The number of Other Indiana Restricted races in 2010 was down from 62 in 2009.

---The 2009 Hoosier Park meet is based upon 63 days of thoroughbred racing. For the 2010 Hoosier Park meet the number of Other Indiana Restricted races is on pace for 46 to 47 of these races to be run.

---ITDF Stakes races are 100% funded by the Indiana Thoroughbred Development Fund with no contribution from the horsemen's purse.

*Other Indiana Restricted are Indiana-bred races at claiming prices below \$10,000. These races are not pre-approved by the IHRC and are not supplemented by the Indiana Thoroughbred Development Fund. Each racing secretary can schedule these races at their own discretion as they are fully funded from the horsemen's purse account.

**Average Restricted Races per Day does not include ITDF stakes races.

Slot Revenue Results & Projections for the Program

The Fiscal Impact Study for HB 1835 dated May 2, 2007 created by Jim Landers at LSA estimated that the 15% of Adjusted Gross Receipts (AGR) set aside for horse racing purposes in FY 2010 would be \$48.8 million. The actual amount of the horsemen's set aside in FY 2010 was \$57.8 million which was up from \$57.5 million for FY 2009.

In FY 2010, the 15% set aside reached the statutory cap at Indiana Downs; therefore, 15% on \$42.8 million of AGR was generated above the statutory cap. This means that \$6.4 million (15% of \$42.8 million) went to the State of Indiana instead of the horsemen's set aside. The statutory caps are based upon slot results by each track separately and not by the aggregate total.

Here is the language from IC 4-35-7-12(k) regarding the statutory caps:

(k) For a state fiscal year beginning after June 30, 2009, the amount of money dedicated to the purposes described in subsection (b) for a particular state fiscal year is equal to the lesser of:

(1) fifteen percent (15%) of the licensee's adjusted gross receipts for the state fiscal year; or

(2) **the amount dedicated to the purposes described in subsection (b) in the previous state fiscal year increased by a percentage that does not exceed the percent of increase in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index during the year preceding the year in which an increase is established.**

If fifteen percent (15%) of a licensee's adjusted gross receipts for the state fiscal year exceeds the amount specified in subdivision (2), the licensee shall transfer the amount of the excess to the commission for deposit in the state general fund. The licensee shall adjust the transfers required under this section in the final month of the state fiscal year to comply with the requirements of this subsection. *As added by P.L.233-2007, SEC.21. Amended by P.L.146-2008, SEC.21; P.L.142-2009, SEC.25.*

Based upon the language in the IC 4-35-7-12(k) and the language in the Fiscal Impact Study for HB1835, the statutory caps for FY 2011, using a 1.1% CPI*, FY 2011 will be equal to:

At Hoosier Park, an AGR of approximately \$203,081,852 (\$200,872,257 x 1.011)

At Indiana Downs, an AGR of approximately \$186,609,148 (\$184,578,781 x 1.011)

Based upon these figures, the 15% horsemen's set aside should be capped at \$58.45 million for FY 2011. When considering the thoroughbred breed development allocations, inclusive of the statutory caps, the amounts to the thoroughbred breed development fund for FY 2011 should be approximately \$10.34 million. This is an increase from "**the amount dedicated**" to the thoroughbred breed development in FY 2010 of \$10.23 million. This is assuming that the slot machines at the tracks perform at or above FY 2010.

* In reviewing the CPI statistics from the Department of Labor from July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010, their press release states a 1.1% increase to the CPI.

Quality of Racing Initiatives

From the Indiana Administrative Code:*****

71 IAC 11-1-7 Assignment of racing meetings

Authority: IC 4-31-3-9

Affected: IC 4-31-5-9

Sec. 7. In determining the assignment of racing meetings and race dates to permit holders under IC 4-31-5-9, the commission shall consider factors relating to the economic and practical feasibility of conducting racing meetings at various tracks. Factors to be considered **shall** include, without limitation, the following:

(1) The types and dates of racing meetings being held elsewhere, both within and outside of Indiana.

(2) The effects that various types of pari-mutuel racing have on one another.

(3) The quality of horse racing provided at various tracks.

