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

Breast Cancer

Breast cancer occurs almost entirely in women, but men can get breast cancer, too. Cancer starts when cells begin to grow out of control. It's important to understand that most breast lumps are benign and not cancerous (malignant). Any breast lump or change should be addressed by a health care professional to find if it is benign or malignant. ¹

There are many different types of breast cancer. It is the second leading cause of cancer death, and excluding skin cancers, the most frequently diagnosed cancer among women in Indiana and in the United States.^{2,3} In Indiana, there were 4,499 new cases of breast cancer diagnosed during 2020 in Indiana.³

Risk Factors and Detection

Sex and age are the two greatest risk factors for developing breast cancer. Women have a greater risk for developing breast cancer, and that risk increases with age. Breast cancer is rare among men; however, they are often diagnosed at later stages and have poorer prognoses. Factors associated with increased breast cancer risk include weight gain after the age of 18, being overweight, use of menopausal hormone therapy, physical inactivity, and alcohol consumption. ²

The United States Preventative Service Task Force (USPSTF) recommends biennial screening mammography for women aged 40-74.² If breast cancer runs in your family, talk with your healthcare provider about starting screening earlier.
