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Upcoming Rosetta Stone migration will require INSPIRE users to keep track of progress



On Nov. 13, the Rosetta Stone platform will be upgraded. Users who subscribe to Rosetta Stone via INSPIRE will notice a change in their account.

Once the migration is complete, users' accounts and progress will be reset. EBSCO recommends that users note their current level and lesson. After the migration, users will be able to go back to their previous lessons manually. EBSCO has provided a reminder bookmark

There will be no other changes to users' accounts. Users will enter their same credentials on the login screen. They will still have continuous access to Rosetta Stone's content, new updated imagery and cultural stories. The program will look and feel identical to the existing site. The content and curriculum path will not change.

Indiana residents who use Rosetta Stone via INSPIRE will still have free full access - all five levels - to nine languages in Rosetta Stone: Chinese (Mandarin), Spanish (Spain), Spanish (Latin America), English (American), English (British), French, German, Italian and Russian. Additionally, Indiana residents can access 15 languages up to level three: Arabic, Dutch, Filipino (Tagalog), Greek, Hebrew, Hindi, Irish, Japanese, Korean, Persian (Farsi), Polish, Portuguese, Swedish, Turkish and Vietnamese.

Rosetta Stone is available to all Indiana residents at no cost. Visit the INSPIRE website and click on the Rosetta Stone logo to sign up and get started.

County, Indiana. After graduating from the common schools, he taught for a few years in Owensville, Indiana. He attended classes at the Chicago Medical College and became a practitioner in Carlisle, Indiana in 1864. Over the next decade, Aydelotte practiced in Sullivan, Gibson and Greene counties. He settled in Greene County and lived there until his death in 1920.

In this <u>1868 letter to his father</u>, he mentions a couple of the cases he consulted on with another physician. One of these patients is a man with hydrophobia, now known as rabies. Aydelotte goes in detail discussing the man's case including the variety of symptoms he is displaying.

At the time, the number of human deaths from rabies was not tracked in Indiana. The State Board of Health tracked the number of animal heads sent to them for testing, a number that J. P. Simonds, superintendent of the state laboratory, noted did not accurately show how prevalent the disease was in the state. Rabies remained untreatable until 1885 when Louis Pasteur and Émile Roux developed the first rabies treatment. In 1911, the Indiana legislature passed a hydrophobia law part of which required the State Board of Health to administer the Pasteur treatment to any person unable to pay for it. Between 1911 and 1915, 771 people received this treatment. The number of deaths from rabies in the U.S. finally started to decline in the 1940s after the increased vaccinations of pets along with the creation of animal control programs. The last recorded death from rabies in Indiana was in 2009.

Those submitting proposals should indicate type of session (e.g., solo presenter, group or panel, round table discussion, etc.); connection to suggested topics, if applicable; title and description; learning objectives and audience engagement; and presenter contact information and co-presenter details, if applicable.