(4) Past dates.

(5) Past performance of the permit holder.

(6) Whether the permit holder has complied with all applicable laws and rules relating to horse racing.

(7) Whether the assignment will maximize revenues to the state.

(8) Whether the assignment will adversely affect the public health, welfare, and safety.

(9) Stability of dates.

(10) The stability of the racing circuit.

The Indiana Administrative Code states that in the assignment of race meets, the IHRC determines "whether the assignment will maximize revenues to the state."

General Manager of Racing at Hoosier Park, Jeff Smith, quoted directly from the IHRC provided transcript of his comments about the potential effect of the Quality of Racing recommendations at the January 29, 2010 IHRC meeting:

"You know, having these new guidelines coming out at this point in time when we are trying to assess the full impact of the new purse rule and what impact it has on the amount of purses available, the guidelines naturally require more high quality races, more expensive races, the translation is fewer races and most likely smaller fields. Those have a negative implication on the economics of the racetrack. **Just reducing the number of races will affect our revenues, you know, anywhere from two to \$400,000 probably at a time when we are in financial extremis.**"

Another Handle Record as Indiana Meet Ends



The Indiana Downs meet went out with a bang July 14 with a new total handle record for one program.

Total handle for the 13-race card was \$2,667,917, track officials reported. The previous record of \$2,140,490, for 10 races, was set June 30.

Officials said the June 30 mark was passed after nine races July 14.

"It was a wonderful card, and it was a great night to be out at the races," Indiana Downs director of racing Butch Cook said in a statement. "I'm not surprised at all that the betting record was broken again. I knew when we took the entries it was going to be a huge night. The horsemen really stepped up and delivered."

"When all the dust settles, our 2010 single-day wagering record beats the 2009 record by about 45%," Indiana Downs general manager Jon Schuster said. "That is an amazing feat in our industry. This just proves that increased quality, a balanced racing program, and the proper exposure will motivate horsemen and horseplayers alike—and it moves the entire Indiana horse racing industry forward."

Indiana Downs has slot machines that contribute revenue to purses and breed development programs. This year's meet was heavily patronized by Kentucky-based horses, particularly those at the higher levels, because of the track's purse structure

Thoroughbred purses averaged \$200,018 a day over 60 days, up 37.9% from \$145,019 over 62 days in 2009, according to The Jockey Club Information Systems. Field size held steady at 8.75 horses per race, down a tick from 8.78 last year.

Complete meet handle figures weren't immediately available.

Mike Hunt was leading owner, and Richard Kohnhorst, who trains for Hunt, took leading trainer honors. Leandro Goncalves edged Victor Lebron for the riding title.

Indiana Downs begins its harness meet July 23. Indiana Thoroughbred racing moves to Hoosier Park beginning July 30.

Legislative Intent

Below is an excerpt from Executive Director Joe Gorajec's Final Staff Recommendation dated June 18, 2010 and as presented to the IHRC on July 13, 2010 regarding the future of the thoroughbred program:

Funding Sources:

Slot Funding: As provided in IC § 4-35-7-12, 40% of thoroughbred monies are directed to be used solely for breed development purposes. Under this recommendation, 60% of thoroughbred monies would be utilized by the tracks solely for open race purses.

"First off, the proposal is absolutely consistent with the letter of the statute and also, I believe, the intent of the legislation. The monies coming from the slot machines to the Thoroughbred breed once you take out monies going to the horsemen's associations, you're left with a division of 60 percent of the money going into open purses and 40 percent of the money going into breed development. And that's in the statute. My proposal is consistent with that. All of the 40 percent goes into breed development. All of the 60 percent is used for non-breed development purposes, i.e., open races."

Below is how IC 4-35-7-12(d), regarding thoroughbreds, actually reads:

- (d) A licensee shall distribute the amounts described in subsection (b)(3) as follows:
- (1) Forty-six percent (46%) for thoroughbred purposes as follows:
 - (A) Sixty percent (60%) for the following purposes:
 - (i) **Ninety-seven percent (97%) for thoroughbred purses.**
 - (ii) Two and four-tenths percent (2.4%) to the horsemen's association representing thoroughbred owners and trainers.
 - (iii) Six-tenths percent (0.6%) to the horsemen's association representing thoroughbred owners and breeders.
 - (B) Forty percent (40%) to the breed development fund established for thoroughbreds under IC 4-31-11-10.

