The Indiana Department of Transportation, with federal funding, intends to proceed with a project involving the intersections at SR 37 and Notestine Road and at SR 37 and Cuba/Thimler Roads in Allen County. This letter is part of the early coordination phase of the environmental review process. We are requesting comments from you within your area of expertise regarding any possible environmental effects associated with this project. Please use the above designation numbers and description in your reply. We will incorporate your comments into a study of the project's environmental impacts.

This intersection improvement project is located on SR 37, from 4.69 miles to 5.00 miles east of I-469, in Allen County. This section of SR 37 is a two-lane Major Collector. The SR 37 and Cuba/Thimler Road intersection is a two-way stop with preferentiality given to SR 37. Cuba Road intersects on the west side of SR 37 and Thimler Road intersects from the east side of SR 37. The SR 37 and Notestine Road intersection is also a two-way stop with preferentiality given to SR 37. The Notestine intersection has a significant skew causing sight distance issues. Both intersections have a higher than expected crash frequency based on crash volume and facility characteristics. The purpose of this project is to improve safety of these intersections and improve traffic flow on SR 37.

The proposed improvements for the intersection of SR 37 at Cuba/Thimler Road would widen SR 37 to include the addition of left turn lanes onto Cuba Road and Thimler Road. The intersection of SR 37 and Notestine Road would be re-aligned to the south, approximately 360 feet, to eliminate the skew of the intersection.

The current INDOT right-of-way is 30 feet from the centerline of the roadway. Right-of-way acquisition depends on the selected alternative but is not anticipated to exceed 7.7 acres. Approximately 0.5 acre of tree clearing is anticipated as part of the proposed project.

The proposed method of traffic maintenance will be phased construction to allow SR 37 and Cuba/Thimler Road and Notestine Road traffic to be maintained within the project limits. The anticipated letting date for this project is July 10, 2024, with construction planned to begin in late summer or early fall of 2024.

Land use in the vicinity of the project is primarily residential with one church located in the west quadrant at the intersection of SR 37 and Cuba/Thimler Roads. At the intersection of SR 37 and Notestine Road, land use is primarily agricultural and includes two residential homes. One stream, Amstutz Ditch, crosses the project area between the intersections of SR 37 and Cuba/Thimler Roads and the intersection of SR 37 and Notestine Road.

HNTB staff will perform waters and wetlands determinations to identify water resources that may be present. The project is anticipated to qualify for the application of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) range-wide programmatic informal consultation for the Indiana bat and northern long-eared bat. The USFWS Information, Planning, and Consultation System (IPaC) will be utilized to determine the project's potential to affect the Indiana bat and northern

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long-eared bat. Coordination will occur with INDOT Cultural Resources Office (CRO) to evaluate the project area for archaeological and historic resource and for Section 106 compliance. The results of this investigation will be forwarded to the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) for review and concurrence as appropriate.

You are asked to review this information and provide any comments you may have relative to the anticipated effects of the project on areas which you have jurisdiction or special expertise. The Indiana Department of Natural Resources has reviewed the above referenced project per your request. Our agency offers the following comments for your information and in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

If our agency has regulatory jurisdiction over the project, the recommendations contained in this letter may become requirements of any permit issued. If we do not

have permitting authority, all recommendations are voluntary.

Regulatory Assessment: Formal approval by the Department of Natural Resources under the regulatory

programs administered by the Division of Water is not required for this project.

Natural Heritage Database: The Natural Heritage Program's data have been checked.

To date, no plant or animal species listed as state or federally threatened, endangered,

or rare have been reported to occur in the project vicinity.

