In Q4, the Indiana National Guard and the State Partnership Program celebrated the historic arrival of the first 2 F-16's to the Slovak Air Force. This delivery marked the first of 14 F-16's to the Slovak Air Force in support of Indiana and Slovakia's 31-year partnership. Slovak President Peter Pellegrini celebrated the arrival of the jets saying that they would "contribute to the increase of defense capabilities of our country"

This quarter also marked the 80th anniversary of the Slovak National Uprising in which a delegation from the Indiana National Guard and Governors Office were invited to attend and celebrate. The event marks the anniversary of the two-month uprising of when the Slovak Resistance fought back against their Fascist occupiers in August 1944.

As we move into fiscal year 2025, we remain under a continuing resolution for funding the Department of Defense appropriations. Although this limits allotment and our ability to realign funding, we should still be able to fund and contract nearly all requirements and continue to support the readiness of our formations. We will continue our Financial Literacy training, with the next event on Jan. 30. Our big quarterly events include our Program Budget Advisory Committee events in February. Data Processing Center now has full-time data analytics professionals to support data products for the staff and major commands. Our Military Pay team has a MS TEAMS page set up to support unit questions and knowledge sharing. Starting at the end of Quarter 2, all commands and directorates should begin preparation of their fiscal year 26 budget requests.




The Inspector General for the Indiana National Guard acts as an impartial and unbiased adviser to the Adjutant General, offering inspections, assistance, investigations, and training. Our work promotes stewardship, accountability, integrity, efficiency, good order, discipline and enhances the overall readiness of the Indiana National Guard.

The IG office helps resolve issues, acts as fair and impartial fact-finders, identifies systemic trends affecting readiness, and provides clarity on Army policies and regulations. They serve as confidential advisors supporting commanders and staff, offering insights into unit command climate, and conducting teaching and training sessions to improve performance and understanding. When approaching the IG, consider these questions:

- What do you want the IG to do for you?
- Do you have any supporting documents?
- Is the chain of command aware of the matter?
- Who else have you asked for assistance?
- What is your duty status?

The Indiana National Guard has multiple opportunities for Full Time Employment. Active Guard Reserve (AGR) position allows Soldiers and Airmen to serve full-time in the Indiana National Guard while receiving the same benefits as Active Duty personnel. Title 32 Technicians refer to full time civilian employees with a military affiliation who focus on maintaining and supporting the day-to-day operations and training of their respective Guard units. They are, primarily responsible for administrative and technical tasks. Title 5 Employees are civilian employees who work for the Indiana National Guard but do not necessarily need military affiliation (although they can). Similar duties as the Title 32 Technician. It's been a busy first quarter for FY25! The SAPR team has been tirelessly working to prepare for the launch of our all-new FY 25 SAPR Annual Training, In The Boots of a Survivor. We look forward to seeing many of our SMs at their units and annual training in Q2 and beyond. In addition, we will be hosting 16 Train-the-Trainers to Facilitators throughout the state. A special thanks to our Collateral-Duty Victim Advocates who attended the pilot of our T4T session in early December. Their feedback was invaluable and has helped us craft an even better product for our State. We want to give an extra shoutout to SFC Tasha Carlile and SFC Kenneth Fodrie who helped hone a storyline that is more suitable for our Soldiers. We hope the holidays have been happy and restful for you all. Remember that a SAPR Victim Advocate is always available to speak to all SMs and their families. JFAC-A1 will prepare the State's OAY packages for regional submissions and assist with force management reviews. JFAC-A2 will publish the 2025 Executive Summary on China's rise and enhance Wings collaboration. JFAC-A3 will develop operations to increase military engagements between Slovakia and Indiana, including a visit for Slovak pilots and maintainers, and improve Blue JOC procedures. FEMA is updating support packages. JFAC-A5 will plan F-16 engagement with Slovakia, aligning their needs with Wings' expertise, and focus on CODEL strategies for F-16 conversion and Intelligence Wing infrastructure. JFAC-A6 will prepare talking points for the Indiana Cyber Civilian Corps' testimony and develop the Cyber Madness Offensive Cyber Ops Capture the Flag in collaboration with Purdue's CERIAS. The new JFAC-A8 will focus on SPP, support JOC, and coordinate KSA planning at CENTCOM, as well as participate in EUCOM engagement at the European Security Council WG.











Our program is designed to help future recruits achieve higher scores on the ASVAB through personalized tutoring, targeted practice tests, and comprehensive study materials. In our first class, a recruit received dedicated tutoring and significantly improved their ASVAB score, leading to their enlistment in the INNG.

By equipping recruits with the tools they need to excel, we are not only aiding their enlistment but also opening a wider range of military career opportunities and specialties.
