# Is your library making news?

In this presentation, part of the Allen County Public Library's Rolland Lecture series, Jonathan W. White, Civil War historian, will discuss President Abraham Lincoln and the Emancipation Proclamation. He will also examine Juneteenth, the holiday that commemorates the end of slavery in the United States.

White is an historian of the American Civil War with a particular interest in Abraham Lincoln, African American history and U.S. constitutional history. His articles have appeared in a wide variety of journals, magazines and periodicals, including Smithsonian Magazine, Civil War History, the Journal of the Civil War Era, the Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography, the Maryland Historical Magazine, New Jersey Monthly and more. White currently teaches American studies courses on the Declaration of Independence, the U.S. Constitution, Abraham Lincoln and race and the history of treason in the U.S. at Christopher Newport University in Virginia.

The hybrid program will take place both virtually on Zoom and in person in the Allen County Public Library's Main Library Theater. Registration is required for both the in-person presentation and the virtual presentation. Click <a href="here">here</a> to register.

On Sept. 18, 1953, residents of Woodruff Place were invited to attend a town hall meeting via a flyer proclaiming that "time is of the essence." The flyer - a copy of which can be found in the Small Broadsides Collection at the Indiana State Library - provides a glimpse into the hard-fought battle that ultimately resulted in the annexation of Woodruff Place into the city of Indianapolis.

Now a near-east side neighborhood, the town was established in the 1870s by James O. Woodruff, best known for creating the city's water system, and it remained an independent town within city limits after it was incorporated in 1876. Councilman J. Wesley Brown introduced the annexation ordinance multiple times in 1953 before it was passed in September, but it was formally enacted only after nine years of protests and legal battles. The final blow to resistant Woodruff Place residents came in February 1962 after the Supreme Court decided not to review the case, the next logical step after the Indiana Supreme Court upheld the annexation the previous year. At the time of annexation, it comprised around 1,700 residents.

The reason for annexation cited by the city was the need for Woodruff Place residents to pay their share of taxes, though the incorporated town did already pay the city fees for To be featured in the Wednesday Word, please <u>email</u> a press release and a photo.