Fish & Wildlife Comments: Avoid and minimize impacts to fish, wildlife, and botanical resources to the greatest

extent possible, and compensate for impacts. The following are recommendations that

address potential impacts identified in the proposed project area:

1) Stream Crossings:

It is unclear if the SR 37 stream crossing over Amstutz Ditch will be impacted as a result

of this project. If the structure will be altered or replaced, then the following

recommendations apply:

Maintaining or improving fish and wildlife passage at existing or proposed stream crossing locations is a priority for the Division of Fish & Wildlife (DFW) to reduce wildlife mortality along roadways. The DFW has outlined different requirements for different types of crossing structure impacts. For brand new crossings in areas that currently do not have a crossing, the new structure must accommodate white-tailed deer passage where appropriate. Minimum structure dimensions for white-tailed deer passage are 20 feet of width clearance (overall size of the structure span) and 8 feet of height clearance measured from the OHWM to the low chord elevation and where deer passage is provided. For crossing replacements, the new structure must include wildlife passage appropriate for the type of replacement structure being proposed. If the replacement structure is sized to accommodate white-tailed deer passage then it should be included in the design of the new structure. If white-tailed deer passage is not possible with the existing structure, deer passage still needs to be considered in the design and at minimum the bank lines must be restored within structures to allow for smaller wildlife passage above the ordinary high water mark. All wildlife passage designs must include a smooth level pathway a minimum of 1-2 feet in width composed of natural substrate (soil, sand, gravel, etc.) or compacted aggregate fill over riprap (#2, #53, #73, etc.) tied into existing elevations both upstream and downstream. The stream crossing repairs or modifications, and any bank stabilization under or around the structure, must not create

conditions that are less favorable for wildlife passage when compared to existing conditions. Upgrading wildlife passage for rehabilitated/modified structures is encouraged whenever possible to improve wildlife/vehicle safety.

There are a number of techniques and materials for incorporating wildlife passage into the design of a crossing structure. The following links are good resources to consider in the design of stream crossing structures to maintain fish and wildlife passage: http://www.fs.fed.us/wildlifecrossings/library/,

When designing a new or replacement structure, bridges are recommended over culverts, and three-sided culverts are recommended over box or pipe culverts. Multiple culverts or culverts with multiple openings are not recommended. These types of structures are often problematic for fish and wildlife passage as they tend to accumulate debris and become blocked. If box and pipe culverts must be used, the culvert bottoms should be sumped a minimum of 6" (or 20% of the culvert height or diameter, whichever is greater up to a maximum of 2") below the stream bed elevation. Sumping is not required for bridges or three-sided culverts. Crossings must span the entire channel width (a minimum of 1.2 times the ordinary high water mark width). Crossings must maintain the natural stream substrate within the structure (natural stream substrate must be replaced in sumped box and pipe culverts up to the existing flowline). Scour protection at the inlet and outlet must not extend above the existing flowline elevation to maintain aquatic organism passage. Stream depth, channel width and water velocities in the crossing structure during low-flow conditions must approximate those in the natural stream channel.

2) Bank Stabilization:

Establishing vegetation along any disturbed banks is critical for stabilization and erosion control. In addition to vegetation, some other form of bank stabilization may be needed. While hard armoring alone (e.g. riprap or glacial stone) may be needed in certain instances, soft armoring and bioengineering techniques should be considered first. In many instances, one or more methods are necessary to increase the likelihood of vegetation establishment. Combining vegetation with most bank stabilization methods can provide additional bank protection and help reduce impacts upon fish and wildlife. Information about bioengineering techniques can be found at http://www.in.gov/legislative/iac/20120404-IR-312120154NRA.xml.pdf. Also, the following is a USDA/NRCS document that outlines many different bioengineering techniques for streambank stabilization: http://directives.sc.egov.usda.gov/17553.wba.

Riprap must not be placed in the active thalweg channel or placed in the streambed in a manner that precludes fish or aquatic organism passage (riprap must not be placed above the existing streambed elevation). Riprap may be used only at the toe of the sideslopes up to the ordinary high water mark (OHWM). The banks above the OHWM must be restored, stabilized, and revegetated using geotextiles and a mixture of grasses, sedges, wildflowers, shrubs, and trees native to Northern Indiana and specifically for stream bank/floodway stabilization purposes as soon as possible upon completion.

