### Application period for 2025 Bicentennial Research Fellowship opens Sept. 3



In honor of the Indiana State Library's 200th anniversary, the Indiana State Library Bicentennial Committee, in conjunction with the Indiana State Library Foundation, will support one Indiana State Library Bicentennial Research Fellowship for 2025.

Emerging or established researchers and historians who are prepared to conduct and publish new research and scholarship with a focus on Indiana history, or a specific collection housed at the Indiana State Library, are encouraged to apply. The fellowship provides a \$1,000 stipend to support in-person research for five consecutive work days at the Indiana State Library in downtown Indianapolis.

Applicants must be emerging or established historians, researchers, authors, post-docs or graduate students with proven writing skills, a demonstrated passion for Indiana history and the ability to perform inperson research at the Indiana State Library for five consecutive days, Monday through Friday, between Jan. 6-Dec. 19, 2025. Applicants can be based anywhere in the U.S., but the committee particularly encourages Indiana residents outside of Marion County to apply.

## Catch a falling star this month

The Perseid meteor showers occur between July and September every year and peak in mid-August. They are generally considered the best shower of the year with up to a hundred meteors per hour. To find the showers, one can look north toward the Perseus Constellation, home to the showers and the winking star Algol, also known as the Demon Star. Just before dawn is best, but anywhere dark should do.

Meteor showers, however, occur throughout the year, with the regularity of clockwork. In fact, the National Weather Service provides a nice <u>calendar</u> for the year. There are also informational guides such as <u>this one</u>, that define meteoroids, meteors, and meteorites.

# Library making an impact



The North Webster Community Public Library's Citizen Science Club is brand new and participants are already finding ways to impact their community. One attendee has already made a connection with a local organization to help with removing invasive plant species. The library has also purchased a CoCoRaHS rain gauge that will allow them to submit daily readings to the National Weather Service for use in tracking rainfall, potential flooding and even drought conditions. CoCoRaHS is the nationwide Collaborative Community Rain, Hail and Snow project.

Attendees choose citizen science projects from around the world via the SciStarter website. Examples include Project Squirrel, to study squirrel populations; Stall Catchers, to better understand Alzheimer's; and iNaturalist, to submit data about local plants, animals, bugs and even fungus.

"The best thing about citizen science is that anyone can participate," said public services director Amanda Demster. "You don't have to have a background in science. I majored in English, and I'm terrible at math and calculating formulae, so the fact that I and others like me can still take part in scientific study truly amazes me." Demster heads up the Citizen Science Club and invites anyone interested to join.

"While this program is aimed at adults, we invite participants to bring their kids and grandkids along," Demster said.
