

MODERNIZATION INTRODUCTION



- What is an armory?
 - Safe Haven
 - Public Safety Hub
 - COVID Operations
 - Used for secure storage space for weapons, ammunition, and equipment
 - A space for drill/training on weekends
 - Recruiting Centers
 - Can serve as community centers



WHY NEEDED



- Backlogged repairs and maintenance
 - Average age 57 yrs
 - \$143M in backlogged Maintenance and Repair
- Disrepair forcing units to relocate
- Do not meet current Code requirements
 - American Disabilities Act, National Fire Protection, Environmental Protection Agency
- Armories do not reflect demographics
 - Many lack female restrooms and showers because armories predate the integration of women in 1978
- Future force requirements
 - · Virtual training and WIFI
 - Modernized motor pools
 - Classification / security of classified equipment
- Condition of armories are negatively impacting recruiting efforts



WHY NEEDED — EVOLVING THREATS/RESPONSE



- Foreign adversaries
 - Infrastructure vulnerable to cyber attacks
- Natural Disasters
- Pandemics
- Civil Unrest

• The 20 Year Plan

- Consolidate
 - Divest 31 facilities to other State/Local agencies
 - 45% reduction in number of facilities
- Expand and Modernize
 - 38 legacy facilities
- Construct
 - 5 new facilities
- Results in 43 Modern Facilities
- Sustain
 - Funding level adequate to maintain new total

BLUFFTON ARMORY – MODERNIZATION FRAMEWORK



- Originally built in 1955 at 12,235sf
- Modernized and expanded in 2020 for \$3.67m. Included 2,214sf addition and renovations to:
 - Latrines/showers
 - Classrooms
 - Kitchen
 - Storefront/Entry
 - Ventilation / Air Conditioning
 - Secure and sufficient storage