Note: The bold and underline above is my emphasis.

Legal Uses of Breed Development Funds

From IC 4-31-10 Indiana Horse Racing Commission Operating Fund *****

IC 4-31-10-4 Purpose

Sec. 4. The commission shall use the fund to pay its operating costs and to pay the costs of administering and enforcing this article.

As added by P.L.341-1989(ss), SEC.2.

IC 4-31-11-15, which is copied below, directs the Indiana Horse Racing Commission as to how the breed development funds are to be used. The only place where "purses" are used is for a race. The "other funding" is what has authorized the awards programs to provide economic incentives to owners, to breeders and to stallion owners in exchange for their investments in the State of Indiana.

From IC 4-31-11 Breed Development Advisory Committees and Breed Development Funds *****

IC 4-31-11-15 Purpose

Sec. 15. The commission shall use the development funds to provide purses and other funding for the activities described in section 9 of this chapter.

As added by P.L.341-1989(ss), SEC.2.

The purpose in IC 4-31-11-15 ties the use of breed development funds back to the "activities" in IC 4-31-11-9, which is below. In my opinion, this section provides the authorized uses of breed development funds.

IC 4-31-11-9 Recommendations to commission

Sec. 9. (a) Each development committee may make recommendations to the commission concerning:

- (1) stakes races;
- (2) futurity races;
- (3) races only for horses owned by Indiana residents;
- (4) races only for horses sired by stallions standing in Indiana;
- (5) races only for horses foaled in Indiana; or
- (6) races for any combination of horses described in subdivision (3), (4), or (5).

Races described in subdivisions (3) through (6) may be for different distances and may be limited by the age, sex, or gait of the horse.

(b) Each development committee may make recommendations to the commission concerning:

- (1) cooperative arrangements with statewide breed associations; and
- (2) distribution of money available in a development fund in order to supplement a purse for a race at a county fair or agricultural exposition in Indiana.

I have received a request from retired State Senator Bob Jackman for funding from the three Breed Development Funds to assist in conducting a statewide economic study of the Indiana equine industry. The study would be conducted by Purdue University and would be separated into two phases. The first phase would focus solely on the impact of the racing industry (racing, breeding, training, etc.) and is scheduled to be completed during the fall of 2010. Phase two would focus on the entire equine industry and would begin during the spring of 2011. A study of this magnitude has not been completed since 2002. The total cost is estimated to be \$150,000 and funding is being sought from Breed Development, Racing Breed Associations (ISA, QHRAI, ITOBA, IN HBPA) and private sponsorships.

Chairman McNaught and I met with Senator Jackman earlier this month to discuss the funding and what we believed to be a fair contribution from the racing industry. While a study of this magnitude is beneficial to many facets of the equine industry, we foresee that the racing industry will gain the most benefit and use from a study of this nature. Therefore, we feel that a contribution of \$120,000 (80%) from the racing industry is a fair and reasonable amount. The breakdown that we have proposed for funding of the study is:

Horsemen Associations (Racing)	\$75,000	50%
Breed Development	\$45,000	30%
Private Funding/Corporate Sponsors	\$30,000	20%

The 30% from Breed Development would be divided between the three Breed Development Programs using the industry accepted percentages of 46%, 46% & 8% as follows:

Quarter Horse Breed Development (8%)	\$3,600
Standardbred Breed Development (46%)	\$20,700
Thoroughbred Breed Development (46%)	\$20,700

I will be making a request to the Indiana Horse Racing Commission for funding from the Breed Development Funds for this purpose at their July 13, 2010 meeting. If you have any objections to this request, please submit your thoughts in writing to me by the close of business on Tuesday June 15, 2010.



