MR. FLEISCHHACKER: Yes. Thank you, Vice-Chair Ramos.

We've got a number of events that are coming up here in the near future that the Commission is engaged in. On September 7th we'll be at the Indiana Latino Expo Health Expo out at the -- I think it's at the Fairgrounds now; right? I believe so. So, we've got that coming up.

We've got our Annual Days of Service coming up on September 17th and 18th, where we're going to be out at Watkins Park and Northeast Landing Neighborhood area, and then we've got a secondary park that we're going to be doing some work in as well over those two days. So, right now we're having the planning stages of getting that all set up and coordinated.

On September 28th is the Circle City
Classic, so we'll be participating in a parade
for that and the festivities for that day,
raising awareness of the Commission.

And then on October 9th, it's a Wednesday, we're hosting the Civil Rights Awards Dinner, so it's a large-scale dinner, where we'll be recognizing some individuals who have made an impact in the Civil Rights area. So, we're -- right now we're actively in the planning stages for that and getting attendees and sponsors and all of that kind of stuff.

So, if the Commission has any individuals or entities that they might think are good partners for that as far as either sponsors or maybe getting a table or something like that, we can connect you with our External Affairs crew or you can reach out through me to do that, and we'd love to have anyone be a sponsor or purchase tables for that endeavor. It's going to be an excellent evening.

VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Can you forward us the sponsor package?

MR. FLEISCHHACKER: Sure, yep.

we've got the date held so we can accept or decline?

All right. At the end of July -- or at the end of June, we closed out our annual HUD contract period for housing cases, and then over the next month or so we've been working with them to finalize all of the numbers and everything.

For the contract period, which runs July 1 through June 30, we closed 180 cases, which was an increase from 165 the year before and 168 the year before that, so we're excited about that.

We're finalizing what that means financially, because depending on how the case was closed, that determines, under the contract, what kind of funding the agency receives for that, but it should be an amount that's comparable to what we've received in past years.

As far as the EEOC contract goes, we -that ends on September 30th; however, we've
already pretty much met our contract requirements
with the EEOC as far as processing contracts, so

now we're kind of just working with them through
the end of the contract period to put cases in
mind to have them close right when the new
contract period ends, so then they'll be credited
for this next contract period.

But I know that the EEOC is experiencing some tough times. I don't know if you saw, but their employees are being on a -- mandating a one-day furlough for August 30th unpaid, so they're experiencing some financial troubles this year for them.

So -- but I guess maybe we have been in talks before that, but the EEOC intends to transfer a number of cases over to us to work here in the next couple of weeks. We're looking at over a hundred cases, at least, that are going to be transferred over to ICRC, which will just subsequently increase our contract with them for next year, for the October 1 through September 30th of this next contract period.

So, we anticipate doing a lot more work on employment cases, because right now we currently have an inventory of over 400, and we're

averaging about 75 employment complaints a month that are coming into the agency, and that's what we've seen over the -- so far, the beginning of the year. So, no lack of employment cases to keep us busy at this point.

And then as far as other metrics go,
we've -- we're staying pretty steady through the
end of July as far as number of calls, number of
inquiries, and pretty much number of complaints
and closures as well. All of those are within 10
percent of where we were at this point last year.
Our complaints are -- complaints and closures are
a little bit up, inquiries are a little bit up,
calls are pretty flat.

Settlement funds, we've obtained 413,000 or so in settlement relief so far for complainants and aggrieved persons over the course of 2024 through the end of July, which is a little bit down from where we were at this point last year, but still it's a good recovery amount for those individuals.

We've currently got -- or at the end of the month, end of -- July 30, we are at 38 open

litigation cases. I think we're down to 34 at this point, and at the end of July we had closed 39 cases that were in litigation over the course of the year so far. So, we're humming along. We're doing a lot of work right now.

On the External Affairs/Education

Awareness side, we've got a lot of activities

going on. I did need to mention C.O.R.E., and we had a booth out at the State Fair for a day,

raising awareness and education out there. So, a lot of things going on in all areas of the agency, so a lot of good work being done by all of our staff.

VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Good. Great job.

I noticed that there's an uptick in -- normally

it's -- disability is the primary complaint that

comes in, and this last month race was at the

higher level. Is there any phenomenon around

that?

MR. FLEISCHHACKER: I don't think so.

Race and disability tend to be our two highest

protected classes that we see on a regular basis,

on an annual basis. They kind of typically are

in the same range, within a few percentage points, and then sex is typically the third place, kind of behind those a little bit, but I don't think there's anything in particular that kind of makes it sway one way or the other.

VICE-CHAIR RAMOS: Okay. Very good.

Any questions for the Deputy Director?
