Allen County Public Library celebrates 10year anniversary of Maker Labs; announces new labs and programming



The Allen County Public Library has announced the 10-year anniversary of its Maker Labs, marking a decade of providing hands-on learning opportunities to the community. The library is using the opportunity not only to celebrate the success of the current Maker Labs, but to also announce the launch of three new mini Maker Labs, expanded maker programming and the intention to relocate the existing Maker Lab at the Main Library to a space with a larger footprint.

In the spring of 2014, Allen County Public Library opened its flagship Maker Lab at the Main Library, as well as a Maker Lab at the Georgetown Branch. The innovative spaces boasted cutting-edge 3D printers, audio and video recording equipment, craft machines and more. Over the years, the Main Maker Lab has served an average of 950 to 1350 patrons each month and provided hundreds of STEAM programs to the Allen County community for free.

From 2021 to present, the Maker Labs spaces have experienced a 42% increase in visitors. In the most recent quarter, the Maker Lab at Main expanded its programming, offering 28 programs.

Warsaw library's StoryWalk project will be installed in the fall Wayne to purchase new equipment and expand the maker concept to more locations. In 2023, the library outfitted mini Maker Labs at the Hessen Cassel, Pontiac and Shawnee branches. These locations now offer 3D printers, laminators, Cricut vinyl cutters, heat press machines, sewing machines and badge makers to the public. Earlier this month, Shawnee, Hessen Cassel and Pontiac's mini Maker Labs began offering open lab hours for patrons to use the equipment for their own projects.

Last year, the library shared its 2024-28 strategic plan, which included a goal of designing functional, friendly spaces including an expansion of the Main Maker Lab and services. The library embarked on planning for the renovation of the space vacated by Dunkin' Donuts to house a larger, more accessible and more flexible maker space. This move will allow for the transformation of the space into a modern art, science and production studio fostering growth in the years to come.

Beyond expanding across the system and relocating the lab within the Main Library, the Allen County Public Library has also invested in staffing to support the work of the Maker Lab including the creation of a full-time Maker Lab guide and a systemwide programs and partnerships specialist focused on maker programming and services beyond the Main Library. Each mini Maker Lab location also has designated staff who have received additional maker training.



Indiana Drivers' Manual



"The speed that thrills is the speed that kills." This quote is from the 1945 Indiana Drivers' Manual. The Indiana State Library has digitized a historic run of driver's manuals, published by the Bureau of Motor Vehicles from 1937 to 1976.

The physical look of the manuals has changed, but much of the content is still the same. The earlier manuals were very basic text and had no images or statistics, but by 1945 the manual had grown. It included color images, information about beginner's licenses, various traffic signals and signs, hand signals and the rules of the road.

Organizations eligible to apply include nonprofit, tax-exempt 501(c)(3), U.S. organizations; nonprofit institutions of higher education; units of local government; or federallyrecognized tribal communities or tribes. All applications are submitted by one organization and require at least one partner organization. The applicant or partner pair must include a nonprofit organization and a local governmental or quasigovernmental entity. If neither of the partners is an arts, design or cultural entity, then an additional arts, design, or cultural partner is also required.

Applicants may request an amount between \$25,000-\$150,000, with a required minimum nonfederal cost share or match equal to the grant amount.

Part one of the application is due by Aug. 1, and part two is due by Aug. 15. NEA estimates that after registering, the process to draft and submit an application will take approximately 26 hours.

On Wednesday, July 24, from 10-11 a.m., the Indiana State Library will present "Indiana 211."

The free webinar will provide an overview of Indiana 211 - a state agency within Family Social Services Administration - that is free and available to provide resources and information to Hoosiers across all 92 counties.

Indiana 211's stated mission is to improve quality of life for Hoosiers by promoting equity and connecting people to health and human service resources through highly-skilled navigators, continuous community collaboration and a robust community database and technological innovations.

Presenter Jill Shamon is a community engagement coordinator for Indiana 211 and has been with the State of Indiana for just over two years, coming to 211 from Family and Social Services, Office of the Secretary.

Over the years, the highway system grew and developed and the changes in laws to help promote public safety while out on the road are seen in the drivers' manuals. In 1946, the cost for an operator's license was \$1.25 and would rise to \$5.00 by 1976. The 1945 manual states that in cities and towns, "20 miles per hour in business districts and 30 miles per hour in residential districts."

By 1976, the highway system had grown to include interstates, like Interstates 65, 70 and 465, allowing for faster travel and growth in the cities. This was reflected in the speed limits with the addition "On state highways... 55 mph or as posted." Much of the basic information has stayed the same since 1937, but additions came over the years, such as information about anti-littering laws, drinking and driving and drugs and driving. The 1945 Indiana drivers' manual stated that 784 people were killed in 1944, and later in the 1974, 1,231 were killed.

From the 1945 Indiana Drivers' Manual: "Think twice... once for yourself. Once for the other fellow."

The Indiana Drivers' Manual collection is available in the State Library's <u>Indiana State Agency</u> <u>Documents digital collections</u> for viewing and research.
