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2025-2026 Schedule of Awards

- The Frank O'Bannon Grant is Indiana's primary need-based financial aid program.
- The General Assembly appropriated \$167.7 million to the Frank O'Bannon Grant in FY24 and FY25.

The Frank O'Bannon Grant is made up of two awards: The Higher Education Award and the Freedom of Choice Grant.



- The Higher Education Award is available to students who attend Indiana's public and proprietary institutions.
- The Freedom of Choice Grant is available to students who attend Indiana's private non-profit institutions.

- Students must achieve certain credit completion benchmarks to renew the Frank O'Bannon Grant.
- Recipients must earn 30 credits per academic year to renew the full grant known as the "on-time" amount.
- Recipients who earn less than 30 credits, but at least 24, receive a reduced award known as the "full-time" amount.

In 2022, the Commission approved increasing the maximum Frank

- The Commission is required to approve Frank O'Bannon Grant amounts on an annual basis.
- The State Budget Committee must review the amounts once they are approved by the Commission.
- The amount a student receives is based on a student's need as determined by the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA.)

FAFSA: SIMPLIFICATION?

- FAFSA = Free Application for Federal Student Aid
 - Used to award federal, state, and institutional aid
- FAFSA Simplification Act: Significant changes to FAFSA form and eligibility calculation
 - Expected Family Contribution (EFC) changed to Student Aid Index (SAI).
 - More students qualified for federal, state, and institutional aid.
 - Implementation by the United State Department of Education was a disaster.



FAFSA: TIMELINE

United States Department of Education Students, States and Institutions



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- March: Federal Student Aid (FSA) announced the FAFSA, which normally opens on October 1, would not be available until December 2023.
- November 15: FSA announced the FAFSA form would be available by Dec. 31, 2023, and Institutional Student Information Records (ISIRs) would be available by end of January.
- **December 1:** The Washington Post reported FSA failed to update income protection guidelines used to calculate eligibility for financial aid.
- **December 30:** The new FAFSA opened with limited availability and significant technical challenges for students who tried to complete the form.

January 23: FSA announced it will follow the law and fix the income protection guidelines

February 2: Due to the significant delays, Commission staff, with unanimous support Committee, agreed the best way forward was to not change awards for 2024-2025





- February 27: FSA made a technical update to the SAI formula which removed a floor for a dependent student's income. FSA also announced first batch of test ISIRs to be delivered.
- February 29: Congress attached a provision to the spending bill which set floors for dependent student income reversing FSA's February 27 technical correction.
- March 4: FSA announced it would soon begin transmitting the first batch of ISIRs.
- March 13: FSA announced it would begin transmitting a larger batch of ISIRs.







- March 14: The Commission approved the 2024-2025 Frank O'Bannon Schedule of Awards.
- SAI for dependent students who reported assets.
- March 29: FSA announced errors in tax data which impacted up to 20 percent of submitted FAFSAs.
- April 4: FSA said it would reprocess the 20 percent of FAFSAs which contained tax discrepancies.

April 19: The Indiana State Budget Committee reviewed and approved the 2024-2025







- April 30: Secretary Cardona said "that is our expectation to reach the Oct. 1 deadline" when asked if the 2025-2026 FAFSA would open on time.
- May 1: The traditional day students commit to enroll.
- May 10: FSA announced it would begin processing paper FAFSA forms.
- August 7: FSA announced the 2025-2026 FAFSA would be released for testing on Oct. 1, and the full application would be available to all students by Dec. 1.

- Despite the worst FAFSA cycle nationally ...
 - Filing in Indiana for high school seniors was basically flat for 2024-2025 compared to 2023-2024.
 - Indiana was the <u>only</u> state in the nation to see an increase in filing for **low-income high schools**.
 - Indiana was <u>one of only 4 states</u> in the nation to see an increase in filing for **high-minority high** schools.
- The Commission and University partners recognized the 2025-2026 schedule of awards would need to be adjusted.



 - Ensure a similar number of Frank O'Bannon Grant recipients compared to previous years.
 - Keep spend aligned with the appropriation.
 - Maintain an increase from the 2022-2023 Frank O'Bannon Grant Schedule of Awards.
 - Move toward a stable schedule to minimize award fluctuations for students.





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
