Collaborative Summer Library Program to present inclusive practices webinar



On Nov. 20 at 2 p.m. Eastern Time, the Collaborative Summer Library Program will present "Artful Connections: Stephanie Haines' Vision for Inclusive and Inspiring Communities.

During the presentation, attendees will learn about the fundamentals of accessibility through the lens of creative arts activities. Presenter Stephanie Haines, of the Indiana Arts Commission, will cover what it means to be accessible; common adaptations libraries can make to creative tools and materials; and how libraries can be flexible and inclusive in their approach to planning arts experiences for a diverse community.

Haines is the Arts Education and Accessibility Program manager at the Indiana Arts Commission. She oversees the IAC's arts education research project Partnering Arts, Communities and Education, as well as Poetry Out Loud, the Indiana State Poet Laureate program and Creative Aging programming statewide. Haines served as chair of the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies Arts Education Working Group from 2019-2020. She is also the agency's accessibility coordinator, handling all ADA compliance procedures and leading an Accessibility in the Arts Advisory Committee, Haines earned a Master of Arts degree in arts administration from Indiana University, and a

NEA Big Read grants available

Arts Midwest is now accepting grant applications for the NEA Big Read.

An initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with Arts Midwest. the <u>NEA Big Read</u> supports community reading programs designed around a single NEA Big Read book. The goal of the program is to inspire meaningful conversations, celebrate local creativity, elevate a wide variety of voices and perspectives and build stronger connections in each community. Grants range from \$5,000 to \$20,000 each. Applicants will host book discussions, writing workshops and creative activities that celebrate unique aspects of their community, using as inspiration one of 22 available NEA Big Read books. Each title explores in some way a relationship with the physical environment.

Programming for the 2025-2026 grant cycle will center around the theme "Our Nature: How Our Physical Environment Can Lead Us to Seek Hope, Courage and Connection."

NEA Big Read programs vary and can be as short as a week or as long as several months. Beyond discussions of the book, organizations may choose to include a kick-off event, invite the author for a visit or have other events inspired by the content and themes of the book, including panel discussions, lectures, film screenings, art exhibitions, theatrical and musical performances, poetry slams, writing workshops and contests and community storytelling events.

The mandatory intent to apply is due Jan. 23, 2025, with final applications due Jan. 30, 2025. Funded projects must occur between Sept. 1, 2025 and June 30, 2026. Nonprofit organizations and public libraries located across the United States and the Native nations that share this geography can apply. Arts organizations, universities, libraries, service organizations, museums, school districts and tribal governments are all encouraged to apply.

Cagles Mill Lake



The latest addition to the Indiana State Library's Digital Collections includes materials about <u>Cagles Mill Lake</u> and its surrounding area, which covers 8,283 acres. The area includes a dam, Cataract Falls, the Lieber State Recreation Area and the Owen-Putnam State Forest. The lake lies in the Midwestern part of Indiana in Putnam and Owen Counties.

Originally named Cataract Lake, Cagles Mill Lake was selected through cooperative action between federal, state and local agencies - to become Indiana's first flood control reservoir. It was selected under Public Law No. 761 of the 75th Congress, also known as the Flood Control Act of 1938. Construction lasted from 1948 to 1953. Where Mill Creek flows into the 1,400-acre Friends of the Library slash nonresident card fees

Noble County Public Library to receive 2024 Outstanding Library Award



The Noble County Public Library will receive the 2024 Outstanding Library Award at the annual Indiana Library Federation conference in Indianapolis this month.

The honor recognizes outstanding library service that consistently exceeds the expectations of the users and serves as an exemplary model for other libraries.

The Noble County Public Library serves 10 of the 13 townships in Noble County through three libraries located in Albion, Avilla and Cromwell. The library has long been a benchmark of services and collaboration efforts within the county as well as the region and the state. With less funding and staffing than most libraries of its size, the library's staff has worked within these constraints and maximized its resources to provide unique services, such as Kindergarten Prep School and the Bridge. The impact that the library has had, and continues to have, within its communities is a result of developing strong relationships outside the organization.

Connections with the
Commissioners and the Emergency
Management Agency allowed for the
library to quickly adapt to being the
county vaccination and testing site
during the COVID pandemic.
Partnering with Purdue Extension,
Master Gardeners and local
businesses brought about the
creation of an educational Rain
Garden at the library in Albion. Staff
at the Cromwell and Avilla branches
work with their towns and parks to
bring families together through joint
holiday and festival events.

"Every library in the world deserves to be recognized for what they do in their communities and we don't often think we are 'special'. This award isn't for us, it is for our towns, our county and our partners that have collaborated with us on so many amazing projects," said Sandy Petrie, executive director of the Noble County Public Library.

Today, the Lieber State Recreation area covers about 561 acres and was named after the father of Indiana' state parks system, Richard Lieber. The recreational area has shelters, beach areas, a volleyball court, a playground and a state-of-the-art aquatic center, as well as hiking trails, boat access to the lake and a campground.

The new subcollection is part of the State Library's bigger state parks collection - found in the digital collection - "Open Spaces Historic Places." The Cagles Mill Lake materials include early trail maps, tourist pamphlets, larger lake maps and maps of the surrounding area. The Indiana State Library plans on adding more state parks to the collection in 2025, including Shades Park.