Competitive Landscape

2010 Thoroughbred Race Days



---Pennsylvania has nearly \$22 million in their program for 2010 with 519 race dates (Presque Isle 100, Penn National 209, and Philadelphia Park 210)

---The Kentucky Racing Commission unanimously approved regulations for Instant Racing machines for their eight race tracks. A public hearing takes place September 29, 2010.

---New York racing officials, with 1,600 Video Lottery Terminals coming in the spring of 2011, are considering steps to protect New York horsemen from what will be the influx of out-of-state horses. By the end of 2011, 4,525 terminals will be up and running. Purses, which are already larger than Indiana's, are estimated to increase by 60%.

---Louisiana has three races per day offered for Louisiana-bred horses. The four thoroughbred tracks have over 300 race days and in 2009 held for 3,554 races with \$89 million in purses.

---Ohio has an allocation to horse racing from their pending casinos.

A Unless major changes occur, registration takes effect at the beginning of the breeding season of the year in which the stallion was registered, and remains valid for life. Re-registration is necessary only if: [1] The stallion leaves Pennsylvania to stand in another state and subsequently returns or [2] More than 50 percent of his ownership changes.

Q If a stallion is relocated from Pennsylvania to stand elsewhere, are awards still paid?

A Yes. A stallion owner or designee will be paid awards earned by any registered PA-Breds conceived during the stallion's effective term of registration.

Q How and when are awards paid?

A Breeder, stallion and owner awards are processed monthly by the PHBA. Recipients are notified of their pending award usually within 30 days after the end of the

month in which it was earned; payment should be received within another 60 days. PA-Bred owner bonuses are paid at the time of purse release, and are deposited directly into owners' accounts at the particular track.

Q When ownership of a PA-Bred or a Pennsylvania sire changes, who receives the awards?

A The breeder of record remains the same, no matter who subsequently owns the horse. Thus, the breeder continues to receive any applicable breeder awards. PA-Bred owner bonuses are paid to the horse's licensed owner at the time the bonus was earned. A stallion owner receives awards earned by eligible PA-Breds conceived during his tenure as owner, and continues to do so if the stallion is sold, and even if the stallion is no longer at stud in Pennsylvania.

Q Can out-of-state residents participate in the Pennsylvania breeding program?

A Yes. There are no residency requirements for owners and/or breeders.

PA Racehorse Development Fund Unchanged

The \$28 billion general fund budget for the 2010-11 fiscal year signed by Pennsylvania Gov. Ed Rendell will allow the state's racing and breeding industries to operate at levels established in the previous year's budget, according to the Pennsylvania Horse Breeders Association.

According to a release, no additional cuts were made to the Race Horse Development Fund, which provides the majority of purse money, breeding fund revenues, and health and pension benefits to the state's horsemen. Total Thoroughbred Breeding Fund revenues for 2010 should be just over \$18 million, using estimates based on collections over the first six months of the year, the release said.

"This is very good news for those involved in breeding and racing in the state," PHBA president Brian N. Sanfratello said in a statement. "Last year the legislature assessed RHDF for nearly \$50 million, and because the budget wasn't finalized until well after the July deadline, the assessment was then fully applied over the six month period from January through June of 2010.

"The annual assessment will continue through the end of fiscal year 2012-2013, but will be prorated to funds collected over the full 12 months each year."

Additional participation from horsemen's purse funds at each of the state's three tracks for Pennsylvania-bred overnight restricted race schedules should boost the total amount available for the Pennsylvania-bred program to nearly \$22 million in 2010.

KY Commission Approves Form of Instant Racing

The Kentucky Horse Racing Commission has unanimously approved regulations that will permit "Instant Racing" wagering at the state's licensed tracks as a way to combat declining revenues and competition from alternative gaming at other states.

Technically referred to as wagering on "historical races," the new form of wagering was approved by the KHRC as part of a set of new and amended exotic wagering regulations.

The move came after recent efforts by the state's racing industry to have casino-type gaming approved failed in the legislature. Modeled after the Instant Racing electronic gaming first introduced at Oaklawn Park, the historical racing wagering will permit pari-mutuel type wagering on previously run races.

