	<b>Summary</b> The Assistant Chief of Training works under general direction of the Base Fire Chief and requires thorough knowledge of managerial principles and techniques, incumbent training and development, emergency firefighting practices, chemistry of fire, agency, state and federal rules and regulations as related to fire protection, firefighting safety practices and procedures in order to plan, develop, coordinate and implement all Air Force fire department training classes and programs consistent with applicable fire standards and perform duties of operations assistant fire chief when assigned.		

**Duties:**

The Assistant Chief of Training performs the following duties: supervises and gives work assignments to assigned staff to ensure efficient operations are conducted for firefighters, work lead firefighters, and Shift Leaders; coordinates established training plans and monitors training of all fire personnel to ensure compliance with department requirements; directs fire suppression and rescue teams at scene of emergencies in absence of Assistant Chief of Operations; provides technical oversight to Assistant Chief of operations concerning live fire training and operation of equipment; coordinates fire department health and safety programs, Technical Orders Library, Breathing Air Program and Building Inspection Program to ensure compliance with established fire department management plans, standard operating procedures, and the National Fire Protection Association standards.

**Job Requirements:**

- High school diploma or equivalent (GED);
- Must successfully complete a pre-employment baseline physical examination identified in NFPA 1582, "Standard on Comprehensive Occupational Medical Program for Fire Departments";
- Complete a physical performance requirements assessment prior to employment, initial training, and conduct an annual re-assessment;
- Security Clearance: Firefighters must obtain a favorable National Agency Check (NAC) as outlined in AFI 31-501. Firefighters must be able to obtain and maintain a Common Access Card (CAC) for accessing computerized functions (such as ACES-FD) as well as a Restricted Area Access (Line Badge) for flight line and restricted area access;
- Subject to pre-employment and random drug testing;
- Must have successful completion of Department of Defense aircraft fire school with International Fire Service Accreditation Congress (IFSAC) certification in airport Firefighter; must possess International Fire Service Accreditation Congress, accreditation certification of completion of National Fire Protection Association Firefighter I, Firefighter II, Driver Operator (e.g., assigned vehicles, ARFF, Pumper, & MWS), Airport Firefighter, Fire Officer I, Fire Officer II, Fire Officer III, Hazardous Materials Awareness, Operations, and Incident Command levels, Air Force Incident Management System, Fire Service Instructor I, Fire Service Instructor II, Fire Service Instructor III, Fire Inspector I, and Fire Inspector II. State and or National Registry EMT-B based on manpower authorization at selected departments, certification levels may be required to exceed levels listed within and comply with those specified in AFMAN 32-2003 (Firefighter Certification Program); or military or civilian equivalent. Note: The requirements & qualifications are in accordance with NGR5-1/Appendix 1 & 24;
- Maintains and is responsible for fire department data bases--e.g., ACES-FD, NFIRS, and the MONACO system;

- All ANGFES Firefighters are required to possess and maintain a current state driver's license as well as to obtain and maintain a military driver's license identifying assigned fire fighting vehicles. Loss of state driving privileges will result in appropriate review and action being taken concerning military vehicle operator qualifications and the incumbent's ability to perform assigned duties;
- Incumbent must have served prior to employment, or serve at the time of employment, a six (6) year tour in either an active duty or reserve component of the United States Armed Forces as a condition of employment.

**Difficulty of Work:**

The incumbent is normally assigned to an Incident Command vehicle as the Safety Officer operating under extremely hazardous conditions which requires on-the-spot decision-making. Therefore, stress management skills are essential to the successful accomplishment of fire and medical emergency response.

**Responsibility:**

The incumbent reports to the Base Fire Chief. The incumbent is responsible for immediate oversight, direct control, supervision, accountability, health, welfare, safety, and morale of all assigned fire department personnel.

**Personal Work Relationships:**

Relationships are primarily with Fire Emergency Services personnel and other military fire personnel. The incumbent has frequent contact with the military base personnel, general public and personnel from FWA Authority Public Safety Department, Fort Wayne City Fire department personnel and municipal and or volunteer fire departments. The incumbent will interact with other local, state, and federal agencies in the event of a large fire, natural disaster, or medical incident within the jurisdiction.

**Physical Effort:**

Incumbent must be physically capable of performing rigorous physical activity associated with the firefighter career field. This includes, but is not limited to: bending, lifting, squatting, crawling, climbing and moving rapidly. A high level of physical fitness is required as demonstrated by passing the annual 10 station firefighter physical fitness evaluation.

**Working Conditions:**

Works inside and outside, exposed to adverse weather conditions; exposed to fire and chemicals, intense heat, toxic gases and dense smoke, extreme heights and confined spaces; subject to recall; may be required to travel by military aircraft or vehicle; subject to mandatory overtime; working shifts & hours may vary due to mission objectives & budgetary constraints.
