Course Description:

This class presents a different way of looking at, sizing up, and understanding buildings. It focuses on pattern recognition, understanding layouts, and building types in great detail including learning specific types of single-family homes multifamily structures, and apartment buildings. Tactics and pertinent traditional fire service building construction are tied into the class from start to finish.

- Community Risk Assessment Process: Conducting thorough risk assessments to identify and address community vulnerabilities.

- Real-World CRR Success Stories: Analyzing successful case studies and real-world applications of community risk reduction.

Course Description:

This course is designed to sharpen the interview skills of fire investigators, enabling them to conduct effective and thorough interviews with witnesses, suspects, and other involved parties in fire investigation cases. Course topics include:

- **Types and Sources of Information:** Identifying the various types of information that can be gathered from interviews to include understanding the sources from which this information can be obtained.
- Preparation and Planning: Strategies for preparing and planning for interviews including developing a structured approach to ensure key topics are addressed.
- **Interviewing Methods and Techniques:** Building rapport with interviewees to create a conducive environment for information gathering. Effective questioning techniques to elicit valuable insights. Active listening skills to understand and interpret responses. Observing non-verbal cues to gain additional context. Documenting interviews accurately for future reference.
- **Challenges and Strategies:** Identifying common challenges faced during interviews. Implementing strategies to overcome these obstacles.
- **Use of Visual Aids:** Incorporating visual aids and other tools to enhance the interview process. Evaluating the effectiveness of these tools in gathering and presenting information.

"The First Responders Mental Health Toolkit: What to Look for and Realistic Solutions"

Course Description:

This interactive presentation focuses on the benefits of behavioral health awareness and self-care for first responders. Common mental health issues are discussed, and attendees are provided take-home, usable points to employ with themselves, family members, and other first responders if they suspect behavioral health problems. The presentation will then focus on the reliability of first responder service suicide data and what to do when you suspect a colleague is suicidal. This presentation also discusses how Polyvagal Theory can be used as a prevention tool to enhance mental wellness, and attendees will learn techniques to activate the parasympathetic nervous system. Finally, this presentation describes the importance of leadership providing psychologically safe work environments to build resilience and prevent mental health conditions.

Topics covered include a review of the causes, common features and engineered lumber products used in their construction and operational considerations and tactical tidbits for fighting fires in these occupancies.

Spurred on by the tragic loss of Houston Firefighters Lewis Mayo and Kim Smith in an arson fire at a McDonald's Restaurant on Valentine's Day, 2000, this program takes the audience behind the counters, above the ceiling tiles, and on top of the roof for a first-hand look at the hidden dangers and hazards of these buildings that pose a deadly threat to firefighters and make managing incidents especially dangerous.

JOSEPH KNITTER is a 43-year fire service veteran, retiring in 2022 as Fire Chief of the South Milwaukee (WI) Fire Department, where he served for 37 years. Most recently, Joseph served as the Interim Fire Chief for the South Shore Fire Department in Mount Pleasant, WI. "The Power of Sleep for Physical and Mental Health"

According to a recent study, over 40% of firefighters and law enforcement officers have a diagnosable sleep disorder, more than doubling the general population. The effects of sleep deprivation can range from simply feeling aggravated to chronic diseases like cancer and heart disease, as well as several mental health disorders. This presentation provides an interactive format to discuss what sleep cycles are, why they are important, and how they affect hormone levels. It evaluates powerful and simple sleep hygiene practices that people often overlook. Next, it discusses Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Insomnia (CBT-I) and how personnel can utilize CBT-I to get remarkably better sleep in six weeks. Finally, this presentation describes the types and usefulness of various sleep trackers. The information is presented in a way that allows attendees not only to employ the skills but also relay them back to their co-workers.

Participants will explore the SBFD's response through the lens of responder mental health, examining the department's immediate and long-term support mechanisms, the role of peer support, and leadership's responsibility in promoting a culture of open communication and resilience. Through a combination of real-life experience, firsthand accounts, and expert insights, this course provides an honest look at where we succeeded and where gaps remained in addressing the psychological needs of our personnel.

This course is designed for leaders in emergency services, mental health professionals working with first responders, and peer support teams committed to ensuring the well-being of their personnel. Attendees will gain valuable insights into managing the mental health of their teams, developing support networks, and creating pathways for resilience in the face of profound loss.

This program is both a powerful learning tool and a call to action for departments seeking to strengthen their commitment to responding to mental health.

Jon Knepp is the Captain of Truck 6, a lead instructor for the SBFD Fire Academy, and the coordinator of the SBFD Peer Support Team. Jon was on scene of this incident, managing and deploying in real time the peer support resources for our responders.

"Rail Car Incidents Response for Crude, Ethanol and Other Flammable Liquids"

Dates: Saturday February 1st, 2025, 8 am – 5 pm, Sunday February 2nd, 2025, 8 am – 5 pm

Course Description:

The All-Hazards Training Center at The University of Findlay has developed the Rail Car Incident Response for Crude, Ethanol, and Other Flammable Liquids training course for the U.S. Department of Transportation Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (DOT PHMSA) to educate emergency responders on freight rail car incidents involving hazardous materials, specifically crude oil, ethanol, and other flammable liquids. As more and more rail traffic transports cargo, including hazardous materials, the responder community must become educated about the dangers and unique hazards presented by rail cars carrying these commodities. The information covered in this FREE training course will enhance the ability of emergency responders to assess the scene of a rail car incident and understand the resources needed to remediate the emergency, including how the railroad will play a critical role in the response. Hands-on scenarios using a rail car simulator are conducted to emphasize the objectives of the training including:

- Identifying the design, construction, components, and markings of rail tank cars that carry crude/flammable liquids
- Recognizing and identifying the chemical being transported, and the properties that must be considered in an emergency
- Assessing the scene to determine the potential hazards to people, property, and the environment
- Recognizing mitigation strategies including offensive, defensive, and non-intervention strategies for fire and/or spill incidents. This is not a tactics course but rather focuses on strategy and decision-making.
- Identifying key resources in the rail/freight industry as well as federal, state, and private resources for response assistance

This 8-hour course was designed to prepare emergency services responders to respond and take correct initial actions as an individual in starting an investigation and searching for missing/injured subjects. It presumes the student to be well qualified for incident command and emergency operations. This course will cover the duties of an incident commander, incident size-up, mission documentation, initial search tactics, and the practical applications of lost person behavior in both lecture and hands-on tabletop sessions based on real missions.