3) Forest & Riparian Habitat:

We recommend a mitigation plan be developed for any unavoidable habitat impacts that will occur. The DNR's Habitat Mitigation Guidelines (and plant lists) can be found online at: http://iac.iga.in.gov/iac/20200527-IR-312200284NRA.xml.pdf.

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Impacts to non-wetland forest of one (1) acre or more should be mitigated at a minimum 2:1 ratio. If less than one acre of non-wetland forest is removed in a rural setting, replacement should be at a 1:1 ratio based on area. Impacts to non-wetland forest under one (1) acre in an urban setting should be mitigated by planting five trees, at least 2 inches in diameter-at-breast height (dbh), for each tree which is removed that is 10" dbh or greater (5:1 mitigation based on the number of large trees) or by using the 1:1 replacement ratio based on area depending on the type of habitat impacted (individual canopy tree removal in an urban streetscape or park-like environment versus removal of habitat supporting a tree canopy, woody understory, and herbaceous layer). Impacts under 0.10 acre in an urban area may still involve the replacement of large diameter trees but typically do not require any additional mitigation or additional plantings beyond seeding and stabilizing disturbed areas. There are exceptions for high quality habitat sites however.

4) Wetland Habitat:

Due to the presence or potential presence of wetland habitat on site, we recommend contacting and coordinating with the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) 401 program and also the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) 404 program. Impacts to wetland habitat should be mitigated at the appropriate ratio according to the 1991 INDOT/IDNR/USFWS Memorandum of Understanding.

The additional measures listed below should be implemented to avoid, minimize, or compensate for impacts to fish, wildlife, and botanical resources:

- 1. Revegetate all bare and disturbed areas within the project area using a mixture of grasses (excluding all varieties of tall fescue), sedges, wildflowers, shrubs, and trees native to Northern Indiana and specifically for stream bank/floodway stabilization purposes as soon as possible upon completion.
- 2. Minimize and contain within the project limits inchannel disturbance and the clearing of trees and brush.
- 3. Do not work in the waterway from April 1 through June 30 without the prior written approval of the Division of Fish and Wildlife.
- 4. Do not cut any trees suitable for Indiana bat or Northern Long-eared bat roosting (greater than 5 inches dbh, living or dead, with loose hanging bark, or with cracks, crevices, or cavities) from April 1 through September 30.
- 5. Do not excavate in the low flow area except for the placement of piers, foundations, and riprap, or removal of the old structure.
- 6. Do not construct any temporary runarounds, access bridges, causeways, cofferdams, diversions, or pumparounds.
- 7. Use minimum average 6 inch graded riprap stone extended below the normal water level to provide habitat for aquatic organisms in the voids.
- 8. Do not use broken concrete as riprap.
- 9. Underlay the riprap with a bedding layer of well graded aggregate or a geotextile to prevent piping of soil underneath the riprap.
- 10. Minimize the movement of resuspended bottom sediment from the immediate project area.
- 11. Do not deposit or allow demolition/construction materials or debris to fall or otherwise enter the waterway.
- 12. Appropriately designed measures for controlling erosion and sediment must be implemented to prevent sediment from entering the stream or leaving the construction site; maintain these measures until construction is complete and all disturbed areas are stabilized.
- 13. Seed and protect all disturbed streambanks and slopes not protected by other methods that are 3:1 or steeper with erosion control blankets that are heavy-duty, biodegradable, and net free or that use loose-woven / Leno-woven netting to minimize the entrapment and snaring of small-bodied wildlife such as snakes and turtles (follow manufacturer's recommendations for selection and installation); seed and apply mulch



To whom it may concern:

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) has received your request dated March 21, 2023 to verify that the **SR 37 at Cuba/Thimler Road and Notestine Road, Intersection Improvement (Des. 1900142)** (Proposed Action) may rely on the concurrence provided in the February 5, 2018, FHWA, FRA, FTA Programmatic Biological Opinion for Transportation Projects within the Range of the Indiana Bat and Northern Long-eared Bat (PBO) to satisfy requirements under Section 7(a)(2) of the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (ESA) (87 Stat. 884, as amended; 16 U.S.C 1531 *et seq.*).

