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**Audiology** 



According to Indiana Code (IC 20-34-3-14), each school corporation is required to complete hearing screenings for students in first, fourth, seventh and tenth grades, as well as students transferring into that district. In addition, hearing screenings are to be completed when concerns regarding a student's hearing arise.

Records of all testing are to be maintained by the school corporation. These can provide information that may assist in diagnosing and treating any student's hearing loss. This is in alignment with the Child Find mandate (IAC 7-40-1) requiring districts to have procedures to locate, identify and evaluate students who may be in need of special education and related services.

#### **Screening Considerations**

As school districts create procedures to ensure they are providing hearing screenings in accordance with IC 20-34-3-14, here are a few things to consider:

- 1. Who conducts hearing screenings in each school building?
- 2. When are the initial and follow-up screenings scheduled?
- 3. How is a family notified regarding their child's results?
- 4. Who submits hearing screening data?
- 5. How does the school receive follow-up diagnostic information from families?

## **Need assistance?**

The Indiana Department of Health (IDOH) has an initiative to make mobile units available for school hearing screenings. #### **Remember!**

A hearing screening is not an audiogram. A screening indicates whether further diagnostic testing needs to be completed. A screening can be completed by anyone trained to conduct one (nurse, SLP, audiologist, and others). An audiogram is completed through diagnostic testing by a licensed audiologist.

#### Follow Up Considerations for Teachers of the Deaf/Hard of Hearing

- Become familiar with your schools' hearing screening procedures
- Collaborate with screeners to assist with follow-up efforts
- Observe students in the educational setting to look for impact on access