"I believe the approval of these regulations will help our ailing racing industry by providing much needed revenue to increase purses and help keep owners, trainers and their horses in Kentucky," KHRC chairman Bob Beck said in a statement.

Kentucky's attorney general had previously issued an opinion stating that wagering on historical horse races is not currently allowed because that type of wagering is not defined by the administrative regulations. The amended and new regulations will permit the wagering to take place.

Although there has already been a legal opinion stating historical race wagering is permitted if the enabling regulations pass, the commission and racetracks will go to court to seek a declaratory judgment stating that:

- The commission has the statutory authority to regulate pari-mutuel wagering of horse racing under Chapter 230 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (KRS);
- The licensed operation of pari-mutuel wagering on historical horse racing, as authorized by the regulations, does not contravene the statutes prohibiting gambling under Chapter 528 of the KRS, and;
- The Department of Revenue's determination that revenue generated by pari-mutuel wagering on historical horse races is subject to the pari-mutuel tax is a valid and lawful exercise of its statutory authority to interpret and enforce the tax laws of the Commonwealth.

Because the new regulations will be subjected to public hearings and the court ruling, it could take as long as six months before any of the historical race gaming becomes reality, Beck said.

The commission's action was immediately met with favoritism by track operators.

Bob Elliston, president and CEO of Turfway Park, which has severely cutback on its live race in recent years, noted the pressure the Kentucky racing industry is under.

"I therefore appreciate the good news from the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission and applaud their initiative in

pursuing an option we are allowed to use in addressing our competition," Elliston said in a statement. "While Instant Racing likely may not generate sufficient revenue to put us on equal footing with other states, it could give us a bit of breathing room in the near term."

"Keeneland supports today's move by the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission regarding pari-mutuel wagering on historic races," said Keeneland president Nick Nicholson in a statement. "The reason is simple: this new pari-mutuel wager would be another tool that we could use to help generate additional revenue to boost purses and assist our industry during an extremely challenging period... What it is not is a panacea for the challenges confronting our industry. It would not, frankly, generate the revenues for our industry or our Commonwealth that would be created by other forms of expanded gaming – the types of games that are significantly boosting purses in other states and altering the competitive landscape in our industry."

"That said, what our industry has always wanted is the ability to help itself – with tools that will allow us to invest more in our businesses and, most importantly, boost the purses that keep our races compelling and competitive with tracks on our borders and across the country. A new pari-mutuel wager such as historic racing has the potential to be one such tool. I hope we will be allowed to move forward quickly in assessing its viability so that we can make the kinds of investments that will keep Kentucky's signature industry the world's capital for Thoroughbred horse racing -- creating jobs and economic growth for our Commonwealth."

Instant Racing machines resemble slot machines because they are electronic games. But Instant Racing allows bettors to wager on previously run races, using limited handicapping information for the races that are randomly generated.

Instant Racing has been deemed legal in Kentucky because it is a form of pari-mutuel wagering in which bettors compete against each other rather than the racetrack staging the race. As a result, a percentage of the money wagered on Instant racing will be subjected to the customary splits to tracks, purses, and the state.

Lisa Underwood, KHRC executive director, said the regulation does not spell out how the revenues should be distributed. She said that would be determined in negotiations between tracks and horsemen, as are takeout rates on other types of wagering.

The new form wagering will be permitted at the eight tracks in Kentucky that conduct live Thoroughbred, harness, and Quarter Horse racing, as well as the Trackside training and wagering facility owned by Churchill Downs in Louisville. Instant Racing would not be permitted at the state's off-track betting parlors.

"The regulations will provide an additional tool that Kentucky horse racing tracks can use to draw people to their venues, to supplement purses, and to assist horsemen who are struggling but want to race in Kentucky," Kentucky Gov. Steve Beshear said in a statement.

New York regulators consider initiative to reward loyalty

State racing officials are considering steps to protect New York horsemen from a possible influx of out-of-state horses because of Aqueduct's proposed new racino.

Genting plans to expand gaming at the Queens racetrack as early as March, and the facility's 4,525 video lottery terminals upon completion will generate revenue for New York Racing Association, purses, and breeders.

