National Book Festival event scheduled at Indiana State Library



The Library of Congress is once again presenting the National Book Festival. The 24th annual festival will take place in-person on Aug. 24 at the Washington Convention Center in Washington D.C. On Aug. 10, Indiana is having its own National Book Festival Event in downtown Indianapolis.

Each year, the Indiana Center for the Book chooses two authors to feature during the festival, one who writes for children and one who writes for adults. This year, the Center has chosen to highlight Gabrielle Balkan's picture book "What a Map Can Do" and Kaveh Akbar's novel "Martyr!"

The Indiana Center for the Book is partnering with Indiana Humanities to host a program with Balkan in-person at 1 p.m. on Aug. 10 at the Indiana State Library. The family-friendly event will feature a talk from Balkan and mapping activities for kids, Kids Ink will be on hand to sell books. Attendees can park for free at the Senate Avenue Garage across the street from the Indiana State Library. Parking tickets can be brought into the library to be validated. The event is free but registration is required.

In addition to the aforementioned authors, Indiana author Candace Fleming will also be at the National Book festival in-person. Fleming's book "The Enigma Girls" is featured in a toolkit put together by Indiana Humanities and Indiana Center for the Book.

Indiana Treasurer of State offering scholarships for special needs students



An Indiana Education Scholarship Account, administered by the Office of the Indiana Treasurer of State, provides scholarshin funding to students with disabilities, which they can use to access the educational environment that best meets their learning needs. Parents of eligible students, or emancipated eligible students, may spend scholarship money on pre-approved educational programs, therapies, services, tuition and fees at private schools, curricular materials and other expenses related to the student's education.

"This scholarship program offers a great opportunity for parents of children with special education needs. The Indiana Department of Education counts more than 100,000 K-12 students in this category every year. Librarians across Indiana can greatly benefit their communities by sharing this information with their adult patrons who may be parents of these students," said Kara Cleveland, Professional Development Office supervisor at the Indiana State Library.

To be eligible for the scholarship account, the student must be a resident of Indiana; in the K-12 grade level, ages 5-22; have a disability and require special education; meet an income requirement; and complete state testing. 

Inventory of lost farmland



The Indiana State Department of Agriculture recently announced the completion of its inventory of lost farmland to the Indiana Legislative Council. With House Enrolled Act 1557, the 2023 Indiana General Assembly called on ISDA to conduct the inventory and submit the results not later than July 1. View both the full 2010 to 2022 report and a summary of methods, data, results and recommendations.

The ISDA determined there has been an overall reduction of 350,000 farmland acres, approximately 1.5-2%, from 2010-2022. Agricultural land was mostly lost near the edges of cities and suburban areas, primarily due to residential use.

Despite the loss in acreage, yield data from the <u>USDA National</u> <u>Agricultural Statistics Service</u> shows that Indiana's production of its cash

State Budget Agency calculates maximum levy growth quotient



Public library directors and trustees should note that the State Budget Agency has calculated the maximum levy growth quotient pursuant to IC 6-1.1-18.5-2 for property tax levies first due and payable in CY 2025. The growth quotient for CY 2025 is 4.000%.

"We have workshops for aspiring writers to hone their skills and we have plenty of books for readers of all ages to discover covering a variety of genres."

Local authors are invited to apply to be featured at the Meet an Author, Be an Author Book Fair. Featured authors will receive free table space to sell and promote their books, network with other authors and engage with the public. The application period closes on Aug. 26. Selected authors will be notified by Sept. 13.

In 2012, Indiana produced over 597 million bushels of corn for grain, and in 2022 yielded over 1 billion bushels. Indiana produced nearly 219 million bushels of soybeans in 2012 and saw that number increase to over 326 million in 2022.

The ISDA recommends that the inventory be conducted every five years to keep pace with both population and economic growth. Other recommendations include encouraging local governments to identify agricultural land trends when making land use decisions and updating their comprehensive plans accordingly.
