


# 21<sup>ST</sup> CENTURY SCHOLARS AUTO-ENROLLMENT



#### 21ST CENTURY SCHOLARS

- The 21st Century Scholars Program began in 1990.
- It is designed to provide financial and college readiness support to Indiana's financially eligible students.
- Across all races and ethnicities Scholars are more likely to go to college than their low-income peers.
- Less than half of financially eligible students were enrolling in the program.

21st Century Scholars are more likely to attend college than their peers.





#### 21ST CENTURY SCHOLARS

- ► HEA 1449-2023 requires the Commission, in partnership with the Indiana Department of Education to identify and automatically enroll eligible students into the 21st Century Scholars program.
- Automatically enrolling all income-eligible students into the program removes the application barrier students and families faced.
- ► The Commission is required to mail letters to families of students who were automatically enrolled with the option to opt out of the program.
- In the 2027 cohort, the number of students who self-enrolled was 19,000. After switching to automatic enrollment, that number grew to **nearly 46,000**. Currently, the 2028 cohort has over **50,000** enrolled.



#### 21ST CENTURY SCHOLARS

- ► To activate and utilize the full scholarship, students must:
  - Create a student ScholarTrack account.
  - Sign the Scholar Pledge.
  - Complete 12 Scholar Success Program activities while in high school.
  - Meet the program's graduation requirements (GPA and diploma).
  - Matriculate to college within 1 year of graduating high school.
  - File a FAFSA by the state priority deadline, April 15th.

#### 2024-2025 FAFSA CHALLENGES

- FAFSA Simplification Act: Significant changes to FAFSA form:
  - FAFSA opened on December 31, 2023, instead of October 1, 2023.



- Significant technical problems with the website and electronic FAFSA form caused delays and disruptions for students trying to submit their application and make corrections.
- Parents without social security numbers faced various challenges trying to submit their portions of the applications.
- Limited access to support services and guidance during peak submission periods exacerbated the difficulties, making it harder for students to get timely help.



#### UNIVERSAL FAFSA

- ► SEA 167-2023 made FAFSA filing a **default option** for high school seniors beginning with the class of 2024.
- It includes broad opt-out provisions:
  - Parents or emancipated students can opt out of filing.
  - A high school can waive the requirement if the school has made two reasonable attempts to contact the student and/or parent.



#### OUR 2024-2025 JOURNEY

- Indiana rank 1st for low-income high schools at +0.5% and is the only state to have closed the gap.
- Indiana ranks 4th for high-minority high schools at +0.5%, alongside Maine, Vermont, and Minnesota, as one of the states that have closed the gap.



# INDIANA COLLEGE CORE



#### WHAT IS THE INDIANA COLLEGE CORE?

- A <u>block</u> of 30 college-level general education credits students can earn while in high school required to be accepted at all Indiana public institutions.
- Currently 6 private institutions accept the ICC.
- Competency-Based
  - 3 Foundational Intellectual Skills
  - 3 Ways of Knowing





#### INDIANA COLLEGE CORE IN HIGH SCHOOL

- ► High schools partner with a postsecondary institution to award the Indiana College Core certificate.
- The Indiana College Core is offered by most of Indiana's public institutions.
- Postsecondary partners are responsible for:
  - Tracking and reporting data to the Commission
  - Delivering at least 15 of the 30 credit hours of ICC coursework
  - Coordinating courses with secondary providers
  - Maintenance of courses on My College Core





#### HOPE AGENDA GOAL 1: ENROLLMENT

#### Indiana College Core (ICC)

- 275 high schools currently offer the ICC
- > 2,371 high school students earned the ICC in 2022
- ▶ 92% of ICC earners enrolled in college





#### EXPANDING THE INDIANA COLLEGE CORE

- SEA 8-2024 Legislation
  - High schools must offer the ICC by AY 2024-2025, or
  - Submit an implementation plan to offer the ICC by AY 2026-2027, or
  - Submit a feasibility report by AY 2026-2027.
- Survey of all high schools due to Commission on October 1, 2024






#### MY COLLEGE CORE WEBSITE & PLANNING TOOL

- Launched in August 2023 to be a one-stop shop for earning the ICC in high school
- Planning tool allows students to choose the available coursework, including dual credit, dual enrollment, AP and CLEP
- Students can save, edit, and share plans with counselors and family members.
- High school counselors and postsecondary partners can view saved plans and track student progress.
- Site contains a toolkit of resources for high schools such as handouts, posters, and presentations







# PRE-ADMISSIONS: YOUR PATH TO COLLEGE



#### INDIANA PRE-ADMISSIONS: YOUR PATH TO COLLEGE

- A statewide initiative of the Indiana Commission for Higher Education, in partnership with Indiana's higher education institutions
- The Commission is using high school GPAs and SAT scores to inform students of their postsecondary options.
- The Commission mails two letters to students and their parents:
  - ▶ The August letter informs students of the Pre-Admissions initiative.
  - ▶ The September letter is the official letter with institutional pre-admissions decisions listed.



### 2024 COHORT VS.

- Participating schools:
  - 327 high schools
  - > 38 of 48 (79%) campuses
  - 15 public campuses
  - 23 private campuses
- 56,426 decision letters were mailed in 2023.
- Data Breakdown
  - On average, students were pre-admitted to 24 schools.
  - ► 28% of students received all 38 schools (16,000+).

## 2025 COHORT

- Participating school:
  - > 390 high schools
  - > 39 of 48 (81%) campuses
  - 16 public campuses
  - 23 private campuses
- More than 67,000 decision letters are anticipated for 2024.
- Data Breakdown
  - We expect the average number of preadmitted schools to be 24.
  - ≥ 24% of students are currently receiving all 39 schools (16,000+).