Many Thoroughbred breeders have left New York for Pennsylvania, whose lucrative racinos have already boosted purses and breeder funds considerably. Now, with Aqueduct scheduled to open next spring, there might be a reverse migration, making it harder for long-time New York horsemen to compete.

"We want to make sure that people from New York that have stuck it out, waiting nine years for VLTs to happen, aren't penalized," New York State Racing and Wagering Board Chairman John Sabini said Tuesday. "We don't want to have totally restricted racing like they do in Louisiana. We need to have a lot of open racing, particularly at Saratoga, to attract the caliber of horses we want. But we don't want to see New York horses and horsemen shoved out the door. It's a balancing act."

The board on Tuesday amended a state harness racing rule, allowing tracks to restrict claiming and condition races to horses that have raced the majority of their most recent races at a New York track. In essence, officials want to reward and give incentives to horsemen that have remained loyal to New York in recent years.

There have reportedly been instances of New York harness horsemen sometimes taking a back seat to out-of-state horsemen at Yonkers Raceway, which currently has the state's largest racino with 5,000 VLTs.

With Aqueduct's VLTs on the horizon, the state wants to prevent similar problems at NYRA-run tracks. The state might adopt the same kind of rules for the Thoroughbred industry that it approved Tuesday for New York harness tracks, Sabini said.

However, such steps might not be needed because NYRA already has plenty of incentives for New York horsemen, carding more than 600 New York-bred races per year, said Rick Violette, a prominent trainer, NYRA board member and New York Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association president.

"First I want to see the money rolling," he said. "Then we'll worry about some of the ramifications."

Genting will begin operating the racino with 1,600 machines in spring 2011 with the remainder online before the end of the year.

Violette said he is not concerned about a huge influx of horses to New York, because most large stables already have a division there.

"Most major trainers are represented from across the country, whether they're from Kentucky, Florida, or California," he said. "NYRA has a huge commitment to New York breeders, not because it's state law [but] because it's the right thing to do. New York racing is also obligated to seek out the best racing in the country, if not the world. NYRA has the highest number of graded stakes races in the U.S."




Total In-State Handle

Occupational Licensing


Pursuant to IC 4-31-6 and 71 IAC 5-1-1, all persons participating in pari-mutuel racing under the jurisdiction of the Commission are required to be licensed. The licensing process is the backbone of the Commission's regulatory efforts. Each prospective licensee is fingerprinted.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) provides the Commission with criminal histories of all applicants. The Commission may refuse or deny the application for licensure of any person whose criminal or racing violation record is contrary to the public's best interest.

Pari-mutuel horse racing can succeed as a legitimate major league sport only if its races are perceived by the wagering public to be honest, competitive contests, free from manipulation by man or drugs. The Commission's drug detection program is one of the nation's most comprehensive and its laboratory, one of the most respected in the racing industry.

Truesdail Laboratory in Tustin, California, serves as the primary testing laboratory for the Indiana Horse Racing Commission. Truesdail Laboratory has been a leader in racing chem-


istry and drug-related research for over 50 years. For each positive test, the offending horse was disqualified and placed last. In accordance with the pari-mutuel statute, all purse money earned is ordered returned and redistributed.

Breed Development

Overview

Pursuant to IC 4-31-11, breed development funds have been established to promote the breeding of horses while stimulating the agri-business sector of the state's economy.


Historically, breed development funds have consisted of breakage (the difference in the rounding off of pari-mutuel payoffs), outs (all uncashed tickets), and riverboat admissions tax allocation. This same funding mechanism has been in place until racinos opened at Indiana's two racetracks in June of 2008. At this time, riverboat

allocation was replaced by an allocation from slot machine wagering at racinos in accordance with 71 IAC 4-35-7-12.



2009 Award Distributions


Standardbred Awards

Racino Slot Revenue

The 2007 Indiana Legislature approved slot machine wagering at the State's two pari-mutuel racetracks in accordance with 71 IAC 4-35-7-12. Racino slot revenue began replacing riverboat revenue June, 2008. These funds are distributed to various segments of the racing industry in accordance with Commission rule IC 4-35-7-12.
