- Social Determinants/Drivers of Health (SDOH): the conditions in the environments where people are born, live, learn, work, play, worship, and age that affect a wide range of health, functioning, and quality-oflife outcomes and risks.
- Food Insecurity: the condition of not having access to sufficient food, or food of an adequate quality, to meet one's basic needs.
- Hunger: a feeling of discomfort or weakness caused by lack of food, coupled with the desire to eat; the distress associated with lack of food.
- Malnourishment: lack of proper nutrition, caused by not having enough to eat, not eating enough of the right things, or being unable to use the food that one does eat.
- Food is Medicine (FIM): a spectrum of programs and services that aim
 to treat or prevent diseases through nutrition, responding to the critical
 link between nutrition and health and connection to the health care
 system.



Food Insecurity and Malnutrition in Indiana

Food Insecurity and Malnutrition in Indiana

- In Indiana, 950,220 people are facing hunger and of them 285,070 are children.
- People facing hunger in Indiana are estimated to report needing \$633,214,000 more per year to meet their food needs.

That means each person experiencing hunger would need just over \$660 dollars per year to meet their needs.

- US food insecurity rate: 12.8%
 Indiana's food insecurity rate: 13.9%
 Indiana's child food insecurity rate: 18.2%
- Of Indiana's food insecure population, 65% are above the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) threshold, meaning many of our neighbors' wages are simply not enough to make ends meet... yet too high to receive government aid.





SNAP Monthly Income Limits and Maximum Allotment

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program has two income limits: gross income and net income. **Gross income** is your total income, before taxes or any deductions. **Net income** is determined by subtracting certain allowable deductions from the gross income.

Monthly Income Limits and Maximum Allotment

Food Insecurity and Malnutrition in Indiana

Indiana's largest county, Marion County, has the highest rate of child food insecurity with 23.9% of children facing food insecurity. Other counties rounding out the top 5:

- Fayette County, 22.9%
- Scott County, 22.1%
- Wayne County, 21.8%
- Jennings county, 19.5%

The issue is expanding even in the state's wealthiest counties. From 2021 to 2022, Hamilton County's food insecurity rate increased from 6% to 9.2%.

In Boone County, it increased from 6.7% to 10%.

In Hendricks County, it increased from 6.4% to 9.7%





MHS Approach to Food Access

MHS Approach to Food Access

MHS is committed to helping members meet social needs through a spectrum of programs and services that aim to treat or prevent diseases through nutrition, responding to the critical link between nutrition and health and connection to the health care system.





MHS Approach to Food Access cont.

Program Name	Brief Description
Post-Discharge Meals	Recently discharged members experiencing food insecurity and a high-risk condition such as diabetes or heart disease, Receive medically-tailored food boxes containing two weeks of frozen meals
Food Box Program	Members experiencing food insecurity, with limited access to food pantries, receive 2 boxes of pantry-stable foods
Live Great Program	Members receive \$20 a month, for six months, on their My Health Pays rewards card. This can be used at Wal-Mart to buy food and other necessities
SNAP Benefit Support	Case managers and SDOH specialists direct members to SNAP resources, such as the FSSA application website and the Gleaners SNAP assistance website or hotline at (317) 644-1280
Community Connection	Free, public database of community resources given to members to assist with food, shelter, goods, employment, and other community resources



- 3. MHS Direct Referral Using the Provider Portal





Direct Referral: Warm Handoff

Referrals to local organizations to support SDOH needs are often most effective when the referring office (you as the provider) connects the individual (patient) directly by contacting the community organization on their behalf (by email or phone) while the patient is still present, which will ensure the patient is:

- ✓ Willing to engage services
- ✓ Eligible
- ✓ Able to access services
- ✓ Able to communicate the need


Step 1: Log into provider account

Step 2: Look up member information using Quick Actions


- Enter Member ID and DOB



SNAP Assistance

According to the FSSA (Family and Social Services Administration), the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program provides food assistance to low-and no-income people and families living in the United States. It is a federal aid program administered by the Food and Nutrition Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture however, distribution of benefits occurs at the state level. In Indiana, the Family and Social Services Administration is responsible for ensuring federal regulations are initially implemented and consistently applied in each county.

Summer Grocery Benefit for Kids

SUN Bucks is a new grocery benefit available across most of the U.S. Families with eligible school-aged children can get \$120 per child to buy groceries during the summer. SUN Bucks may have a different name depending on your location.





How to Get SUN Bucks

If you're already enrolled in benefits like SNAP, TANF, or FDPIR, your school-age children will automatically be enrolled in SUN Bucks if it's available where you live. Also, if your child attends a school that offers the National School Lunch Program or School Breakfast Program (NSLP/SBP), and your household income meets the requirements for free or reduced-price school meals, your child may automatically be enrolled in SUN Bucks.

If you are NOT automatically enrolled, you can apply for SUN Bucks directly. To qualify, you must meet income limits and other requirements.

Once you're enrolled, SUN Bucks may be automatically added to your SNAP account, issued as a separate electronic benefit transfer (EBT) card, or sent in other ways depending on where you live.



<u>PROGRAM</u>	DESCRIPTION	ELIGIBILITY
WIC (Women, Infants, and Children)	Nationally recognized nutrition program that improves access to nutritious foods and promoting healthier eating and lifestyles.	Income guidelines Usually automatically available to Medicaid, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) or SNAP recipients.
The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)	USDA provides food to states to distribute to local food banks and pantries	Income, residency and household size guidelines.
Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)	Aims to improve the health of those 60+ and low-income by sending monthly food packages with nutritious USDA commodity food.	60+ Income and residency guidelines Application process
Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP)	Provides low-income seniors with access to locally grown fruits, vegetables, and edible herbs	60+ Income and residency guidelines


Food Bank Map