Based on the information you provided (Project Description shown below), you have determined that the Proposed Action is within the scope and adheres to the criteria of the PBO, including the adoption of applicable avoidance and minimization measures, and may affect, but is <u>not likely to adversely affect</u> (NLAA) the endangered Indiana bat (*Myotis sodalis*) and/or the threatened Northern long-eared bat (*Myotis septentrionalis*). Consultation with the Service pursuant to Section 7(a)(2) of the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (ESA) (87 Stat. 884, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.) is required.

The Service has 14 calendar days to notify the lead Federal action agency or designated non-federal representative if we determine that the Proposed Action does not meet the criteria for a NLAA determination under the PBO. If we do <u>not</u> notify the lead Federal action agency or designated non-federal representative within that timeframe, you may proceed with the Proposed Action under the terms of the NLAA concurrence provided in the PBO. This verification period allows Service Field Offices to apply local knowledge to implementation of the PBO, as we may identify a small subset of actions having impacts that were unanticipated. In such instances,

Service Field Offices may request additional information that is necessary to verify inclusion of the proposed action under the PBO.

NOTE: The Service reclassified the NLEB as an endangered species on November 30, 2022. This ruling becomes effective on January 30, 2023. This NLAA determination does not require reinitiation. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The following project name and description was collected in IPaC as part of the endangered species review process.

NAME

SR 37 at Cuba/Thimler Road and Notestine Road, Intersection Improvement (Des. 1900142)

DESCRIPTION

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) intend to proceed with a project involving the intersections at SR 37 and Notestine Road and at SR 37 and Cuba/Thimler Roads in Allen County.

The proposed improvements for the intersection of SR 37 at Cuba/Thimler Road would widen SR 37 to include the addition of left turn lanes into Cuba Road and Thimler Road. The intersection of SR 37 and Notestine Road would be re-aligned to the south, approximately 360 feet, to eliminate the skew of the intersection.

There is suitable summer habitat within the project area. Approximately 0.5 acre of tree clearing is currently anticipated for this project. The dominant tree species in the area include: red maple (Acer rubrum), honey locust (Gleditsia triacanthos), black locust (Robinia pseudoacacia), and white pine (Pinus strobus). Tree clearing will occur at the SR 37 and Cuba Rd./Thimler Rd. and along SR 37 southwest of the SR 37 and Cuba Rd./Thimler Rd. Tree clearing activities will take place during the inactive bat season. No permanent lighting is required for this project, though temporary lighting may be necessary. Construction activities not associated with tree clearing and roadway work will not increase noise levels beyond what is typical for this location.

A query of the USFWS Bat Database by INDOT Fort Wayne District staff conducted on November 10, 2021 did not identify any documented sites within 0.5 mile of the project area. Construction is anticipated to take place from approximately October 2024 through June 2025.

The proposed improvements for the intersection of SR 37 at Cuba/ Thimler Road would widen SR 37 to include the addition of left turn lanes into Cuba Road and Thimler Road. The intersection of SR 37 and Notestine Road would be re-aligned to the south, approximately 360 feet, to eliminate the skew of the intersection.

There is suitable summer habitat within the project area. Approximately 0.5 acre of tree clearing is currently anticipated for this project. The dominant tree species in the area include: red maple (Acer rubrum), honey locust (Gleditsia triacanthos), black locust (Robinia pseudoacacia), and white pine (Pinus strobus). Tree clearing will occur at the SR 37 and Cuba Rd./Thimler Rd. and along SR 37 southwest of the SR 37 and Cuba Rd./ Thimler Rd. Tree clearing activities will take place during the inactive bat season. No permanent lighting is required for this project, though temporary lighting may be necessary. Construction activities not associated with tree clearing and roadway work will not increase noise levels beyond what is typical for this location.

A query of the USFWS Bat Database by INDOT Fort Wayne District staff conducted on November 10, 2021 did not identify any documented sites within 0.5 mile of the project area. Construction is anticipated to take place from approximately October 2024 through June 2025.