After the completion of the course, students will be able to profile a subject quickly, plot theoretical and statistical search areas, identify the highest probability areas to deploy SAR resources, have direction as to additional investigation paths, and rapidly field tasks to ensure the best possible outcome for the subject.

With one (1) in 44 youths being diagnosed with a form of autism, and 8 out of 10 geriatric patients being dementia they are prone to wandering, so it's just a matter of time before you have to go looking for them. This class will prepare you for these types of responses in your jurisdiction.

Guarding Against Normalization of Deviance

Date: Saturday, February 1st, 2025, 5:30 pm - 6:30 pm

Course Description:

In this discussion, Mullane uses the Space Shuttle Challenger disaster as an example of how a World-class team can be victimized by incremental deviances from safety best practices. Challenger resulted from a catastrophic failure of the Orings, Criticality 1 components used to form pressure seals between the four propellant-filled segments that comprise the twin solid-fueled rocket boosters. Even though there were multiple instances of leaking O-rings in the 24 missions preceding Challenger, launches were never suspended to give engineers adequate time to address the problem. In hindsight, the serial justifications over 4 years to continue launch operations, reveal an incremental creep from best practices, i.e., a normalizing process. Challenger proved to be a 'predictable surprise'.

Instructor Bio:

From combat reconnaissance missions over the skies of Vietnam to Space Shuttle missions to climbing some of the highest peaks across the globe, Mike Mullane knows what teamwork, leadership, and safety are all about. His programs on these topics have educated, inspired, and motivated tens of thousands of people from every walk of business and government. In addition, Astronaut Mullane has authored several critically acclaimed books and videos.

Mullane was selected as a Mission Specialist in 1978 in the first group of Space Shuttle Astronauts. He completed three space missions aboard the Shuttles *Discovery* (STS-41D) and *Atlantis* (STS-27 & 36) before retiring from NASA and the Air Force in 1990. Mullane has been inducted into the International Space Hall of Fame and has received many awards, including the Air Force Distinguished Flying Cross, Legion of Merit, and the NASA Space Flight Medal.

"Civilian Rescue: Removing the Occupant"

Date: Sunday, February 2nd, 2025, 1 pm - 5 pm

Course Description:

Locating the victim is only half the battle. It is in the act of removing them that the rescue truly takes place. There are many tactical considerations searchers must evaluate and understand to increase the survival odds of trapped occupants. Maintaining situational awareness of not only the incident, but the location of the victim in relation to the best removal point will guide rescuers in making the appropriate decisions that will ultimately increase the victim's odds of surviving the environment they are in. Knowing how and when to implement certain tactics is of great benefit to both civilians and firefighters. This lecture will not only discuss best practices but will also cover information found during extensive research on various situations that contribute to our victims' outcomes and better prepare rescuers to make appropriate decisions during the removal process.

Videos of actual fireground rescues will be shown and lessons learned regarding the removal process will be discussed.

Sean Duffy is currently a Firefighter with the City of Ann Arbor Fire Department. Over his 20-year career, he has worked in several response districts including rural, suburban, and urban areas with varying staffing levels. THIS TWO-DAY COURSE IS DESIGNED TO DEVELOP THE DECISION-MAKING SKILLS NEEDED BY COMPANY OFFICERS TO ACCOMPLISH ASSIGNED TACTICS AT STRUCTURE FIRES.

With the real possibility of being the first to arrive at an incident, the CO's initial decisions will have an impact throughout the entire incident. It is vital that COs be able to make good management decisions that have a favorable impact on the eventual outcome. In addition to a possible role as the initial Incident Commander, the CO may well be assigned a subordinate position within the Incident Command System organization. COs need to have a clear understanding of the system, the position that they are assigned to, and their role in the organization if they are to function effectively and help make the system work.

O0729 Incident Safety Officer National Fire Academy

February 1st & 2nd 2025 8:30 am - 5:00 pm both days

Course Goal: This course is designed for fire and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) responders who may be designated by the Incident Commander (IC) as an ISO while working within an Incident Command System (ICS). These assignments may occur during firefighting, EMS, special-operations-type incidents, and training evolutions. This course is an incident-specific, scenario-oriented course designed to teach students what an ISO needs to know at an incident.

Course Description: The Safety officer's responsibilities fall into two clear-cut categories: those associated with responding at the incident scene, and those associated with managing the day-to-day affairs of the department. The Incident Safety Officer (ISO) course is focused on the incident and the role the Safety Officer plays as part of the Command Staff. The target audience is Company Officers (CO) who are experienced in firefighter safety issues and are familiar with an Incident Command System, hazardous materials management, and related emergency operations. The program provides the student with the decision-making process and skills required to recognize unsafe acts and conditions and take appropriate corrective actions.

Instructor: Chris Crail is currently the Fire Chief of the Portage Fire Department in Portage, Indiana. Chris has served the citizens of Portage for 22 years. He has served as the Lead Instructor for Indiana's District 1 Career Fire Academy for the past three years, he has trained hundreds of firefighters across Northwest Indiana, always demonstrating a strong commitment to the highest standards.
