about hoosier women at work


In March 2016 the first Hoosier Women at Work conference brought together students and scholars of women's history for a one-day event which featured papers, presentations, a keynote speaker, a panel discussion, and a lot of great ideas. The general consensus was that the conference was a much needed launching pad for those interested in growing the field of Midwestern women's history. In response, supporting partners and attending scholars have made this an ongoing meeting. Past events have focused on Indiana women making history in the fields of science, technology, and medicine, as well as in the arts. During the 2020 suffrage

centennial, we met to explore Hoosier women's work for suffrage and the ongoing struggle for equal citizenship rights. In 2022, we threw out the work altogether, and examined Hoosier women at play. We have also offered Wikipedia edit-a-thons and mini cons to keep the work thriving. This year, we are excited to welcome you to the Kurt Vonnegut Museum and Library. Women's work has been undervalued throughout history by patriarchal economic, political, and social systems, hindering a fuller understating of peace and war studies. The 2024 Hoosier Women at Work Conference seeks to encourage fresh scholarship and dynamic discussion of how Indiana women impacted these larger global events and systems of power.

What has been the role of women working to eliminate violence? How are women of color and indigenous women potentially at work for peace in different ways? What unexplored roles have women taken on in times of war? How has colonization and war impacted women and girls? How did Hoosier women impact broader historical and current events? We encourage topics related to girls and women of color, indigenous women, women of immigrant origin, those who identify as LGBTQ, and women with disabilities.


11:45-12:45 EAT AND EXPLORE THE KURT VONNEGUT MUSEUM AND LIBRARY



The Kurt Vonnegut Museum and Library champions the literary, artistic, and cultural contributions of the late writer, artist, teacher, and Indianapolis native Kurt Vonnegut. The library and museum serve as a cultural and educational resource unique to the nation.

KVML houses artifacts, art, a museum store, and books related to Vonnegut. When you visit KVML, you'll be able to see Vonnegut's typewriter, Purple Heart, reading glasses, artwork, and other personal items loaned by the family. We also house original exhibits related to Vonnegut and galleries dedicated to veteran artists. The KVML is not only a building full of artifacts. We strive to be a community asset, offering classes, workshops, and a gathering space for our neighbors on Indiana Ave., Indianapolis, and beyond.

HWW is proud to welcome Amisha (Amy) Padnani, an award-winning senior staff editor at *The New York Times* and creator of the <u>Overlooked</u> project, to the Madam Walker Legacy Center.

OVERLOOKED

A Celebration of Remarkable, Underappreciated People Who Broke the Rules and Changed the World

Overlooked tells the stories of remarkable women and people of color whose deaths were never reported by *The New York Times* in its 168-year history. After joining The Times's obituaries desk as an editor, Padnani noticed that the section was dominated by white men and sought ways to balance its coverage. Overlooked launched in 2018 with the stories of 15 women, and has since included people of color and subjects from the LGBTQ and disability communities.

Her *Overlooked* book, published in November 2023, features 66 Overlooked obituaries, about two dozen of which never appeared in *The Times*. Get your copy of Overlooked at the Kurt Vonnegut Museum and Library gift shop.



Padnani's speaking engagements have included TED, Creative Mornings, the National Museum for Women in the Arts, the Dead Ladies Show, Dropbox, Button, and other organizations. She has been interviewed by NPR, Democracy Now, CBC, CBS, and the BBC. She was named Incredible Woman of the Year by *Porter Magazine* in 2018.

Peightel's research method provides an achievable steppingstone between gathering standard historical or genealogical data, and sharing, writing, telling or performing captivating stories. Its purpose is to inspire research from a series of thoughtful sensory- and experience-driven focused questions pointing to non-traditional sources to answer those questions.

Starting from a place of compassion and empathy can help create a stronger sense of connectedness and belonging in those who learn these stories. Sensory-based exploration in our research adds a connection, a close person-to-person connection to others that defies time and space, and record availability.


