Eleanor Brinsko will present "Westward Ho: Migrations Methods of the United States." Brinsko will focus on the people who have called the land called America "home" and the methods they chose to migrate across the country. Questions like "How did they get to their chosen place of settlement?" and "What modes of transportation were available?" will be answered.

Annette Burke Lyttle will present "How Advertising Brought Our Ancestors to the Midwest." Business owners, land speculators and communities wishing to grow all turned to various forms of advertising to entice people to migrate to the Midwestern territories and states. Lyttle will look at what kinds of messages these ads used in order to make hard work and pioneer living seem attractive.

Lyttle will also present "The National Road: America's First Federal Highway." Built between 1811 and 1837, the National Road was the first federally-funded highway in America. Extending from Maryland to the frontier of Illinois, this migration route allowed thousands of people to settle in the Midwest.

Difference is You Conference registration closes Aug. 9




Registration for the 2024 Difference is You Conference closes on Friday, Aug. 9. The conference is the only statewide event designed especially for library support staff and non-MLS librarians. However, all are welcome to attend.

The conference will take place on Friday, Sept. 20, from 9 a.m.-3:45 p.m., at the Indiana State Library in downtown Indianapolis.

The theme of this year's Difference is You Conference is "Grow Your Garden." The Professional Development Committee of the Indiana State Library hopes that attendees will develop and cultivate what they learn at this event and that they can expand upon that knowledge at their own library. The committee also encourages libraries to register staff as a group for a team-building outing.

Gwendolyn Schort Burris, born in 1911, was the first woman radio disc jockey in Indianapolis. She graduated with a bachelor's degree in Public Speaking from Butler University and a diploma in dramatics from Metropolitan School of Music at Jordan College by 1933. Burris - then Schort - was heavily engaged in civic theatre and performing. In 1937, she gained the notice of the director of WFBM, a local radio station, while giving recitations of a few of James Whitcomb Riley's works on a Third Christian Church radio program. He offered her the position of co-host of an afternoon program, Tea Time Tunes, spinning records. Soon thereafter, Burris was also asked to host a morning talk show program called Apron Strings, aimed at women listeners.

According to Burris, the programs at that time were precisely timed and scripted, unlike modern radio, where DJs are allowed more spontaneity in their programming. She found the extemporaneity of 1970s radio and television far more interesting than the structured offerings of her early radio career. When asked in her [oral history interview](#) if she drew inspiration from other radio programs or performers, Burris noted that she was, ironically, never a radio enthusiast. Instead, her passion lay in the theatre, therefore, she was
